TEACHER'S NOTES

JUNIORS

(Please share with all teachers using the Junior Beautiful Way lessons.)

This set of lessons will be taken mostly from the first part of Acts. We will learn about Jesus' promise of the Holy Spirit, read about it being inaugurated on the day of Pentecost, note the changes it made in Apostle Peter, watch it convict unbelievers and see the rapid growth of the Church. We will see it reveal the secret of an untruthful man and his wife, then again watch the once cowardly Peter speaking boldly in defense of Christ. Lesson thirteen will be a review of the twelve previous lessons.

The Holy Spirit is God in us. Children need God in them as well as adults. They are not always able to understand a lot about the Holy Spirit, but that is not necessary. They need the Holy Spirit to be their comfort, their leader, and to teach them how to choose between the good and the evil. Many times things may appear fine to the natural mind, when really there is hidden danger to the soul. The presence of the Holy Spirit in the life will enable even a child to understand these hidden dangers and have grace to avoid them. Encourage the students to

seek God for the Holy Spirit.

Older children can be hindered in their Christian life by not receiving the power of the Holy Spirit when they really need it. One of the important duties of the Holy Spirit is to cleanse. Matthew 3:11, 12 reads, ". . . He shall baptize you with fire: Whose fan is in his hand, and he will throughly purge his floor, and gather the wheat into the garner; but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire." The Holy Spirit is ready to cleanse the inner foe of any individual who realizes they have a foe. Children who are struggling to live for God and find that something about their own selves is keeping them from acting the way they think they should, are realizing the inner foe. Sometimes when they continue to struggle for a long length of time, they become discouraged and decide that living for God isn't worth the struggle. Teach them that God will cleanse this inner foe if they will surrender to Him.

Many children around the ages of ten through fifteen are choosing role models. They are role-playing - many of them in classroom situations, others more or less in play, but none-the-less forming values. They are thinking about who they want to be like or what they will be in life. This then, is a good time to teach them of their responsibility to surrender their lives completely to God, so He can guide them in making these choices. When they are willing to surrender everything about themselves to God, and have seen their need of victory over the

inner foe, they are ready to receive the Holy Spirit in their lives.

These instructions, if followed, should help more of our children to live steady lives for God. Why should they stray away from God (their helper) and turn from the teachings of the Bible and then come to adult years without wisdom and strength to make good decisions for their life? If endowed with the Holy Spirit during teenage years, he or she will make better decisions for life and thus have a better environment in which to continue growing in the Lord. Environment (especially home environment) is very important for continued spiritual growth. Adults base their spiritual growth many times on ideas formed while young and many create their future home environments by decisions made while teenagers. How very important it is for children to have a complete experience with the Lord when young!

Never discourage a child from seeking for salvation or the Holy Spirit, by telling them they are too young, or that they are already saved. Take time with them. Ask a few questions. Pray with the child. They may know more about

themselves and God than you realize. —Sis. Charlotte

July 3, 1988 The Promise Of The Holy Spirit

Scripture references: John 14:15-26, 16:7: Luke 11:9-13: Acts 1:4-8.

Jesus promises His disciples and all believers an abiding Comforter. This Comforter is to cleanse the root of sin from the heart. It is to teach, bring things to our remembrance and endow us with power. What great promises are ours in this experience with God!

God's plan in the Gospel Era is not that people continue in sin as they did under the Mosaic law. He sent the Holy Spirit on occasions in those times, but today He freely gives this wonderful Spirit to those who have obedient love and surrender all to His will. The Holy Spirit will cleanse every sin from the heart and give power to live a pure, sinless life.

It is very important that children also surrender to God's will and receive the Comforter in their lives.

July 10, 1988 Understanding Pentecost

Scripture references: Acts 2:1-15; Lev. 23:15, 16.

In this lesson we learn about Pentecost before Christ; the Pentecost fifty days after Christ's Resurrection and ten days after His Ascension to heaven; and our relationship with today's Pentecostal churches. Pentecost is the birthday of the Church of God. It is the day when Jesus and God in the form of the Holy Spirit came to abide in the clean hearts of surrendered believers. What a great day!

We believe in this day, just as it was, nothing added. It was not a day of mass confusion of speeches without meaning but a day of edification for the new Church. It was a day when people of at least fourteen different languages and dialects heard the gospel story clearly in their own language, from unlearned men who were filled with the Holy Ghost. Neither were those who kept silent excluded from the blessing of the Holy Spirit, they were all filled.

According to some historians, speaking in unknown tongues was practiced among pagan worshippers before Christ. It is hardly, then, an evidence that one is filled with the Holy Spirit. Living a sinless life, however is evidence that the Holy Spirit is within that human, for without this power it is impossible for any human to live without sinning.

July 17, 1988 How Peter Changed

Scripture references: John 13:37, 18:10-27; Acts 2:4, 4:18, 19, 5:17-29.

The Holy Spirit gave Peter the boldness that he had lacked. He was no more afraid of men nor of suffering at their hands. Peter however, had his same quick, strong personality. He seemed to have been one of those "born leaders." He was still a strong leader after being filled with the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit is God in us, a constant comfort and strength and cleansing agent that purifies the "old man" and continues purifying us through life, but it does not rid us of our own personality. Children need to understand this, for the devil will sometimes cause people to think they are not filled with the HOLY Spirit, when they still are faced with personality problems. Instruct the children to not expect the Holy Spirit to make a superman out of them.

July 24, 1988 Peter's First Sermon

Scripture references: Acts 2:13-36.

In Peter's first sermon, he defends the disciples and tells those listeners who were participants in Jesus' crucifixion that they are guilty before God and must repent. He also gives them hope by quoting the words of the prophet Joel, "Whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord, shall be saved."

What were they to be saved from? "The blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth from all sin." "Whosoever abideth in him sinneth not: whosoever sinneth hath not seen him, neither known him." "He that committeth sin is of the devil." "Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin." (Taken from 1 John).

Instruct the children that the Holy Spirit will give power to keep us from sinning.

July 31, 1988 3000 People Are Saved

Scripture references: Acts 2:36-47.

In this lesson we see the Holy Spirit at work convicting the wicked men who crucified Jesus. Yes, the Holy Spirit is willing and ready to convict even the most vile sinner if they do not blaspheme this precious spirit. Not one soul has ever, nor ever will, come to Christ for salvation unless the Holy Spirit does His work of convicting.

Just as the Spirit is faithful to convict sinners, so He is faithful to be always with those who keep themselves

surrendered to God.

The Holy Spirit is the working element in the Church that causes both the growth and establishment of believers.

August 7, 1988 Peter Shares With A Lame Man

Scripture references: Acts 3:1-6.

Sharing is an ordinary way of life for the Christian, but many are being cheated out of blessings because they feel financially unable to give. Peter was financially unable to help the lame man, but he gave to him something much more valuable than money.

Sharing can be developed as a habit. The younger a child gets into this habit, the happier he will be. "Let's Talk" has several suggestions for things besides money which can be shared. Encourage your class to think of many more. Remind them often to keep sharing by asking what they have shared lately. A teacher could keep a chart in the classroom and note unusual things that the students have shared. Stress that money or things that money can buy are only a small part of things to be shared.

August 14, 1988 The Holy Spirit Is A Deliverer

Scripture references: Acts 3:12-26, 4:1-4. Christ was the Prophet like Moses in that Moses was the deliverer of the Israelite people from the bondage of world from the hondage of sin and the devil.

Moses could not have delivered those people if they had not followed his instructions; neither can Jesus deliver us today unless we follow His instructions.

Some of Jesus' instructions are very hard to follow. For the carnal mind it is impossible. Those who are willing to obey Jesus need to seek for an infilling of the Holy Spirit to have power on hand to do as Jesus commanded. The disciples were able to keep all of Jesus' commandments and this was making such a stir in the hearts of others that there were five thousand followers of Christ in just a few days after Pentecost.

August 21, 1988 The Holy Spirit Keeps Peter Honest

Scripture references: Acts 4:1-14.

Being honest is very important. It will help a man on his job, a woman with her work, and children to benefit more from their lessons. To the Christian it is not only a help, it is the only way of being a Christian. A person never can get saved unless he is honest and admits his sins and his responsibility before God. A person may say he is a Christian, but he really isn't one unless he is honest.

I am not saying that children, and even adults who are babes in Christ. will not occasionally fail as Peter did in the garden of Gethsemane. However, all these failures must be repented of for the doer to continue on with Christ. A weak believer, especially children, may have an honest heart, and fail sometimes. The Holy Spirit will teach the weak one how to get victory over these weaknesses.

August 28, 1988 Why Peter Was Bold

Scripture references: Acts 4:15-37.

Total dependence upon God is a necessity for a successful life for God. The Holy Spirit oftentimes must show us our inabilities. Everyone must keep the slavery; Jesus is the deliverer of the ! Holy Spirit in the heart and rely upon it at all times—that is dependence upon God. Life isn't all smooth sailing just because the Holy Spirit has come into the heart. Although filled with the Spirit, the disciples were still human and felt fear. Some young people confuse natural human feelings with the carnal nature. There is a difference. The carnal nature will draw toward sin. Human feelings such as fear, unhappiness, etc., cause the Spirit-filled person to draw nearer to God.

Peter, John, nor any of the other Apostles or disciples could have been so bold in the face of danger if they had not been depending upon God.

September 4, 1988 Dishonesty Doesn't Pay

Scripture references: Acts 4:32-37, 5:1-11.

Some parents have been careful to teach their children to be honest, which is very good, Some have punished them for dishonest behavior and the children are honest because they fear punishment. All this is very good, for dishonesty is always punished, if not sooner, then later.

Some children, however, get the idea that only dishonesty that is caught is punished, therefore some develop habits of being secretly dishonest. Being dishonest to God falls in this category, and spiritual problems will inevitably follow.

Ananias and Sapphira are good examples of secret dishonesty being punished.

September 11, 1988 The Good And Bad Of It

Scripture references: Acts 5:12-28. The Apostles were completely clean of every sin and attitude that would hinder God from working, so God worked in a mighty way, and the temple rulers wanted very badly to stop it.

The Holy Spirit gives victory over attitudes as well as sin. If juniors are having trouble with attitudes, they need to surrender to God and seek for the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is what you call a "cure all," but it never intrudes over private desires.

September 18, 1988 Beaten And Released

Scripture References: Acts 5:29-42.

Peter and the other Apostles were happy to be counted worthy to suffer for Jesus. There was no resentment, self-pity, questioning, nor murmuring in their attitude. The Holy Spirit so filled their hearts that the beating seemed nothing when compared with the glory they felt in their soul.

Being chosen of God to suffer for Him is many times the way God has of getting His children in the right place and attitude so they can bring others to Him.

September 25, 1988 The Blessings Of The Holy Spirit

Scripture reference: Review of the first five chapters of Acts and John 14.

The Holy Spirit was promised and came on the Day of Pentecost. From that day forward, it has been filling believers who present their bodies in living sacrifice, holy acceptable unto God, which is their reasonable service.

It has no respect of age, social standing, or race. "Whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved." "Repent and be baptized and ye shall receive the Holy Ghost." "The promise is unto you and to your children."

MEMORY VERSE

For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence.

Acts 1:5.



"I will send you a Comforter," Jesus said to His disciples after they had finished eating supper. Jesus knew He was soon to be killed. He had told them in no uncertain terms that this was their last meal together. Of course they were all feeling very sad, that is, all except Judas, who had just sneaked out to betray Jesus in exchange for thirty pieces of silver.

"We cannot always be together," Jesus said, "but the Comforter will be in each of you wherever you must go."

"Why is it that you will come to only us and not to the world?" a disciple asked.

"We will abide only in those who love us," Jesus answered. "The world shows by not obeying God that they do not love us, nor want us in their heart. You love and obey us, and the Holy Spirit will help you to continue obeying, by teaching you and bringing to your remembrance things that will be of help. You need only to love me and obey my commandments and ask for this Comforter and you will receive it. My Father is ready to give it just as good parents are to give gifts to their children."

Jesus' last words to His disciples were, "Stay at Jerusalem until you receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit which I have told you about. Remember, John baptized you with water, but you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit in a few days. After you are baptized with this Spirit you will receive power. Then you shall testify of me to the people in Jerusalem, and other cities around, and even to those in the farthest and most remote parts of the earth."

Jesus felt it very important that the disciples be baptized with the Holy Spirit. I am sure He feels it very important that you and I also receive a baptism of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

What is meant by a baptism of the Holy Spirit? We have learned from the Bible verses, that the Holy Spirit is Jesus and His Father, God in another form. When the Holy Spirit comes to live in a heart, God and Jesus are also present in that person. God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit are three and yet one. Remember Jesus said, "I will not leave you comfortless, I will come unto you." John 14:18.

Most people think of baptism as some ritual using water that connects the baptized person with a church. God started baptism by sending John to baptize those who were sorry for their sins. In other words those being baptized were sorry about their sinful actions, and ready for God to cleanse away their sins. If someone came who was not sorry about their evil ways. John did not baptize them. John also said that Jesus would baptize, not with water, but with the Holy Ghost and that He (Jesus) would throughly purge his floor. (Matt. 3:7-12). God forgave people of their sins who came for John's baptism, but the floor of their hearts were not completely clean until the time they would receive the Holy Spirit

The baptism of the Holy Spirit cleans the heart of inner problems of sin that repentance does not. If any reader has discovered that inner problems are keeping you from doing the things you feel are right, surrender to God and seek to be filled with the Holy Spirit. The work of the Holy Spirit is to: 1. cleanse, 2. comfort, 3. teach, 4. bring things to our remembrance. We all need that, right?

Jesus promised it to all those who love Him enough to obey him. "I will give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever," Jesus said in John 14:16.

Drinks, soft drinks of all kinds containing sugar.


Deep fried vegetables, meats and breads, french fries, donuts, etc.

To the Christians of the early Church, Pentecost was the most glorious of all days! Parents and Grandparents told and retold the following story of the first Pentecost after Jesus ascended.

"Jesus had been crucified, sure, but He came back to life and spent the next making miraculous davs appearances first one place and then another. But everyone who loved Him lived in constant fear that they had seen Him for the last time. One of the times He was with the disciples. He strictly charged them not to leave Jerusalem until they were baptized with the Holy Spirit. They hardly knew what He meant by being baptized with the Holy Spirit, but they wanted to be obedient so they waited at Jerusalem for ten days after Jesus had left them for good.

"The tenth day was the Hebrew Feast of Pentecost, Jews from almost every nation under heaven had arrived for the great day. Many of these people could not speak nor understand the language spoken at Jerusalem.

"The disciples were not very interested in the festival. They met to pray together. Their spirits were so united, it was like one man praying. Suddenly a sound from heaven like a roaring wind filled the room and each one knew that he had been filled with the power of God! Now they understood about being baptized with the Holy Spirit!

"Soon crowds that had gathered for the Pentecost festival heard what was happening among the disciples and came to see for themselves. The disciples were so happy about it that they began telling these men. In an instant the disciples were speaking not their own language, but the language of the listener. Now remember, there were people "out of every nation under heaven." I believe fourteen are named. What

a noise it must have been with so many talking at the same time in fourteen different languages!

"Some scoffers said, "These men are drunk.' Peter then stood up to explain what was going on and the strangest of all things took place. As Peter spoke everyone listening heard him in their own native language. What a great day that was!"

What does Pentecost mean to people today? It is still seven weeks after Easter and is celebrated by both Jews and Christians. On this day Christians remember the descent of the Holy Spirit on the disciples. The unbelieving Jews celebrate the day in much the same way the Jews did in Jesus' time.

Pentecostal is a word pertaining to Pentecost that is common today. You probably heard it. Perhaps have asked. "Are someone has Pentecostal?" or "Is the church where you go Pentecostal?" A church is considered to be pentecostal if teaches that the proof of a person being filled with the Holy Spirit is that he in an unknown Speaking strange words or phrases in prayer or testimony to him is a sign that he is filled with the Holy Spirit.

Is this the proof? No, for the Bible has only three records of people speaking in tongues (unknown languages) when they were filled with the Holy Spirit. Of all the other thousands who were filled, there is no proof that they spoke in tongues. The best evidence that one is filled with the Holy Spirit is the Spirit in the heart. This is shown by the holy way a Holy Spirit-filled person acts.

We believe in Pentecost just as it happened, but not that everyone baptized with the Holy Spirit is given the gift of tongues.

The Scripture reading is the story of what took place right after the disciples were baptized with the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. People from many different nations were at Jerusalem on that day and when they heard about the disciples receiving the Holy Spirit, they came to see what was happening. Immediately the Apostles began preaching to them about Christ. The unusual thing that happened was that people from many different languages heard words in their own native tongue. It seems that part of the time the Apostles were speaking languages they had never known. At other times something else was happening, like when Peter spoke, the people of different nations each heard his words in their own language. I don't believe that Peter spoke each word many times in each of the different languages that were represented that day. It was an unusual miracle where God caused each one to hear words in their own language instead of the Greek words which Peter was speak-

Peter tells these people the good news, that they can be saved. It is just like the prophet Joel said, "Whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved." "This Lord who will save those who call on Him, is the man Jesus, Peter told them. "He has been here with us doing many wonders and miracles, but for envy, your wicked hands have crucified Him. Death could not hold Him, though, for He has power over everything in the universe, even death." He is the only man who has been able to resurrect Himself. Great King David did a lot of things, but he couldn't do that! He knew however that someone in his family would be able to do it. He even spoke about it in his Psalms. He said, "Thou shalt not suffer thy Holy One to see corruption." In other words Jesus' body would not decay like other bodies do after people die. Yes, Jesus has power over death. He is the only prophet or religious leader who has such power.

Twelve major religions are practiced in the world today. Each of them includes various groups that may practice their religion in different ways. But all have certain basic beliefs, traditions. and philosophies. These twelve major religions are Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, Confucianism, Taoism, Shinto, Sikhism, Zoroastrianism, and Humanism, Of course there are many more minor religions. Of all these many religions and their sects, only Christians boast a founder who has power over death, was resurrected and today, is a living Saviour for His followers. Only Christians have a living Saviour. Only people who are truly born again children of God experience the joys of this living Saviour. Only those who are filled with the Holy Spirit have the presence of this living Saviour with them all the time, to comfort, lead, teach and bring to remembrance all things that they need to know so that they may moment by moment live without sinning.

know how. Sometimes I come home with a heavy heart, when I should be happy because the meeting has been a success for your father."

"Jesus was sometimes sad too," Nancy added. "He wanted to help and protect the children like a hen cares for her chicks, but they would not come to Him, and that made Jesus sad."

David had been listening, and praying for God to help him know what to say. Finally he said, "Jesus said that the Holy Spirit would teach us all things and also give us power. The Holy Spirit will teach you what to say to other hurting people. It will also give you boldness to speak so you can share with others what you have learned. Have you received the Holy Spirit since you got sayed?"

"I thought I received it when I repented of the evil I had done, like accusing Mrs. Hardin of stealing my ring, and for being so proud, etc."

"We're all learning, aren't we, Mother? I thought I was the best Christian in the town until Steven came along and we started trying to do only what Jesus would do, then I found out that I wasn't even saved. She explained her idea of challenging the women to save money by shopping more wisely for food, and with the money saved, starting a fund for the poor.


Pastor White suggested she invite the women to her home on Tuesday.

This is the third lesson about what happened on the day the disciples were baptized with the Holy Spirit. First the disciples were filled with Holy Spirit and people from many nations who were already at Jerusalem came to the disciples and heard about salvation through Jesus. Because of the many different languages being spoken, the excitement and praising of God, the disciples were accused of being drunk. Lesson two was Peter's sermon. In it he told the people about what was going on. The lesson today is the end of Peter's message.

Peter is bold to tell his listeners that they are guilty before God for having Jesus killed. Peter's message made them realize that they needed to change their ways. They cried out, "What must we do?"

Peter told them to repent and be baptized and they would also receive this wonderful gift of the Holy Spirit. Many people repented and were baptized. What a full day the disciples had. Some Bible historians believe that not only Peter but all the Apostles were preaching to groups of people. Each may have been speaking in a different language as the Holy Spirit directed them.

The Bible does not say how many disciples were awaiting that morning to receive the Holy Spirit. There were 120 of them together when they elected a man name Matthias, to be an Apostle in place of Judas. All of these 120 may have been there on the day of Pentecost, at nine o'clock in the morning when the Holy Spirit came. That evening when the people were counted who had repented and accepted Jesus as their Saviour, the number of the disciples had grown to 3000!

The Holy Spirit of God was working in many hearts. The disciples were not afraid, to tell the people that they were guilty of crucifying Jesus. The Holy Spirit gave them this boldness. The disciples knew that there were some men listening who could have also had them killed. The Holy Spirit was workin the minds of the listeners, helping them to see that Jesus was the real Saviour and that they needed forgiveness for not only killing Him, but for many other sins.

It is the Holy Spirit that helps every man understand the things of God. Even though a person is not a believer, this Holy Spirit causes a person to think and feel his need for a Saviour. The Spirit does not stay all the time with that person, but it comes to him at different times, and causes that person to think about God.

After a believer has surrendered himself and all he has to God and the Holy Spirit comes into his heart, it is there to stay. (Jesus said. "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee.) This Holy Spirit. which is another form of God, has a lot of work to do for that person. First it cleanses the heart from the root of sin that so often causes the believer to return to sin. Then it teaches that person how to think and act in ways pleasing to God. It must comfort, when the heart is sad. It must guide that person down the trail of life. Sometimes it must perfect the believer of ways that are not pleasing to God. Yes, the Holy Spirit has a lot to do in the believers' heart, but He will never leave the believer alone, as long as the believer keeps surrendered to God.

Jesus told the disciples to wait for the promise of the Holy Spirit. He knew they needed it, and so does everyone.

learn to enjoy them."


"You will," Dad assured David, "and always remember, to be a good man you must learn to be happy with what your wife cooks. Not all women are good cooks like your mother."

Use some of your time listening to someone who needs to talk. People who live alone, have a great need for someone to listen to them. It isn't hard work, it just takes a little patience and an unselfish heart. Our strength is another thing that can be shared. Some people are weak, too weak to lift things that don't seem heavy at all to you. Some cannot carry out their trash. Some may just be very tired, and lending a hand would be a great help to them. Your eyes are something else which are valuable and can be shared. You may read to someone who cannot see very well, or cannot read. Share those eyes which God gave to you. Sometimes we can also cheerfully share our Mother or Daddy with someone who needs them or it may be a brother, sister or friend that you can share. Always do it with a smile and you will get a blessing for it. There are many, many more things that you may share.

To understand this lesson, let's talk just a little about what happened before. As Peter and John went into the temple one afternoon, a beggar asked for help. Peter took the man by the hand and lifted him to his feet saying, "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk." The man, who had never before walked, leaped up and began praising God for healing. He must have shouted loud enough to be heard all over the temple, for soon a great crowd gathered to see what was going on.

The lesson today is about what hap-

pened next.

Peter saw this was a good chance to preach Jesus. He said, "Why look at us so strange, as if we, by our own magical power have made this man well. This man is healed through faith in the name of Jesus. Yes, through the name of Jesus, the man who you denied when Pilate wanted to let Him go. Now I know you were ignorant and did not realize what you were doing, but just the same it was evil. You must repent of this and plead for God to change your hearts and erase these sins. Remember Moses said that God would raise up a prophet much like himself and that everyone who would not listen to this prophet should be destroyed. Repent then, and He will bless you and turn everyone of you away from sin," Peter told them.

A lot of men felt convicted by the Holy Spirit. So they repented and accepted Jesus as that prophet sent from God which Moses spoke about. Two thousand more people joined themselves to the followers of Jesus. This made the number around five thousand. How big the Church had grown in just a few days after that first Pentecost when the Holy Spirit had filled the disciples!

Now let's think about what Moses meant when he said that God would raise up a prophet (Jesus) like unto himself. Both Moses and Jesus were humble men much like other ordinary men of the day. They were chosen of God to lead the people, but they did not look and act like other leaders. They were not proud, rich, showy looking men. Both were born very humble and were almost destroyed in early childhood.

But how were their works for God alike? Moses was the deliverer of the Israelite people from the bondage of slavery in Egypt. Jesus is the Saviour of the world to deliver everyone from the bondage of sin and eternal death. Just as the Israelite people had to obey Moses to be delivered, so people today, must obey Jesus' teachings to be delivered from eternal death.

Is it possible to do all of the things that Jesus said? How about this one? "I say unto you, That ye resist not evil: but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also. And if any man will sue thee at the law, and take away thy coat, let him have thy cloak also." Matt. 5: 39, 40. Does it sound awfully hard? Yes, it does, and most people would not be able to do it: neither was Peter able, until the Holy Spirit came into his heart. Remember when Jesus and Peter were in the garden and Peter used his sword on a man? One cannot act as Jesus taught unless the Holy Spirit has cleansed his heart and is controlling his actions.

Each one knelt on the patio. Jake, Nancy, Bert and Mrs. Poline prayed outloud, one at a time, while the others prayed silently.



The priests and other men did not know that Jesus had sent the Holy Spirit into Peter's and John's hearts. Having the Holy Spirit is like having Jesus not as a man standing beside you, but like having Him as God living right inside, giving you power to speak the truth at all times even when speaking the truth could mean trouble for you.

Have you ever wanted to tell a lie because you knew telling the truth might get you in trouble? Did you weaken and tell a lie? Sometimes people who don't have the Holy Spirit, do weaken and tell lies. When the Holy Spirit is in the heart, it will give strength to tell the truth just as it gave Peter strength to tell the truth.

Peter was very bold after the Holy Spirit had come into him, but we must not think that Peter went around like a big bully, nor did he have a "know it all" attitude. Peter and all the Apostles felt a great need of God. I believe they felt more the need for Him after being filled with the Holy Spirit than before, because then, they understood more about Him.

The authorities who had imprisoned Peter and John overnight, were afraid the people would dislike them if they punished Peter and John, so they only threatened them and commanded that they not speak about Jesus nor teach in His name.

These men of authority were the religious leaders of the country of Israel. They believed in God and taught the people to obey God's commandments. One of God's commandments reads like this: "Thou shalt not bear false witness."

How could Peter obey this commandment and not tell the truth about Jesus? Jesus had risen again. He had healed the multitudes of sick folks, and done many other wonders. Peter asked, "Is it right in the sight of God to obey you or to obey God? I must be a true witness to obey God. Everyone is asking if Jesus rose from death, and if He is the Saviour. If I say I don't know, that would be a false witness. We know He is alive and is the Saviour."

The authorities threatened them again and let them go.

They did not leave laughing and joking about how they had got the best of the authorities. They went away with a prayer of thanksgiving in their hearts that God had protected them.

They went to the group of other disciples and told them all that had happened. When the other disciples "heard that, they lifted up their voice to God with one accord, and said. Lord thou

This prayer shows us that the Apostles and disciples were bold because God helped them to be bold. They knew they needed help to be brave and faithful through suffering. God had already taught this to Peter and John, so they prayed together with the other disciples for courage and boldness to continue witnessing for Jesus, so does every person need to continually pray for help, even after the Holy Spirit is in the heart.

The Holy Spirit in the heart will give power everyday if that heart surrenders again everyday to God and seeks for His help.

MEMORY VERSE

When thou vowest a vow unto God. . .pay that which thou hast vowed. Better is it that thou shouldest not vow, than that thou shouldest vow and not pay. Eccl. 5:4, 5.



How would you like for someone to promise you a birthday cake and give you a little cupcake instead? How would you like for a friend to promise to help you with some difficult homework and then brag about helping you when he or she hadn't helped?

That is kind of like what Ananias and his wife Sapphira did to God. They had something for sale, and together promised to give the money to the Apostles. This was their way of giving it to God. After it was sold, they discussed the matter and decided to take part of the money to the Apostles and pretend it was all they had received. "We will both tell Peter we sold it for this much." they said to each other.

Some people find it easy to lie to God. One reason for this is that promises made to God are many times a secret between only them and God. No one knows what the promise is, so no one, except Holy Spirit filled people, ever know if the promise is kept. There is no embarrassment or humiliation because no one knows that it has not been kept.

Another reason it is easy for some people to be dishonest to God, is that they believe that God's love makes Him an easy pushover - just treat Him any way, break your promise, transgress His laws or whatever and He will still love and forgive. We all know that some people will not be our friends long if we don't keep our promises to them, but people believe that God is different. He always loves. This idea about God is a very dangerous one. God is love, but He also knows everything and He loves everyone, and for this reason, sometimes, His love causes Him to punish. You may wonder why God punished Ananias so severely for what he did. It may seem to you that God was unjust, however no one really knows all the other evil things that Ananias and his wife may have been doing. Another thought is that God made a public example out of these two unworthy people so that the whole Church could see His displeasure on hypocrisy and dishonesty. By letting these two die, many, many, more may have been spared from living deceitful and dishonest lives which could have caused many more to be lost.

The memory verse reads, "Pay that which thou hast vowed. Better is it that thou shouldest not vow, than that thou shouldest vow and not pay." A vow is a solemn promise to God. It is better to not make promises or vows to God when excited or in a hurry. Promises should be made when the body is calm and the mind clear of excitement. Another verse reads like this, "Be not rash with thy mouth, and let not thine heart be hasty to utter any thing before God." Remember, VOWS are to be kept, so make them carefully and keep them surely.

A wedding promise is a vow which each of you will probably make sometime in your life. Many wedding vows end with these words, "till death do we part." Once this promise is made, you are responsible to keep it. If you break it, God will punish you some way or another.

Get the Holy Spirit in your heart by surrendering everything to God and ask God to keep it fresh in your heart. It will give you power to be honest to God and keep all the promises made to Him.

Any time you feel like being lazy or dishonest and not keeping a promise to God, just remember what happened to Ananias and Sapphira.

MEMORY VERSE

There came also a multitude . . . bringing sick folks, and them which were vexed with unclean spirits: and they were healed every one. Acts 5:16.



The Holy Spirit had cleansed every bit of sin from the Apostles' hearts. It also corrected any attitudes that would have hindered God in working through them. Several times before the Holy Spirit filled their hearts, they showed poor attitudes. Let us look at some of these: 1. They argued about who was greatest in the kingdom of God. 2. Selfishness had created other problems. One mother asked Jesus if her sons, James and John could sit on either side of Him in His kingdom. Not only did the mother want this position for her sons, but they also wanted it. When Jesus asked if they were able to earn the place, they answered, "We are able." Besides having a selfish attitude, they 3. showed pride in themselves and 4. a self-sufficient or independent attitude. With the Holy Spirit in their hearts, they knew they could do nothing without God, and with Him they could do all things. They were selling lands and houses and giving it unselfishly to the poor who were in need of daily food.

5. Another poor attitude showed up when John and James asked Jesus, "Shall we command fire to come down from heaven, and consume them?" (Luke 8:51-56). At this time Jesus had sent John and James to Samaria to find a place (probably food and lodging) as they traveled to Jerusalem. The people of that village refused. The disciple's attitude was to hurt those who hurt them: Jesus said to them. "You know not what manner of spirit ye are of." It was not the Holy Spirit.

The Apostles had enough faith to believe that at their command fire would come out of heaven and destroy those people who would not accept Jesus. Jesus, however, would not let them use this powerful faith they possessed. After they were filled with the Holy Spirit, they had right attitudes, so Jesus let them use their faith. Peter said to the

lame man, "Such as I have give I thee." This was the first of a multitude of healings that God allowed.

Immediately after this miracle, the Apostle's attitudes were tested. They were thrown in jail, and threatened. Peter boldly told the people that they were guilty of crucifying the Son of God and therefore they were in trouble with God, but he added, "I know that through ignorance ve did it, as did also your rulers." Peter did not say this to them because he was angry or to accuse, but that they might see how they needed to repent of this wickedness. This attitude is quite different from the one they had when they asked about commanding fire from heaven to destroy men who had done them a minor injustice.

Neither were there deceitful or hypocritical attitudes among the group of disciples, for Ananias and Sapphira had been struck dead when acting the hypocrite and all who were not totally honest were afraid to join the followers.

The Holy Spirit had changed those wrong attitudes of the Apostles. Now God could work, and that is just what He did. All the sick were healed. If the shadow of Peter fell on the sick, it encouraged their faith in Jesus so much, that they too, were healed.

While God worked wonders through the Apostles, the rulers persecuted them.

Peter and the other Apostles had been put in jail for preaching. An angel had opened the prison door and let them go. The next morning they were again found preaching in the temple. The priests, Sadducees and Pharisees brought them before a council to decide what should be done with them, for multitudes, upon multitudes were leaving the Jewish religion and following Jesus with the disciples.

This was the second time the Apostles had been thrown in jail, and commanded to not speak about Jesus. When asked why they disobeyed, they answered, "We ought to obey God rather than man."

How about you, don't you think each of us should obey God rather than man?

There was one man, a doctor of the law, who thought the Apostles should be released. "If it is not of God, there will soon be nothing left of it. If it is of God, it will grow no matter what we do against it," he said.

The Apostles were beaten and released. They did not leave feeling angry, or sorry for themselves. They left feeling happy that God had counted them worthy to suffer for Jesus.

Yes, they had to be worthy to suffer for Jesus. God doesn't choose just any person to be His witness through suffering. He chooses only those who are clean, and filled with the Holy Spirit. People that are clean and filled with the Holy Spirit are special people to God. Those are the kind He wants to use. Sometimes He chooses to use those persons, by healing the sick when they lay on hands, or He might use them for some other spectacular thing. There are other times when God chooses to use the clean, Holy Spirit filled person to suffer for Him.

I just read about Victor Walter, a Christian prisoner in the U.S.S.R. A violent murderer, Alek Armalov, was placed in the cell with him. Instead of being afraid of the violent murderer, he spoke to Alek with love about Jesus. Alek responded to Victor's witnessing and repented of his evil actions, and God saved him. Now the two men have Christian fellowship.

Victor was very much like Peter. He was chosen to suffer for Jesus. He did it faithfully and with boldness. The Holy Spirit knew who should be chosen to suffer in the prison cell, so that Alek could be brought into the kingdom of God.

Christian reader, are you willing to suffer for Jesus? Are you willing to say, "No," when your friends ask you to do wrong with them? Are you willing to speak up for Christianity when others are talking evil about it? Are you willing to continue dressing and acting different from most of the people around you? The Holy Spirit will make you willing to not only suffer for Christ, but to be happy about it.

Suffering for Christ is kind of like bitter-sweet candy. It has some bitterness, like pain, ridicule, loss of some things we enjoyed, etc., but together with the bitterness, there is sweetness. The sweetness is the wonderful inner feeling of peace, security, and a mind without doubt.



Some was saved by changing to better eating habits: others by changing habits of living that were not what they thought Jesus would do if He were here. David, Nancy and Mrs. Powell had kept up the gardening and house cleaning to earn money to give. Jeannie's dad had given what he called a "payment" on the amount he expected to pay in hospital and doctor bills if Jeannie had not been healed.

"I think we should ask our parents how to use this money wisely," Sandy had said in the last meeting. "Maybe we could invite them to our next meeting."

The parents were invited, and most of them came. Pastor and Mrs. White came with Bert, and Mr. and Mrs. Wilshire with Sandy. Mr. and Mrs. Powell, Mr. and Mrs. Shoor, Mrs. Meed, Mr. and Mrs. Smith, and Sarah's mother, Mrs. Jinks. Two Mrs. Hardins came: Jake's and Harvey's mother, and John's mother. It was the first time Jake's mother had been to the Powell's home since the ring was stolen. Big Mrs. Gray came with Tony, and Sid's mother, who was studying to become a teacher, had a

class she could not miss, so she had persuaded his dad, Mr. Speaks to come.

Pastor White was asked to open the meeting which he did by saying, "Let us turn to page 239 in *Evening Light Songs*, and sing, 'Take My Life and Let It Be,' then we will pray."

After prayer Mrs. Powell again explained the project. She said, "I understand that half of the people in the world are hungry, and that each minute, around twenty children die somewhere of starvation. I felt that if we were doing what Jesus would do, we would do something about these starving children. MEMORY VERSE

But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you. Acts 1:8.



This lesson is a review of the twelve previous lessons. Each lesson told something about the Holy Spirit. In the first one we read about Jesus promising to send the Holy Spirit to comfort, teach and bring to remembrance all that Jesus had taught them.

Jesus kept His promise and sent the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. On Spirit that day the came miraculous way. With the Holy Spirit came the ability to speak in languages unknown to the speaker. The Apostles were able to witness to people that spoke different languages who were visiting at Jerusalem that day. There are two other places in the book of Acts which describe the Holy Spirit coming in this same way accompanied by people able to speak in unknown being tongues. The other times when the Holy Spirit came into mens hearts, they did not speak in tongues.

How does a person know if the Holy Spirit has come into his heart? The Holy Spirit in the heart makes changes in attitudes and behavior. It can also be felt, but depending only on feelings is not good.

You probably remember how wonderfully clean you felt when Jesus forgave your sins, but you were still saved after the brightness of that wonderful feeling had faded away. Although the peace and assurance still remained in your heart, the "high" was not there, but you were still forgiven and saved.

Noting changes in behavior is a surer way of knowing if the Holy Spirit is in a heart. In your own self you will also note changes in your thoughts, and your desire to please God will be stronger. Peter had boldness and courage to never again deny Jesus. Peter was naturally a strong man, and the Holy Spirit gave him strength to be the person he really was cut out to be. It will make you the person God has

designed you to be. It will make you able to use the talents and strengths that God has given to you, and that is another reason why it is so important.

You have probably heard people say about someone, "He's all mixed up." When children refuse to listen and obey the Holy Spirit of God when it trys to guide them, they get confused. At first the confusion within the mind may not affect the person's behavior very much. The confusion, however, can and many times will become more dense as the person grows older until his or her behavior gets farther and farther away from God, and sometimes more and more mixed up. Some turn to alcohol or drugs to escape the tormenting confusion in their mind.

Listen to the Holy Spirit when it speaks to you and you can save yourself a lot of problems.

The Apostles listened to Jesus' instructions when He told them to wait at Jerusalem until the Holy Spirit came upon them. He said they would get power that they needed when it came. They really did get power—enough power to speak the truth always even when it could have meant suffering! They had power to share with the poor, and to overcome bad attitudes. They received power to be happy even when they were persecuted. What wonderful power they had!

The Holy Spirit will do the same for you. Why don't you seek God for it?

"Maybe I should ask for the person to speak who thinks it has been too much of a sacrifice," Mrs. Powell said, when Mrs. Wilshire finished telling how she had licked her weight problem.

No one spoke.

If no one objects, then we had better help the Juniors decide how to best use the \$1909.47 that they have collected.

"What did you have in mind when you started this?" Mr. Spoor asked.

"To help the hungry brethren in the Philippines, was my desire."

"Then let's do that," he said.

"I believe the Juniors have some ideas of their own. Jim, would you tell everyone what you told me last Sunday?"

"I think Jesus would want us to spend some money on getting His Word to people. Some have food, but no Bibles. I know of a gospel publishing house who sends used Bibles and gospel literature to Africa, but since the postage rates have gone so high, they need help to pay for the postage. I think it costs \$2.30 for a large Bible and \$1.34 for a New Testament. We could give money to several, and if anyone has old Bibles, please bring them, and I will take them over there."

"I think that is a good idea," Sid said. "My friend, Mike that goes to another church, was also telling me that he is sending three New Testaments to Russia. He told me of a place where we could get some. I think it would be great to send one to somebody in Russia. They would probably appreciate it, because they have not been able to buy Bibles in their country for a long time."

"The brethren in some country of Africa, I forgot which one, are suffering

from famine. They are surely hungry, but we'd have to send food, not money to them, I guess," Kathy said.

"That reminds me," Jeannie said, "of a missionary I heard talk about a plan to buy a special kind of sheep for the people in Ghana, West Africa. She said a family with a few sheep could make enough to buy their own food. Maybe we ought to buy some of these special sheep for a minister or a poor family."

"I'm glad Jeannie spoke about ministers. I wish we could send money every month to Kerala, India so someone can work among the Hindu people and teach them about Christ," Sandy added.

"I think Sandy's idea is a very good one," Hoel said. "I read in the May issue of the National Geographic about Kerala, India. The Communist party won the last election by less than 1%, but that's enough to be the ruling power. The privilege to teach about Jesus may not last long. Maybe we should help someone now, while they have the opportunity."

"The privilege to send Bibles into Russia may not last long either," Hoel added.



October 2, 1988 Stephen Is Chosen To Help The Apostles

Scriptures references: Acts 6:1-15.

The poor of Bible times, were a destitute people. The early Christians voluntarily gave to the poor and, as in every work in dealing with people, some problems arose. Racial problems: the Grecians against the Hebrews.

Another problem was that it was taking the Apostles away from the study and preaching of God's Word. Although helping the poor is a Christian's duty, it must not occupy time which God has designed for the ministry of His Word. It is easy for loving people to spend too much time in the administration of bodily comforts and neglect the Word and its life-giving effect on everlasting souls. There are those whose calling is to help the body and those who are ordained to help souls.

Stephen's work was to administer food to the widows. He knew his place in the Church and filled it well. His example has inspired men and women in all parts of the world throughout the years since his death.

October 9, 1988 Stephen's Defense

Scripture references: Acts 6:15; 7:1-7; Genesis 15:13, 14; Exodus 12:40, 41.

Stephen is being accused of blasphemy and of speaking against Moses. He starts his defense by telling about God's dealings with their father Abraham, to which the Jewish leaders so often referred as justification of who they were.

The Jewish leaders believed in God and the patriarch. They believed that God had promised a Saviour, a king to sit on the throne of their favorite King David, but they did not expect that the reign of the king would be a spiritual reign. They did not understand that all God's dealings with their forefathers were to bring people into a better spiri-

tual relationship with Himself. It was all connected with worshipping Him. Paul says, it was a schoolmaster to bring us to Christ. The Jews did not understand this, they thought only about temporal kings and ceremonial worship.

Stephen begins with Abraham to help them understand that God kept His promises to Abraham and He has also kept the promise of sending a Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The next four Sundays will be more about Stephen.

October 16, 1988 Stephen Tells About Joseph And Moses

Scripture references: Acts 7:9-23.

Stephen continues his defense before an angry council. He speaks to them about Joseph and Moses being used of God to fulfill God's promise to Abraham. As God fulfilled His promise to Abraham, so He was keeping His promise to their nation and also to the whole world by sending His Son Jesus to be the Saviour.

As Joseph's brothers were used by the Providential hand of God to send Joseph into the land of Egypt to later be their saviour, so were the wicked men who killed Jesus part of God's divine plan. The Egyptian slavemasters and the evil king who ordered the babies to be killed, each fit into God's plan, although it was unknown to them. Everything is in His hands and He moves, places and qualifies persons whom He chooses to fit into His divine plans, although the persons are unaware of it.

It is important that children know God has a plan for each life. Encourage them to submit to God's plan for their lives by being obedient to His Word and also to the impressions of His Spirit on their conscience. October 23, 1988

Stephen Tells About Moses' Problems

Scripture references: Acts 7:3-36; Exodus 2:11-25; 3:1-22.

Stephen is giving his defense before the council which accused him of blasphemy. This lesson is like the one we studied last Sunday in that it is a continuation of Stephen's defense and also shows that God has plans for all people, although He cannot fulfill these good plans unless the persons are willing.

It is also an example, showing that something more than education is necessary in being chosen by God as a leader. Moses was learned in all the ways of the Egyptians, who were at that time the most intelligent and best instructed people in the universe. Philo said that Moses was taught in arithmetic, geometry, poetry, music, medicine, and the knowledge of hieroglyphics. Moses, however was not qualified for God's use until he had returned from forty years of hard and humiliating work in the land of Madian.

Children need education. But it is far better to choose, as did Moses, to endure afflictions with the people of God than to enjoy the pleasures which come from education and good jobs for a season, if these would draw them away from God. Young people who are strong in their faith need to get a good education from god-fearing instructors and then use their education to the glory of God.

October 30, 1988 Stephen Tells of Moses' Leadership

Scripture references: Acts 7:37-50. Some other related texts are: Exodus 16:2, 3; 19:4-6; 32:8; and Amos 5:25-27.

Stephen seems to be comparing the religious people of his day with those men of Israel who would not follow Moses and obey the commandments of God, but turned away and insisted on worshiping idols, even carrying them as lucky charms in time of war or travel.

They were never willing to be different from the people around them. That is the hardest thing our children have to do also. Human nature seems to hate standing alone, but take one look backward into history and we will readily see that anyone who has accomplished anything in life worth noting was different from the normal people of their time.

Encourage your children to be different, even in their attitude toward holidays such as Halloween.

Teachers should study the origin of Halloween and be able to give logical answers to questions children ask.

November 6, 1988 Stephen Gives His Life For The Truth

Scripture references: Acts 7:51-60; 8:1-3. Starting at a young age children need to be taught courage to suffer for right-eousness. "Which of the prophets have not your fathers persecuted?" Men, women and children who choose to obtain an inheritance in the world to come have suffered. Others with such goals will suffer until the end of time.

The source of the Kingdom of God is good, the kingdom of this world stems from evil. These two kingdoms have always been, and always will be at variance with each other. Anyone choosing to be in the kingdom of God will suffer at the hands of evil men. This should not be hidden from children. The pay-off for suffering is great enough to override the suffering. It is our job as teachers to also present the pay-off just as it really is: Glorious!

November 13, 1988
Philip Preaches In Samaria

Scripture references: Acts 8:1; 3-14. Philip shows the same attitude toward people as Steven and Jesus. Jesus when dying said, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do," (Luke 23:34). Steven, when dying, said, "Lord, lay not this sin to their charge." Philip crossed over centuries of prejudice to minister to the Samaritans, and it wasn't done out of pride to prove it was God's plan as some things are done today. NO, only pure love for their bodies and souls caused Philip to work with them.

Children must be sometimes educated to love all other children. The unclean, ungroomed child is sometimes hard to love. Some poor children find it hard to love children who "have everything." Many times when parents have criticized or riduculed certain kinds or races of people, it becomes hard for children to love those people. Through prayer and instruction let us help the students to develop an attitude like that of Philip.

> November 20, 1988 Peter And John Help Philip

Scripture references: Acts 8:13-25; Isa. 52:3; 55:1.

God sends the Holy Spirit on the Samaritans. Simon, one of the believers, wants to buy power from Peter to also be able to lay hands on others that they may receive the Holy Spirit. He is told that he must repent, for his heart is not right.

Not one of your students would think of offering money for the gift of God, but many times they are tempted to seek God's and man's approval by doing good, instead of admitting guilt. Sad to say, many, both young and old, yield to this temptation. If such yielding would be continued, it would lead into being dishonest with oneself and God. This is a very dangerous state because God cannot deal with a person who is not honest with Him.

November 27, 1988

Philip Baptizes a Queen's Treasurer

Scripture references: Acts 8:26-38. Philip preached in Samaria and many people were saved, healed and baptized. Peter and John came down to help him and many, many more were saved. Also, the Holy Spirit came on them as it did the Jews in Jerusalem. (They did not speak in tongues, possibly because all the people in this place spoke the same language.) After this, they preached in many more villages of Samaria before

God's next assignment to Philip was to go into the desert and testify to an Ethiopian. This man was traveling through the country on his way back home from worshiping in Jerusalem. Philip was just as faithful to preach to

going back to Jerusalem.

this one man as he was to the hundreds in Samaria.

Let us teach the children to be faithful in the small, unnoticed tasks that God has for them to do. Jesus may want them to witness to their smaller brother or sister, maybe a neighbor, or a friend at school. It might be a friendless child that Jesus wants someone to befriend and in this way show Jesus through their actions. Whatever the job that God has for us to do, it should be done faithfully, even if no one except God, the person, and ourselves knows what was done.

December 4, 1988 Apostle Paul Is Saved

Scripture references: Acts 9:1-13; 26: 9-18.

Saul (later called Paul) is convicted on the road to Damascus as he is going with authority to put in prison all who worship Jesus. On the way, Jesus appears to him in a light. The brightness of that light causes blindness. He fasts and prays for three days until Ananias comes to pray with him. After receiving the new birth and his sight, he is baptized. He begins at once doing the job Jesus gave him to do.

Some people wish for God to convict them in a "knock down" manner just as he did Saul, but God does not deal with many in that way. Children need to realize that a soft convicting experience from the Lord makes them just as responsible to repent and change as Sauls' "knock down" experience. Saul was responsible to do what Jesus toldhim to do. Every child of God is responsible to do what Jesus wants them to do. Those who will not, are soon away from God and back in sin and trouble.

Dec. 11, 1988 Saul Reaps What He Sows

Scripture references: Acts 9:17-20, 22-30; 22:1-21.

Soon after Paul is baptized, while he is still in the city of Damascus, he begins receiving persecutions. Saul (later called Paul) held the coats of those who stoned Stephen.

This lesson clearly shows God's truthfulness to His Word: "Yea, and all that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution." 2 Tim. 3:12. "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." Gal. 6:7.

Children should always remember that when they do cruel, unkind things to others, someday others will be cruel and unkind to them. Apostle Paul said of himself: ". . . in stripes above measure, in prisons more frequent, in deaths oft. Of the Jews five times received I forty stripes save one. Thrice was I beaten with rods, once was I stoned, thrice I suffered shipwreck, a night and a day I have been in the deep; In journeyings often, in perils of waters, in perils of robbers, in perils by mine own countrymen, in perils by the heathen. in perils in the city, in perils in the wilderness, in perils in the sea, in perils among false brethren: In weariness and painfulness, in watchings often, in hunger and thirst, in fastings often, in cold and nakedness." 2 Cor. 11:23-27.

It seems that he suffered more than any other apostle.

Dec. 18, 1988 Peter Works In Lydda

Scripture reference: Acts 9:32-43.

Peter was visiting the saints in many cities. On his way he went to Lydda where he found Aeneas who had been paralyzed for eight years. While in this place the brethren from Joppa called for him because Tabitha had died. Peter went to Joppa and God raised Tabitha from the dead.

In both of these marvelous miracles, Peter seemed to have an assurance that God had healed the person. He said to Aeneas, "Jesus Christ maketh thee whole, arise, and make thy bed," and he lifted Tabitha by his hand to her feet.

Peter expected action. He asked for action. He got action.

Children need to be taught to act in faith after they are prayed for. Encourage the children to be ready to get out of bed after the "Amen" is said. That is what Peter asked Aeneas to do.

Dec. 25, 1988 Review Of Previous Twelve Lessons

Scripture references: Acts, chapters six through nine.

This lesson is a short summary of Stephen's ministry, trial, and death; Philip's and Peter's ministry; and Paul's conversion.

Stephen's death was the beginning of severe persecution for the believers. The persecution drove the Christians away from Jerusalem to find more protected environments in which to live. New congregations were raised up in those places as the Holy Ghost-filled refugees shared the gospel with their new neighbors and friends.

Philip and Peter were used by God to perform miracles which witnessed of Jesus' power in new areas, causing many people to believe.

Jesus heard the cries of His persecuted children and struck Paul down with conviction which brought rest to the Church. Paul became the persecuted instead of the persecutor.

God is love. Because His love filled the hearts of Jesus' disciples, those disciples, who had more goods than they needed divided what they had with other believers who were poor. Acts 4:34, 35 says, "Neither was there any among them that lacked: for as many as were possessors of lands or houses sold them, and brought the prices of the things that were sold. And laid them down at the apostles' feet: and distribution was made unto every man according as he had need." This was a big job! There were thousands of Christians in Jerusalem! Acts 2:41 says there were 3,000. In Acts 4:4, there were 5,000. After that, it is recorded in Acts 5:14, that "believers were the more added to the Lord. multitudes both of men and women." (Let's estimate that there were 10.000 disciples at this time.)

In a group of 10,000 persons, there would be many poor, a few rich and others who were neither rich nor poor. In Bible times a poor person, was very, very poor. He had no land on which to raise food for his family, and just barely enough clothing to keep warm. It was against the Jewish law to take clothing from a widow in exchange for food. Why? Because she had no other clothing. The Jews were to loan or give food to widows or ophans without any security. If they were not a widow, the lender could take clothing as a security that they would be repaid. However, if the person was very poor, the lender had to return the clothing each evening so the poor could be warm at night. The poor were so very poor, they had nothing else with which to cover themselves at night.

Many of the poor were widows, so the Apostles worked out a plan to see that the widows and their children had food. Everyday the Apostles went from house to house taking food to the hungry. The Apostles soon found that it was taking

too much of their time to get this job done. When some people complained that the Grecian widows were being neglected, the Apostles decided to choose seven men to do the job. The men chosen had to be full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom.

Stephen was one of the men chosen. Stephen was full of the Holy Ghost and faith. God gave him power just as He had given to the Apostles. Stephen "did wonders and miracles among the people." He also preached that Jesus was the Son of God and that Jesus' death put an end to the old way of worshiping God which Moses had taught to them. Some men from a synagogue heard him say that Jesus would change the customs that Moses gave as laws to them. They did not want to lose their followers so they stirred up the people against Stephen. They hired evil men to witness lies and took him before the elders, where they accused him of blasphemy.

Stephen had done evil to no one. He had only done miracles that were a blessing to people. He was so innocent of the accusations that when he stood to be judged, his face shone. Those who saw him said, "He has the face of an angel." Stephen had helped the poor widows, now he was also in trouble.

Stephen stood facing the council of angry men. The men who formed the council were men who taught the people that God expected them to obey the Mosaic law, and that God expected those to be punished who dared to disobey. They had been told that Stephen said, "God has destroyed the Mosaic laws, and it is no longer necessary to obey them."

They were so angry with Stephen for turning the people away from Moses' law that they accused him of blasphemy.

Stephen knew the law; he would be killed if proven guilty. He knew he was innocent, but would the men believe what he had to say about himself?

"Are these things true that you are being accused of?" the high priest asked.

Stephen became his own defense by saying, "Men, brethren, and fathers; God appeared many years ago to our father Abraham and told him to get out of his home country and go into another land where he could more perfectly worship God. Our father Abraham obeyed and followed God, even though he did not know where he was going. After our father Abraham followed God into a strange land, God said to Him, 'You will have children, and they will leave this land and go into another land where they will be bondmen. During this time they will become a nation of people. But I will bring them again into this land and they will worship me as I have taught vou.

"Abraham had no child when God gave him this promise but all of you know that later he had a son and his family became a great nation. God brought this nation out of the land of Egypt, after they had been in bondage many years.

"God made other promises to our fathers and many of them have happened just as God promised," Stephen said as he continued talking about the history of their people.

Stephen wanted to help the council to see that God is faithful to keep all His promises, and that He had also kept his promise of sending a Saviour. Thousands of people had come to believe that Jesus was this Saviour. Stephen wanted them to also believe. They would not. They continued to say that Stephen had blasphemed because he said that Jesus was greater than Moses.

Will Stephen get them to understand? Acts 6:7 says, that "a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith." Maybe Stephen can convince some more priests to become believers in Jesus and they will not kill him. What do you think?

We know of one thing keeping some of these men from becoming believers. It is that they will have to admit that they agreed with those who put Jesus, the Son of God, to death. Therefore they are guilty of His death. It would be mighty hard to admit such a deed. On the other hand, if Jesus isn't the Son of God, and He said that He was, then they have helped God by cleansing the land of anyone who would do such a wicked thing. Will they admit that killing Jesus was wrong?

bed and prayed. A couple hours later, I was no better. Dad decided he had to choose between praying and losing me, his only child. He knelt and prayed. Then he called a neighbor and asked if they would take a message to Mr. William Adams, who was at that time pastor of Madison Square Church.

"He took the message, and asked the usher at the door to ask special prayer for John Peabody (that's me), who'd be dead in minutes if God didn't change things. Pastor Adams was already in the pulpit preaching and the usher did not want to disturb him, but seeing it might mean life or death, he took a note up and laid it on the pulpit. Pastor Adams read the note and right then, at fifteen 'til eleven, had prayer for me. By the time the neighbor got home, I was much improved. 'He suddenly got better at fifteen 'til eleven,' my dad told the neighbor.

"That is the very time they prayed for him! said the neighbor. I remember looking at that big clock that hangs on the south wall.

"I got well, as you all know, for I'm here with you today, and that was 84 years ago. That made a believer out of my dad and he was a good Christian the rest of his life.

"Not long after that experience, I got a baby sister. She wasn't very strong, though, and when she was two years old she had terrible spasms. They were so bad that she would almost die during them. I hated to see her suffer. One day I felt like praying for her, for I remembered being healed in answer to prayer. I went away to my room and prayed for her. She was healed of those spasms! Children, don't ever underestimate the power to be found in prayer."

Next, Mr. Murphey took Mrs. Rexson by the arm and led her to the speaker's chair beside the piano.

"My story took place in 1864. My mother was ten years old that year. It was during the time of the Civil War. My grandparents were Southerners but they did not believe in slavery, nor did they believe the United States should

divide. For this reason, they left everything and fled from the South, ending up in Charmberburgh, Pennsylvania. My grandfather, Mr. Jackson, was the superintendent of the Sunday school there. It was well known that they had escaped from the South.

"One day, the Confederate soldiers marched into the village. My Grandpa Jackson and his family hid out in the mountains to keep from being captured. They were there for many days without food finding only leaves, grass, and a little bark to chew. My Grandpa was sure his family would starve to death as they wandered in the woods looking for an isolated family with which to hide.

"One day my mother took out her little Testament she had brought along to the woods, and was reading. She read the Lord's Prayer. Running to my Grandpa, she said, 'Jesus taught His disciples to pray for their daily bread! These are His own words. It is therefore not possible that He will allow any person to starve, who asks Him for food in His own words. Dear father, He will surely hear our prayers for bread.'

"My grandfather clasped my mother in his arms and fervently prayed the Lord's Prayer. Before they arose from their knees, a dog barked very near them. A farmer was searching for some lost cattle. The kind-hearted man immediately led my granddad and his family to his own comfortable home and provided for their needs. You see, God always hears the prayer He taught people to pray."

"I am sorry the evening has passed so quickly," Mr. Murphey said. "Several others want to share the story of their lives with the children. Can you come again?"

"Yes, we will come again. Would next Thursday be a good time?" Mrs. Smith asked.

Stephen was accused of blasphemy and brought before the council. This same thing happened to Jesus. The punishment for blasphemy was death. Will Stephen be proven guilty as Jesus was, or will he prove himself innocent? In the lesson last week, Stephen began his defense by showing how God's promise to their father Abraham was kept.

He continued his defense by telling how God worked with Abraham's greatgrandson, Joseph, and his posterity. Joseph was a good boy, obedient and greatly beloved by his father. Why was he hated and mistreated by his brothers? He was first put in a pit to die, later he was taken from the pit and sold as a slave to be taken into the foreign country of Egypt. In Egypt he lived true to God's commandments, yet he suffered much injustice. He was put in jail and almost forgotten. Why should a good boy have to suffer so much? He suffered mistreatment because God was preparing him to be an understanding ruler, although Joseph did not know he was to become a ruler. He may have wondered why all these things were happening to him. He may have wondered too, about his childhood dreams about his brothers and parents bowing before him. Do you think Joseph would have understood sorrow if he had not suffered? Without understanding sorrow, would he have been a good understanding ruler? No.

Stephen said, "We can see why God let these things happen to Joseph. It was to place Joseph as a good leader in Egypt. If Joseph hadn't been a leader in Egypt at the time of the severe dearth, the family of our father Abraham could not have become the great nation it is today. God has to let things happen to people to get them to want to do His will. God let an Egyptian ruler and his people treat Joseph's family as slaves so they would hate the land and be willing to risk losing what they had for

a better life. They had grown to become a great nation with 600,000 men, besides, women and children. The people soon grew to hate Egypt and began crying to God to let them leave. God caused Moses to be adopted by the princess so he would know how to deal with the Egyptian king. God was working out all these things to keep His promise to Abraham. He caused many things to happen that were not easy to understand; but they were necessary to keep the promise. God has always kept His promise to men. He has caused things to happen in our own city that have been the fulfillment of one of His important promises to us." Stephen told the men of the council.

"The people enjoy sharing their stories," Mr. Murphey said, "Can you come again?"


'Shall we come again?" Mr. Smith asked Mrs. Smith.

Mrs. Keithstone scooted her tiny feet over the floor as she made her way to the same chair by the piano in which all the other speakers had sat.

Stephen is still on the witness stand, giving his defense for being accused of blasphemy. He is trying to explain that saying God is going to destroy the temple and set up a new kind of worship is not blasphemy, but it is part of God's plan for them.

"When our fathers were slaves in the land of Egypt," Stephen said, "God wanted to bring them out. He chose Moses as the person to lead them. He caused Moses to be saved from death at a time when the baby boys were being killed at birth. He arranged everything so the Egyptian princess would adopt Moses and educate him as an Egyptian ruler. When Moses was forty years old, he thought he was ready for the job! He went out to visit his people and found a slave master beating one of them. His temper flared! He was called by God to deliver his people, 'When would be a better time to start?' he thought. He struck the slave master and killed him. His brethren fled. Seeing the man lying dead. Moses was fearful of what might happen to him, so he dug a hole in the sand and buried the man.

"The next day, he visited his people again. This time, two of them were fighting. Hoping to make peace between the two, Moses said, 'You should not hurt each other.'

"To his surprise one of the men shouted back, 'Who made you a ruler over us? Are you going to kill us like you did the Egyptian yesterday?'

"Moses was surprised that these men knew what had happened yesterday. He was afraid and discouraged. His people did not want him as their ruler. When King Pharaoh heard what Moses had done he planned to kill Moses. Moses ran away.

"Moses hid away in the land of Madian. In the summer, instead of bathing in the Nile river and resting in the shade, he worked hard tending sheep in return for shelter and food. Winter came, he tended sheep outside during the months when cold wind, rain, snow and ice sent chills through his body. Year after year Moses worked hard and learned about God. During these forty years while God was preparing Moses' to be a spiritual leader, He was also preparing the Israelite people to accept Moses as their leader.

"Finally the day came that God, through a message from a burning bush, sent Moses back to Egypt. He was now prepared for the job of getting the people out of bondage. Forty more years of severe suffering as slaves had made the people ready to accept this same Moses whom they had rejected before. Eighty years had passed since Moses birth, but God had been working all this time to get everyone ready for the escape.

"When the people were ready, God caused ten miraculous plagues to come upon the Egyptians. After the tenth plague, the Egyptians were wishing to run the Israelites out of their land.

"As God worked in the land of Egypt and sent them a leader, so He has sent us a leader; but, as they refused the leader, so you have refused the leader which God has sent." Stephen said.

Black Magic

The What Would Jesus Do? group met at Mr. and Mrs. Shoor's house on Thursday night, October 28. Everyone was there. Some dressed in occupational costumes, or costumes of the olden days; other came in regular dress.

"Let us play a game call 'Black Magic', and then I will read a true story about John G. Paton's experience with black magic," Mrs. Shoor said. "It is a true story about people who use the powers of evil to trouble others. Have you ever wondered if a person with black magic powers could harm you? There are many people in the world who are afraid of black magic. Do we need to be fearful of it? Let's see if this story will answer some of these questions."

When the game was finished, Mrs. Shoor started reading the story.

"John Paton worked as a missionary on Tanna, one of the Hebrides Islands. The Hebrides Islands are a group of beautiful scenic islands on the west side of Scotland which are also known as the Western Isles. Here is a map, so you may see where these islands are located. There are 500 islands in this group, but three-fourths are uninhabited. The lifestyle of the natives has changed little in hundreds of years.

"Early one morning Paton heard gun shots. Moments later, a wild-eyed native mission teacher burst into his house

shouting, 'The tribesmen are being murdered at the command of the Sacred Men. The next victims are to be the mission teachers and you.'

"Paton knew what the teacher said was true. It had happened before. The priests of black magic, or Sacred Men, as they were called, had great power, but Paton knew his God had more power. He fell to his knees and began praying for protection and that the mission teachers would not fear but have faith in the real God.

Stephen continues explaining that it is not blasphemy to call Jesus the Son of God, for even their leader, Moses, prophesied about Him. "Moses said that this special prophet would be like him. and we know that Moses and Jesus had many things in common. They were both preserved in childhood, contended with masters of evil, fasted forty days. controlled the sea, fed a multitude, had radiant faces, endured murmurings. were discredited in their families, made intercessory prayers, spoke as God to men, had 70 helpers, established rituals of memorials, and reappeared after death.

"Just as the Israelites rejected Moses and wished to return back into the bondage of Egypt from which they had been delivered, so people today like to stay under the bondage of the law of Moses. although God has made a plan for our freedom" Stephen told them, "You all remember how Aaron and the people were worshiping a golden calf when Moses returned from speaking with God on the mount. Moses was only gone forty days, but in that forty days, their hearts had turned again to the old ways of Egypt. God had performed many miracles during the plagues in Egypt, dried up the Red Sea, and given them water and food in the wilderness. These were all forgotten in a moment of desire for excitement.

"God reproved, and forgave them many times for similar actions, but they repeatedly turned to idol worship, until God quit troubling them and let them worship the sun, moon, planets and stars. This brought much trouble on them," Stephen said.

"There is just one more point;" he added, "Many people have been blessed through worshiping God in this temple. But there have been times when people worshiped God under the sky at home or in strange places, and God blessed

them also. "The most High dwelleth not in temples made with hands,' for the sky is His throne and the earth is His footstool."


Do you think Stephen has said some things that might make the council more angry at him or will they see his point of view?

"Paton knew the islanders were careful to destroy all scraps of food and peelings of fruit, lest they be used for Nahak against them. 

Stephen gave his life for the TRUTH! He could have backed down and told the council that they were wonderful godly men, like their fathers Abraham, Joseph, and Moses; that Jesus whom they crucified was really a blasphemer and that they were doing good to remove Him from their society. Stephen, however, did not liken them to their holy fathers, but he likened them to their fathers who had rejected, stoned and killed the prophets which God had sent unto them.

Hostility and anger showed in every face. The doctors and lawyers gritted their teeth like animals baring their fangs. They clenched their fists in an attempt to subdue the anger that boiled within. They wanted to kill him that moment but they were considered to be holy men of God. They should stay in control, finish the trial, and pronounce the death sentence in a dignified manner. At Stephen's next words about seeing Jesus at the right hand of God. the mob spirit broke loose! The dignified men slapped their hands over their ears and cried out that they would hear no more! In a fanatical frenzy of hate they bore down upon him. Hurrying him outside the city, they proceeded to stone him without a legal verdict of being guilty.

Those who had witnessed against Stephen were required by Jewish law to throw the first stones. Tearing off their outer garments, they laid them for safe-keeping at the feet of a young man named Saul. Grabbing the nearest large stones, they hurled them with all their fury of hate. The others satisfied their murderous anger in the same manner.

On his knees, bruised, bleeding and battered, Stephen turned his face toward heaven and prayed, "Lord, lay not this sin to their charge."

Nathan Hale was only 21 years old when he was hanged by the British as an American spy. His last request for a Bible was denied and a letter he had written was destroyed. Hale faced his execution with calmness of mind and spirit which gave him the ability to give a speech. His speech included these words: "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country." Noble Nathan Hale chose to give his life for his country.

Patrick Henry in his great speech said, "I know not what course others may take; but as for me, give me liberty, or give me death!" He was never called upon to give his life for liberty, but these words show his willingness to do so.

Thousands of uncelebrated soldiers have given their lives for their country.

Thousands of others have given their lives for less noble causes; some choose to do so, others are by accident. Think how many thousands of people die each year accidently because of drugs, including alcohol. Many deaths are due to overdoses; these have chosen to take the risk of death rather than do without drugs and accidently take too much. Others die of disease and sickness related to the use of such drugs. Many people each day are giving their lives for one cause or another.

Just how much do you love righteous principles? Are you willing to suffer for these? Do you love Jesus enough to give your life for Him if you should have to choose between Jesus or death?



Not only did the Jews hate the Samaritans, but the Samaritans also hated the Jews. Luke 9:51-56 records an account of the Samaritans not wanting Jesus and His disciples to stay overnight in their villages.

The Jews would not obligate themselves to any business or religious dealings with the Samaritans. They would not borrow, nor would they drink from the same cup or from the same well, they would not eat at the same table nor use the same cooking dishes as the Samaritans. The most unmerciful wish of the Jews for the Samaritans was that they might have no part in the resurrection; in other words, that they would be annihilated.

Philip, being filled with the loving Holy Spirit of God, had no such desires. He wanted them to hear about Jesus and have a part in the resurrection. He left Jerusalem and went into their country and preached. He had compassion on those who were sick, lame, or possessed with devils and through God's power delivered them. The Samaritans were happy to accept the teaching of Philip. They believed that Jesus was the Saviour and were baptized.

These people had for many years believed a man named Simon to be a great man of God, for he had bewitched them by doing magic things using witchcraft. After they heard the truth, they saw the difference and were baptized. Simon also believed and was baptized. He then followed Philip around and saw the miracles and wonders which God did through Philip.

Do you think Philip could have worked miracles among the Samaritans if he had kept any of the old Jewish ideas of intolerance toward the Samaritans? A worker for God must have a great love and compassion for those with whom he is working. He must have so much compassion that he hurts when they burt

Moses had that kind of compassion for the people he was leading. One time God was angry with them for building and worshiping a golden calf. Moses prayed for them, saying, "If thou wilt forgive their sin . . . and if not, blot me, I pray thee, out of thy book." Of course God would not do that, but it shows Moses' love.

How much love do you have? Do you have enough to not hold old family prejudice against races? God needs workers who will love people for what they can become and not for what any of their relations have been or what they are at this time. The divine love of God sees what a person can become after salvation has washed away all their sins

God help us to become like Philip and be able to love anyone, even an enemy.

tian now."



The fury of the persecution in Jerusalem increased. Saul (later called Paul) spoke cleverly and shrewdly in the synagogues against the beliefs of the disciples.

Accompanied by a strong-armed souad. Saul set out for Damascus. He had been working at such a mad pace that thus far he had not let himself think seriously. But on the long journey his active mind could not be kept in leash and his conscience could not be stilled. The lash marks across bare backs, and dving Stephen's shining face as he asked forgiveness of God for his executioners must have haunted him. He battled stubbornly against the unwelcome thoughts that he might be in the wrong! On and on he pressed on the long desert road that led to Damascus. (Read the story in Acts 26:9-18.)

In the middle of the day, as they were nearing Damascus, suddenly there flashed around them a flame of brilliant light. It struck Saul to the ground and distinctly a voice called him by name.

"Saul, Saul," the voice said, "why persecutest thou me? It is hard for thee to kick against the pricks."

Instantly Saul realized he was kicking like a stubborn ox against his conscience. But who was this mysterious speaker who revealed to him the secret of his inner struggle?

Without raising his face, nor opening his eyes, Saul asked, "Who art thou, Lord?"

"I am Jesus of Nazareth, whom thou persecutest," answered the voice.

"It is true then!" Saul thought. This Jesus who had been put to death upon a Roman cross is alive. He is risen from the dead, as his disciples claim. All of Saul's arguments were shattered. He was wrong! Those whom he had hounded to prison and death were right! He knew the truth now, for he had seen

the risen Lord and was talking with Him.

Saul was trembling. He surrendered! Humbly he asked, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?"

He was told to go into Damascus to Judas' house and there he would learn what to do. Saul opened his eyes. He could see nothing! His companions, who had also seen the light, led him by the hand into the city.

Straight Street ran through Damascus from east to west. It was thronged with camels, donkeys, and people, but Saul saw none of them. His strong-armed men guided his groping steps to the house of Judas, who lived on that street.

There he stayed all the rest of that day and the two days following. Saul lay there in total darkness, refusing both food and drink. During those long hours of blindness, he was thinking and praying. He felt remorse for how he had treated Jesus' followers.

He would now give up the career he had planned for himself as a great rabbi; the career for which he had studied and dreamed. He would become a humble follower of Jesus whom he had persecuted.

"I can make something for her," Sandy offered. "I would love to."


"What could you make?"

Nothing except the vision which God gave him would have persuaded him to come into Saul's presence. Should there be a mistake, Ananias would be walking into real suffering. But he knew God could change the worst enemy into a powerful defender.

"Brother Saul," Ananias said, "the Lord, even Jesus . . . hath sent me, that thou mightest receive thy sight and be filled with the Holy Ghost."

Immediately something like scales fell from Saul's eyes and he could see again. Then he arose and was baptized.

For several days Saul visited with the disciples in Damascus. Some were questioning if he were the same man who persecuted them, for he astounded even the Jews by declaring his belief that Jesus was the Son of God. Saul consented to leave, for as he was praying in the temple, Jesus appeared in a vision and said to him, "Make haste, and get thee quickly out of Jerusalem: for they will not receive thy testimony concerning me. Depart, for I will send thee far hence unto the Gentiles." (Read this account from Acts 22:3-21.)

Some of the brethren escorted Saul safely from Jerusalem to the port of Caesarea, where they saw him off to Tarsus. There in his home city, he quietly began his great work as an Apostle of Christ to people of all nationalities.

News of this marvelous healing swept across the country. People flocked into Lydda to see Aeneas. He was a living proof of Christ's power and they believed in Jesus.

Hardly had the excitement of this died away, when two men came from Joppa looking for Peter, They brought him an urgent message that the disciples in Joppa needed him to come without delay. He went at once. Arriving there, he was led to the upper room of a house in which a woman lav lifeless. Tabitha was her Jewish name, but she was known among the Greek-speaking Jews as Dorcas. She had been a very loving, kind-hearted person, who had helped those poor disciples.

When Peter entered the upper room, a lot of poor widows gathered around him. They were crying and showed him the coats and clothing that Dorcas had made for them and their children. Peter saw their need of Dorcas. He told the crying widows to go out. When he was alone, he sought God for an answer to this problem. God must have assured him that Dorcas would live again, for when he prayed, she opened her eyes and sat up. He took her by the hand and said, "Arise." She did. Calling the widows, and the other disciples, he presented to them a live Dorcas!

I was happy and never thought of things being different—that is, until the day my wife discovered she had cancer. It was a hard three months of watching her suffer, paying doctor and hospital bills, and staying alone when she was hospitalized. I kept myself going by hoping she would some day be well again. Well, she died.

"Life was all bitterness after that. I blamed God for her death. I sat day after day and pitied myself. It was fall, the summers' work was done and I had no real pressing jobs. Fall turned into winter and I closed the doors of my house to the world and all my neighbors who had tried so often to comfort me and take me into their friendship.

"Christmas was drawing near. I felt it had no meaning to me. I was alone and lonely. I sent no Christmas cards. The nearer Christmas came, the worse I felt. On Christmas Eve a terrible blizzard raged. From my window I could not see across the narrow ravine to the mountain on the other side. The road, my only route out, was soon impassible. "Why didn't you call me to pick you up?"



(Acts 6:1-13: 7:56-60) The brethren chose (to help the Apostles) Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost. Multitudes and multitudes of persons joined themselves to the group of Apostles. 3,000 were added to the original group of 120 on the day of Pentecost. Just days after that the number had grown to 5,000. The dishonesty of a man and his wife, Ananias and Sapphira, was revealed and another multitude was added.

People were pouring into Jerusalem bringing their sick, and demon-possessed for deliverance. Seeing these miracles made believers out of crowds.

This rapid increase created new problems of caring for the needy. More and more of the Apostles' time was taken up with this work. It was certain that oversight would occur. Soon some of the foreign-born Jews complained that the needy widows in their group were being neglected. The Apostles knew they could do no better, so they called a meeting of the disciples. In this meeting, seven men full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom were chosen to be over this work, that the Apostles might give themselves continually to prayer and to study of the Word. The plan worked well, and the number of the disciples multiplied again, also a great company of priests joined the faith.

Stephen was one man chosen for the job. He was filled with the Holy Spirit and highly gifted. Soon he was witnessing for his faith in the synagogues, and preaching his convictions persuasively.

Many leaders of the synagogues became jealous of him. They hired false witnesses and took him before the Sanhedrin which was the Jewish supreme court.

He was tried for blasphemy. During the trial, the council became so riled that they stoned Stephen without proving him guilty. Stephen's last words were asking God to forgive his murderers. Saul, an ambitous young Jew, kept the coats of those who stoned Stephen and heard his dying words. This one death seemed only to whet Saul's thirst for more of the saints' blood. He obtained authority to persecute the Church as far as Damascus, which he did with all fury until God struck him blind.

During this time of severe persecution. Philip went down into Samaria and preached. Multitudes were saved under his ministry. Peter and John also came to help him. After that an angel led Philip to witness to a traveling man who took the gospel story to his country of Ethiopia.

Soon after Saul was saved, the Jews in Damascus plotted for his life and set watches at all the city gates. This was known to the disciples, who let him out of the city hidden in a basket. He came to Jerusalem but was not accepted. Latter, however, the disciples accepted him and protected his life from other bloodthirsty Jews until they could take him to Caesarea, and send him back to his home in Tarsus.

Finally the Church had rest. The persecution had caused the Church to spread into many different lands and multitudes were saved in every place.

Peter went to Lydda and the whole region believed the gospel. At Joppa a woman was brought back to life after Peter prayed causing many more to believe.
