"That is another question—you don't suppose I would serve sour cream when the milkhouse is full of crocks of sweet cream, do you?"



As time goes on, there will be more and more people who will turn away from their belief in God. The devil is working hard because he knows his time is short. Don't let him sway you. Be firm and bold to declare that God is the only God and that you believe Him to be real and true. He is not dead. but alive, and one of these days you will die and leave this world and will meet Him in the Judgment Day. Never, never fool with it or you will become tainted with a false spirit. Today there are many who need Jesus to deliver them from these false spirits. We also find there were those who lived in the city of Ephesus who Jews and Greeks also dwelling at Ephe-

The devil power working in the man was greater than any natural man's strength and he overcame them and they fled, wounded and naked. OPPOSITION AND SUCCESS

Acts 19:24-32, 37-41

Acts 19:24 For a certain man named Demetrius, a silversmith, which made silver shrines for Diana, brought no small gain unto the craftsmen:

25 Whom he called together with the workmen of like occupation, and said,

- 26 Moreover ye see and hear, that not alone at Ephesus, but almost throughout all Asia, this Paul hath persuaded and turned away much people, saying that they be no gods, which are made with hands:
- 27 So that not only this our craft is in danger to be set at naught; but also that the temple of the great goddess Diana should be despised, and her magnificence should be destroyed, whom all Asia and the world worshippeth.
- 28 And when they heard these sayings, they were full of wrath, and cried out, saying, Great is Diana of the Ephesians.
- 29 And the whole city was filled with confusion: and having caught Gaius and Aristarchus, men of Macedonia, Paul's companions in travel, they rushed with one accord into the theatre.
- 30 And when Paul would have entered in unto the people, the disciples suffered him not.
- 31 And certain of the chief of Asia, which were his friends, sent unto him, desiring him that he would not adventure himself into the theatre.
- 32 Some therefore cried one thing, and some another: for the assembly was confused; and the more part knew not wherefore they were come together.
- 37 [Ephesian Townclerk said] For ye have brought hither these men, which are neither robbers of churches, nor yet blasphemers of your goddess.
- 38 Wherefore if Demetrius, and the craftsmen which are with him, have a matter against any man, the law is open, and there are deputies: let them implead one another.

- 39 But if any enquire any thing concerning other matters, it shall be determined in a lawful assembly.
- 40 For we are in danger to be called in question for this day's uproar, there being no cause whereby we may give an account of this concourse.
- 41 And when he had thus spoken, he dismissed the assembly.

"That's true," answered the pastor. "It hurts me also to know we haven't grown. Still we did gain one member, Bobby Moffat. But he's so young I suppose we shouldn't even count him."

A few years later Bobby came to the pastor and asked, "Pastor, do you think I could ever learn to preach? If I could lead people to Jesus, I would be happy. I love Jesus and want to do something for him."

The pastor told him, "Well, Bobby, you might make a preacher. At least you can try. God will be with you."

We think of Jesus, the greatest person who ever lived in this life and also the bravest. He willingly let others put Him on the cross because He chose to take our punishment for us. He was full of courage and bravery. He could have called ten thousand angels to help Him. but He refused their help. how great He was! No man was ever so brave, but He cried. When Lazarus died, Jesus cried. Every year during Lent Judas gets "blown to bits" in Mexico. Not really, of course. But here's what happens:

But being angry with Judas doesn't really help us. It may even do us harm. If we criticize the betraver for his evil act, we may feel proud of ourselves for not being as bad as he was. God warns us in the Bible: "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall." 1 Cor. 10:12.

Instead of being angry with Judas we ought to be warned by what happened to him. We betray Jesus. too. If Judas had trusted Jesus, the risen Christ would have returned to forgive him as He did Peter, who denied Him. When we turn to the risen Christ in prayer for His forgiveness. and He richly forgives us even though we also have been Judases.

No doubt Paul thought about this image when he was there, but was glad that he could tell the people that Jesus was the one to worship. They came to Tyre and there is where our lesson begins.

Just recently some youths were killed in a riot. makes our hearts ache and we are grieved for our youth today. Rioting is contrary to the spirit of Christ. When the soldiers came to take Jesus, who was innocent, in the garden of Gethsemane. "That's what I wondered. But one He could have called for 12 legions of afternoon she told me to remain after angels to help Him, but He refused to

do so. A legion is a body of soldiers varying from 3.000 to 6.000. Twelve times 6,000 is 72,000 soldiers. How would that many angels compare to the few men who came for Jesus? 

It takes a strong man to Jesus wept, and He was the manliest man that ever lived. So it does not say, none of these things hurt me. But the Apostle had debecause she was so happy. Jesus had termined not to move from what he won the battle, and Beth had certainly believed was right. He did not count "overcome evil with good." -Sel. as we are apt to count; he did not care for ease; he did not care for his mortal life. He cared for only one thing, and that was to be loyal to Christ, to have His smile. To Paul, more than to any other man, His work was wages, His smile was heaven.

Paul corrected his statement, saying he didn't know he was the high priest. Paul had been out of town a long time.

In the council that day there were those who did not believe in a resurrection of the dead. These were the Saddu-cees. You can remember which sect believed this because this was SAD indeed. How wonderful it is to know that some day we will arise and meet our precious Lord in the air! When we die. if we are saved, our spirits will go to a resting place and our body goes back to dust. The wicked are in torment. When Jesus comes bursting through the clouds at the last day, and the trump sounds, those who have died will arise and meet Him in the air and if we are alive and are saved we will be changed in a moment, as a twinkling of an eye, and arise to meet Him, also. How wonderful that will be! I want to be like Paul and have a good conscience and be right with my Lord. I want to live with Jesus in eternity, don't you?

This lawyer wanted to get on the good side of Felix, so he could persuade him to convict Then he said that Paul was a pestilent fellow, who stirred up trouble against the government and defamed the Jewish temple. He also said that Paul was a ringleader of the Nazarenes. They supposed Jesus had been born in Nazareth, and therefore His followers as well as Himself were called Nazarenes. Of course, we know that Paul was a preacher of peace and not a trouble maker. Then it was proved in one of our former lessons that Paul did not take a Gentile into the temple as accused. (Acts 21:28, 29) He did not deny being a follower of Jesus who was called a Nazarene.

Some women there were having services down by the river. and Silas were put in prison there, but as they prayed God sent an earthquake and opened the doors. Just as the keeper of the prison started to take his own life, Paul told him the prisoners were from morning till evening. all there. The keeper got saved. Many believed on Jesus at that place. with a high fever. They hated to leave fering to Paul at Rome by Epaphroditus her, but they were all packed and ready (E-paf-ro-di-tus) who stayed awhile and helped Paul. From this time on, Billy was a different boy. He loved the Word of God and prayer. In his play, some days before, he had injured his foot. We cared for it as we always did minor hurts, and it seemed to become well again, but the wound had only healed at the surface, and it made him very ill. But throughout his illness, though Billy had formerly been a very impatient boy, he was so patient and loving that we knew Jesus was in his heart. He would often call us to prayer, leading out and calling on others to pray, and would then lead us all in repeating the Lord's prayer.

the Lord's people prayed for Billy's healing, and God would bless us and the others, also, that we were all sure God would heal our boy. However, he grew steadily worse, but no matter how ill, he never failed to call us to prayer. While he prayed for everyone, he would never pray for himself, unless he was reminded to do so, and then his only desire seemed to be to get well that he might "go to meeting and tell the folks and get them all to come to Christ and be saved."

It was heavenly to be in the room where Billy was, because Jesus was right there. One man, who heard Billy pray for him and for his family, said he would rather have heard that prayer than anything he could name.

Dear Boys and Girls:

Isn't the snow beautiful? Of course, sometimes it causes many problems to those who have to be out in it. When it starts coming down, the flakes are so pretty. I like the light fluffy snow that piles up high on every little twig and limb on the tree. It always reminds me of the precious blood of Jesus that washes away every sin in the heart. The prophet Isaiah must have been thinking of that when he said, "Though your sins be as scarlet (red), they shall be as white as the snow." (1:18) Our lesson lists a number of sins that are in peoples' lives. Not all of them are in one person's life, but some of them are in the hearts of boys and girls who are not saved. Jesus wants to cleanse us from every sin. Thank the Lord for making a way for us to be rid of sin. We couldn't do it by ourselves. Jesus is the only one who can forgive us. How wonderful it is to know that all our sins are gone.

Our lesson brings it out like changing garments or clothing. When you have been playing out in the snow on your sled, or doing farm chores such as feeding the cows, chickens, and other animals, you might get dirty and wet. It feels real good to come in and take a good bath and put on clean clothes that are dry and warm. When we come to Jesus and repent of our sins, we put off the sins we have committed and put on new ways. When a person gets saved he will live differently.

The word mortify means to destroy the strength of, which in our lesson refers to the sin in our life. Evil concupiscence means any kind of wrong desire. Blasphemy means speaking evil of sacred things. We are also to put off anger, wrath, and all evil things. We put on a new garment which is white as the snow. It is beautiful. Boys and girls who are kind, humble, meek, long-suffering with others, forgiving, and filled with love, are beautiful to watch. Their inward beauty shows in their faces. I know Jesus loves each one who has these virtues.

Paul wrote the letter from which our lesson was taken to the church at Colosse. He had helped establish it before he was sent to Rome as a prisoner. The parts of our lesson found in Philemon are part of a letter written to him from Paul. He sent the letter to Philemon by Onesimus, a slave who had run off. The slave went to Rome and there met Paul and got saved. After he got saved, he wanted to retrace his steps to clear up his life. Paul asked Philemon to treat him as a brother in Christ. That is the way we are to treat all those who are saved. —Aunt Marie



I am sure you have seen soldiers with guns marching in the army. They are following a captain who gives the orders. When he says turn, they all turn at once. They are trained so that he only speaks once and they obey instantly. He thinks for them, you might say, because they do not always know where or what they are going to do. He might say turn to the left and then they march for a while and he suddenly says turn to the right. It is not what they want to do, but what the captain wants them to do. They obey him. This is very im-When they are out on the battlefield the captain must have obedience so they can fight as a team. they did not, they could not conquer the enemy. When the captain tells them to fire, they all fire at once and that makes their bullets more effective.

Now we are in God's army if we are saved. We have on an armour, but it is different from that of the soldiers because it is a spiritual armour. We do not see our enemy because he is not flesh and blood, but he is real. enemy is the devil. We can't fight him in our own strength. We must have on the Christian armour. First, we must have our sins forgiven and be saved. We must have our hearts and lives clean. When this is done, we have on the "breastplate of righteousness." Then we need to have the shield of faith to use. We must get this faith from God. We must believe that God will help us in times of need. When the devil tries to get us to do wrong, we pray with faith to God and God will be our shield. He will stand between us and the devil. Now we need a sword and that is the "Sword of the Spirit" which is the Word of God. We should learn Bible verses so we can use them against the devil. having done all, to stand.

Jesus used Bible verses when He fought the devil. We are told about it in the fourth chapter of Matthew. Our ways of fighting are different from those who are not saved. One Bible verse tells us to do good to them who despitefully use us. That is another part of the spiritual Christian armour in use. The good you do will be like a sword. It will cut deeply into their hearts and they will know you are different from others. Only God can help you to do good to those who do you wrong.

Be sure to think about the other pieces of this Christian armour and have them on, ready to use as Jesus is our Captain in our army and He wants us to obey Him when He speaks. Then we can be overcomers and be ready for heaven.

Paul wrote the letter, parts of which are in our lesson, to the Ephesians. It was delivered by Tychimus to them. Later Paul was tried by Nero in Rome and released. He was to stay that winter in Necopolis, Macedonia.
