Keeping Victory Revelation 15:1-8

- 1 And I saw another sign in heaven, great and marvellous, seven angels having the seven last plagues; for in them is filled up the wrath of God.
- 2 And I saw as it were a sea of glass mingled with fire: and them that had gotten the victory over the beast, and over his image, and over his mark, and over the number of his name, stand on the sea of glass, having the harps of God.
- 3 And they sing the song of Moses the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb, saying, Great and marvellous are thy works, Lord God Almighty; just and true are thy ways, thou King of saints.
- 4 Who shall not fear thee, O Lord, and glorify thy name? for thou only art holy: for all nations shall come and worship before thee; for thy judgments are made manifest.

God's children are singing songs of victory and deliverance in this Revelation picture. They have gotten victory over the beast, his image, his mark and his number. They are standing on a sea of glass mingled with fire. On the other side of the picture we see the holy temple of God. Seven angels dressed in white come out of the temple. Each angel is given a golden pitcher full of God's wrath. Then the glory of God so filled the temple that no man could enter into it.

Now let's talk about what some of these symbols represent. Angels are ministering spirits. Often angels represent ministers or pastors of churches, but in this picture the angels do not come to the earth, so they are not people. These angels hold vials full of God's wrath and in the sixteenth chapter of Revelation they pour this wrath out upon the earth. God never allows His ministers to pour His wrath out on others. He reserves all vengeance for Himself.

The people in this vision had harps and were singing, a symbol of melody and praise. What kind of songs did they sing? They sang the song of Moses, which is a song of deliverance from bondage, also they sang the song of the Lamb, which is a song of deliverance from sin through faith in Jesus' death.

Over what had they gotten victory? They had gotten victory over 1. the beast, 2. his image, 3. his mark, and 4. his number.

1. The beast represents the Roman Catholic Church and all its divisions which received power from pa-

ganism, or worshippers of evil spirits. (Rev. 13:4.) People do not have victory over the beast if they are trusting men for the forgiveness of their sins, or bowing before images of Christ, the Virgin Mary, the apostles or any other image.

- 2. The image of the beast is the Christian churches which have separated themselves from the beast but worship the beast because they still have the spirit of the beast. (Rev. 13:12-15.) This multitude of churches has its own creed and rule that permits people into their fellowship according to whether or nor they obey church rules. Christians who do not have the spirit of God through a new birth do not have victory over the image of the beast.
- 3. In chapter 13, the people could not buy nor sell unless they had the mark of the beast. Buying and selling are symbols of being able to operate spiritually such as teaching, preaching or spreading the gospel. The Apostle asked the authorities, "Is it right for us to hearken unto you or unto God?" (Acts 4:19.) Christians have the victory over the mark of the beast when they will obey God knowing it may bring suffering from people in authority.
- 4. The number of the beasts is 666 (Rev. 13:18.) Vicarius Filii Dei is the official title of the Pope. The meaning of these Latin words is Vicar of the Son of God. Total the Roman numbers in this name and it will equal 666. Both U and V were formerly used to denote five. Keeping victory over the number of the beast is to never believe that any man or religion can take the place of Jesus.

The people who have victory will not be hurt when God pours out his wrath on men. Those who have victory will be able to enter into the temple that is filled with the glory of God.

The Vials of God's Wrath Revelation 16:1-11

New Words: 1. Notsome is offensive or disgusting. 2. Vials are small glass bottles or shallow bowls.

- 1 And I heard a great voice out of the temple saying to the seven angels, Go your ways, and pour out the vials of the wrath of God upon the earth.
- 2 And the first went, and poured out his vial upon the earth; and there fell a noisome and grievous sore upon the men which had the mark of the beast, and upon them which worshipped his image.
- 3 And the second angel poured out his vial upon the sea; and it became as the blood of a dead man: and every living soul died in the sea.
- **4** And the third angel poured out his vial upon the rivers and fountains of waters; and they became blood.
- **5** And I heard the angel of the waters say, Thou art righteous, O Lord, which art, and wast, and shalt be, because thou hast judged thus.
- 6 For they have shed the blood of saints and prophets, and thou hast given them blood to drink; for they are worthy.
- 7 And I heard another out of the altar say, Even so, Lord God Almighty, true and righteous are thy judgments.
- 8 And the fourth angel poured out his vial upon the sun; and power was given unto him to scorch men with fire.

- 9 And men were scorched with great heat, and blasphemed the name of God, which hath power over these plagues: and they repented not to give him glory.
- 10 And the fifth angel poured out his vial upon the seat of the beast; and his kingdom was full of darkness; and they gnawed their tongues for pain.
- 11 And blasphemed the God of heaven because of their pains and their sores, and repented not of their deeds.

The Message: God's mercy is everlasting to those of an humble spirit, but sometimes His wrath is poured out upon those with ungodly spirits.

To understand this Revelation, we must answer five questions. 1. What was poured out? 2. Where was it poured? 3. Upon whom was it poured? 4. Why was it poured? 5. When were these vials poured?

1. What was poured? The wrath of God is being poured out. We often hear of God's love, His kindness, His mercy and other positive characteristics, but seldom do we hear about His wrath. But Romans 11:22 reads, "Behold therefore the goodness and severity of God: on them which fell, severity; but toward thee, goodness, if thou continue in his goodness: otherwise thou also shalt be cut off." In verse 5 of our lesson the angel also said, "Thou art righteous, O

Lord,...because thou hast judged thus."

2. Where was the wrath poured?
God's wrath is poured upon the earth, not in heaven or hell.

3. Upon whom was it poured? It was poured upon those which had the mark of the beast, and those who worshipped his image. Do you remember? The beast is the Roman Catholic church and all its sects. A person would receive this mark by having faith in religious beliefs taught by these churches. The image of the beast is all the different Protestant churches. Those who worship "his image" are those who obey church doctrines which they know are contrary to God's Word.

4. Why was the wrath of God poured out? It was poured out because the people of these churches had shed the blood of the saints and prophets. God says, "...Vengeance is mine; I will repay...." Romans 12:19. God's children should never seek vengeance. God will do it for His children.

5, Where was God's wrath poured out? To understand this we must read

history to find where the churches were located which shed the greater part of the saints' blood. Millions of saints were slaughtered when the Roman Catholic Church had great power. Protestant churches also persecuted those who did not agree with their doctrines. Most of these churches were in Europe. So the wrath of the first five vials is poured upon Europe.

The first vial of wrath was a "noisome and grievous sore." The awful cancer of atheism called the "age of reason" that erupted into the bloody French Revolution was a grievous sore for the people in Europe. It undermined all truth, until people had no fear of God nor respect for man.

During the second vial, the sea became as blood. Water represents people, (Rev. 17:15.) It is recorded in history that during the French Revolution 15,000 people were slaughtered in one month. This was not religious persecution, but it was a grievous sore.

The third vial was poured upon the rivers and fountains of waters. Rivers flow in and out of seas. God's wrath not only fell upon all people represented by the sea, but also upon those around the sea. The wars following the "age of reason" spread all over Europe causing so many deaths that it was like the nations were given blood to drink. Verse 6.

Next, God's wrath was poured on the sun and it scorched men. A scorching sun is a proper symbol of tyrant rulers. God raised up Napoleon, whom He used to punish the nations who had torched, banished and killed thousands upon thousands of God's faithful children.

The fifth vial of wrath was poured upon the seat of the beast. This is the throne or ruling power of the great Catholic churches. The pope's great power which had controlled all men from beggars to kings was broken, after the fifth vial of wrath was poured upon the earth.

God's wrath poured upon the earth made many changes.

12 And the sixth angel poured out his vial [of the wrath of God] upon the great river Euphrates; and the water thereof was dried up, that the way of the kings of the east might be prepared.

13 And I saw three unclean spirits like frogs come out of the mouth of the dragon, and out of the mouth of the beast, and out of the mouth of the false prophet.

14 For they are the spirits of devils, working miracles, which go forth unto the kings of the earth and of the whole world, to gather them to the battle of that great day of God Almighty.

15 Behold, I come as a thief. Blessed is he that watcheth, and keepeth his garments, lest he walk naked, and they see his shame.

16 And he gathered them together into a place called in the Hebrew tongue Armageddon.

17 And the seventh angel poured out his vial into the air, and there came a great voice out of the temple of heaven, from the throne, saying, It is done.

18 And there were voices, and thunders, and lightnings; and there was a great earthquake, such as was not since men were upon the earth, so mighty an earthquake, and so great.

The Message: There are unclean spirits in every false religion. For this reason we must be very careful to study God's Word and obey it.

This is the third week we have been studying about the seven last plagues. This Revelation of the sixth and seventh plague will show what God will be doing right up to the end of the world. When the seventh vial of God's wrath is poured upon the earth, that will be the end.

The first five vials were poured upon people who either had the mark of the beast or worshipped his image. However, the sixth vial affects the "whole world." Verse 14.

In this vision we see the great river Euphrates being dried up and three unclean spirits like frogs appear. These unclean spirits did not come from the bottomless pit, as we might suppose. They came out of the mouth of the dragon, the beast, and the false prophet. These represent all religions of the world: 1. The dragon represents a pagan worship; a religion of worshipping things other than God. This could include evil spirits, heathen gods, images, the state, a person, oneself, reason, etc. 2. The beast is papal worship. This is any worship, having the name of Christian, but worshiping images, dead saints, rituals, etc. 3. The false prophet is a new symbol. It represents Protestant worship. Christian religions who use the Bible, have a false humility, but do not live in harmony with God's Word are found in this group. From all these religions came the unclean spirits.

The unclean spirits are spirits of devils, sent out to deceive all who will not stay close to God. These spirits can work miracles. They go to kings, or to leaders of nations where they can have an effect on more people.

There is one unclean spirit that perhaps is the most seducing of all. It is the spirit of, "I'm alright, you're alright." This sounds like a good way of thinking. It appears kind, thoughtful, and considerate of others. We must be kind, thoughtful and considerate of others, but to make a person feel good about his spiritual condition when he is headed for great suffering, is not being very kind. This spirit will also cause people to accept sin in their own lives. This will cause them to also lose their souls, unless it is discovered and pardoned by Jesus.

When the seventh vial of God's wrath is poured upon the earth, the angel said, "It is done." The judgment of God will be set and that will end time and the world. The lightnings, great earthquake, cities falling, islands and mountains not found, and the great hailstorm are a descriptive picture of great destruction at the end.

Another thing to note is that through all this destruction, no one dies. The hail weighed a talent. The weight of a Jewish talent was said to be 114 pounds. Such a mass of descending ice would kill and destroy everything it fell upon, but nothing is said about anyone being killed. These hailstones must have fallen on the souls of men.

The soul cannot be killed. Everyone's soul will stand before the judgment of God and give account of the things he did while living. To be protected from God's wrath, we must seek salvation through faith in Jesus Christ, then make it our life's goal to live according to God's Word. In this way we shall escape the plague of God's wrath.

In today's lesson, MYSTERY BABYLON is pictured as a lewd, impure woman who has made herself drunk with the blood of martyred saints. These she killed while warring to stamp out Christ's true church. Being carried by a blasphemous beast shows us that a pagan civil power with seven kings will sustain her for a long time. Later, however, ten other kings will give their power and strength to her, (verse 13). Throughout the book of Revelation "women" represent churches. So we see that MYS-TERY BABYLON is a church that will control kings, multitudes, nations and tongues (verse 15). What church controlled the kings and rulers of all Europe for many years? This church is pictured as not just drunk with wine, but drunk with the blood of martyrs. It is a picture of a pretty bad church. Besides being drunk herself, she caused the people of the earth to be drunk (verse 2). This church is rich for the woman is richly dressed. Therefore she may look good to the natural man, but at heart she is a beast. The organization that supported her was named blasphemy.

The church is called MYSTERY BABYLON. A mystery is something not clearly understood. How this church could be pictured as a drunken, impure, unholy lady is a mystery to people who are not saved, for the church teaches men to believe in Jesus Christ. to love their neighbors, etc. It is also called Christian. It also encourages idol worship by the prayers people are taught to say as they bow before images. Gods commandment is "Thou shalt not make... any image,... Thou shalt not bow

down...to them." (Exodus 20:4-5.) All over the world one can see cathedrals adorned with beautiful images used for worshipping. All those whose names are not written in the Book of Life will wonder at her. Verse 8.

She made the inhabitants of the earth drunk. A drunk person is one whose mind is intoxicated so he is unable to make right decisions. People who attend false churches become intoxicated on the doctrines of those churches. They are then drunk and unable to understand what God's Word is speaking to them.

This evil church will continually make war with God's true church. Verse 14. Some of the wars in years past have been bloody and cruel, and many of God's children have died. Today the war is a quiet seductive war. Its main purpose is still to destroy God's work in the earth by killing men's godly spirits.

Lela was baptized in the Ganges River, not to wash away her sins, but as a testimony that her sins were already gone, and that she was a part of God's church which He loves so dearly.



Helpless Horror

Walter Skowron lived in a cabin on the side of the mountain near the Big Thompson River. When the terrible flash flood surged down the canyon on that fateful night of July 31, 1976, Walter and his family were safe in their cabin. But many others died in the horrible flood. The following is what Walter told about it.

"The electricity went out at approximately 8:45 p.m. The rain continued. By this time it was a torrential downpour, and we could only see a few feet in front of us.

"We had no idea what was happening for we had no battery-powered radio. Jerry, a friend who lived near by, had a CB radio in his Scout, so we tried to get news about the storm on the CB emergency band. All we heard were calls for help from people in panic who were camped along the river. Since CB reception is limited in the mountains, we knew those calling out were close by. 'I'm trapped in my van with my wife and two children,' said one. 'Help us! oh,...' And then, silence. We heard calls of terror, calls of panic, and calls of pain all through the night.

"I've never been so close to death before—and it's something you don't easily forget. I still wake up in the middle of the night and think about what happened. I only pray no one ever has to go through anything like that again."

That great flood that surged down the Big Thompson Canyon was terrible, but infinitely more fearful will be the judgment of God against sin. God's judgment will sweep over this whole world. By their actions, many have put to death the Son of God. This world is stained with His blood. This world is guilty for the death of His Son. Yet God in grace, has used the death of Christ to bring salvation to man. "For God so loved the world. that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16.

Walter Skowron could only listen in helpless horror to the cries of terror of those caught in the flood. This reminds us of the impossibility of helping those who wait too long in their sins. Someday it will be too late to come to Christ for salvation.

How Walter longed to rescue those in the flood. Just so your Christian family and friends long to rescue you from sin, but they cannot rescue you. Many of the symbols used in this lesson have been used before, and will of course have the same meanings. 1. The white horse is a symbol of conquering. 2. Eyes as a flame of fire denotes Christ's power to search the hearts and minds. He knows every thought. 3. Crowns are signs of victory. 4. Clean white linen represents righteousness. 5. Fowls are evil spirits. 6. The Beast is an idolatrous form of worship underneath the name of Christianity. 7. The False prophet is any false form of Christian worship. 8. The sword is the Word of God.

Now that we have reviewed the symbols, let's interpret the vision. On the rider's clothing is written, KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS. We know then that the vision is of Jesus, when He comes to judge the world and conquer evil spirits. In other Revelations we have seen Jesus as a meek Lamb being slain. That was His mission as our Saviour. In this vision, however, He is treading the winepress of the wrath of God. He is coming to judge evil deeds and avenge the saints who have been martyred.

God speaks to men by bringing thoughts to their minds, of their condition before Him. But after He has dealt many times and they do not respond, He often allows evil spirits to deceive them into thinking they are all right. This is symbolized by the fowls eating men's flesh. Remember, Babylon was full of evil spirits and staying in Babylon is an easy way to become the prey of a false spirit and be deceived.

Number 404 in Evening Light Songs, describes this condition:

The Great Sacrifice

God is sweeping thro' the nations, With an awful scarching eye; Ev'ry spot of imperfection Must be purged, or hope must die.

Jesus gave his life to purchase
For himself a spotless bride
All who fear him and obey him.

Christianity Bound the Dragon

Emperor Constantine did for the Christians what Abraham Lincoln did for the American slaves.

Flavius Valerius Aurelius Constantinus (his offical name) was born to Emperor Constantinus and his wife Helena. Constantinus' father believed in one God and was considered to be a godly man. He showed a gentle, kindly spirit toward all his subjects, and a friendly attitude toward divine truths. He did not allow God's children to be abused, nor did he take their churches and private properties, as other emperors did. After he died, he was proclaimed as one of the gods by the Romans, and great honors were bestowed on him.

Constantine had many reasons to admire his father. He also had reasons to dislike him. When Constantine was seventeen, his father abandoned and divorced his beloved mother, and married Emperor Maximian's stepdaughter.

Constantine had been appointed emperor by his father before his death. However, others struggled for the seat. The tyrannical Maxentius was the one who posed the most threat to Constantine. In October, 312 A.D. Constantine met with Maxentius near the Tiber River outside of Rome. He was in great distress, because of his inferior

troops. He also felt sure that Maxentius was relying on magical enchantments of evil spirits to destroy him. "Should I sacrifice to these Roman gods? Will they protect me?" He questioned. He thought of different things that had happened in his life, and decided that the pagan gods did not protect their worshippers. Then his father's belief in the one true God came forcibly to his mind. "The God of my father protects his children, so I shall pray to Him," he decided.

It was in early afternoon. His soldiers lay resting while he prayed. "I don't know who You are, but I do so need help," he said to God.

Suddenly a beautiful cross appeared in the sky. Under the cross were written these words, "In this sign you will conquer." The astonished soldiers and Constantine trembled with fear. They all knew the cross was a sign of Christ.

Using the sign would associate them with the hated Christians. Although a persecuted, sought-out people, the Christians were growing in numbers every day. When one was martyred, sometimes ten or more would join the ranks. The blood of the saints was the seed which produced more Christians. Famine, pestilence, and wars were ragging in the land. A new, strange disease had attacked, leaving hundreds of men, women, and children blind. The famine was so great that in some city centers beggars fell down in the streets, too



Binding and Loosing the Dragon

Revelation 20:1-10

- 1 And I saw an angel come down from heaven, having the key of the bottom-less pit and a great chain in his hand.
- 2 And he laid hold on the dragon, that old scrpent, which is the Devil, and Satan, and bound him a thousand years,
- 3 And cast him into the bottomless pit, and shut him up, and set a seal upon him, that he should deceive the nations no more, till the thousand years should be fulfilled: and after that he must be loosed a little season.

In Revelation a dragon has represented a pagan form of worship. It is one form of devil worship, therefore the dragon is called the devil and satan. Throughout the ages, artists have used dragons as emblems of evil, destructive forces which, of course, have their roots in the devil. Many pictures of good men or angels as victors over a dragon were painted to symbolize Christianity conquering paganism.

Now that we understand the dragon is an evil spirit, not the devil himself, nor a huge animal running around on the earth, let's see how he was bound. When Jesus came to earth, the majority of people worshipped evil spirits by worshipping idols. Jesus brought a salvation that freed people from these spirits. This was the beginning of the dragon being bound. As this Christianity spread over the earth, more and more people turned from worshipping evil spirits to worshipping Christ.

So many people became Christians that civil laws were established that prohibited any other form of worship. Thus the dragon was truly bound for a long period of time. Remember that Revelation is a book of symbols, so 1,000 years is not actually 1,000 years, but a long period of time.

After that long period of time, the dragon was loosed, and is now deceiving the nations. His anti-Christian spirit began to be loosed before the French Revolution. Men, filled with evil spirits, organized secret clubs whose secret password was "crush the wretch." The wretch was Jesus.

These club members spoke blasphemies against Christ. They printed evil books and either sold or gave them to others. They went into schools, universities, churches, governments and workplaces and changed the way people thought about being Christian. It was soon called the "Age of Reason" and the Goddess of Reason was worshipped every ten days. Some of these clubs such as the Masons are active today, but many have disintegrated. However, the spirit against Christ, which they loosed, is gathering more strength every day.

The world's Parliament of Religions met in Chicago to unite all religions. Baptists and Buddhists, Catholics and Confucians (Chinese philosophers), Presbyterians and Parsees (fire worshippers), Methodists and Moslems (disciples of Mohammed) were there worshipping together. Yes, satan is gathering the dragon, the beast and the false prophet together to war against his people. It is now being taught that all religions are good. "We are all going to heaven," they say. "Each has his own road to get there." But the Bible teaches that only through faith in Christ can a person enter heaven.

We must all be careful that the spirit of the dragon does not get hold of us. It will, if we try to know God through false religions.

weak to walk, and cried out for bread until they died. Sometimes their dead bodies lay for days before anyone would bury them.

Among the Christian community death from hunger did not exist. Bread was delivered to the poor daily. The Christians helped each other bury his dead, sometimes three or four of the same family at one time. Yes, the Christian way was better, Constantine knew that

Crosses were inscribed on his soldiers' armor. Some historians say he ordered the Greek letters, chi and rho, to be marked on their shields. These are the first two letters of Christ's name

The Milvian Bridge, where Constantine met Maxentius is still standing. The event was strange and very much like that of the Egyptians being drowned in the Red Sea for the protection of Moses and God's children. Maxentius had constructed for his troops a strong bridge of boats from one bank of the Tiber River to the other. As Maxentius, his body guards, and other special men were crossing, the floating bridge collapsed and in a moment the boats, men and all went to the bottom.

His victory gave Constantine authority to make laws favorable for the Christians. Immediately he gave "command that Christians and non-Christians alike should be allowed to keep the faith of their own religious beliefs and worship." This caused great rejoicing among the Christian community.

Soon afterwards he sent personal letters to the leaders of the churches throughout the empire. These letters were accompanied by honors and gifts of money. Churches were to be re-established and new ones built. A few years before Christians were meeting in secret; now congregations from different cities and providences met together. Great dedication ceremonies were held where thousands met, also huge outdoor gatherings.

Next Constantine sent copies of imperial ordinances commanding that

all confiscated property be handed over to the Christian body immediately, "by energetic action...without any delay." Money prestige and honor poured into the church.

Constantine's mother, Helena, also became a leader among the Christians. Still having a pagan mind, she found and restored historical sites sacred to the Christian community. She made pilgrimages to Bethlehem and Jerusalem, and sponsored the building of churches there.

Beautiful cathedrals were being built all over the empire. People everywhere turned from the pagan worship and became Christians. Now the pagan temples were empty. These temples filled with idols were also given to the Christian church. How was all this used to bind the dragon? Before Constantine ruled, being a Christian was forbidden by law. After him, being a pagan worshipper was forbidden by law. When these laws were enforced, the pagan spirit was bound. This spirit is represented as a dragon, so the dragon was bound

God used Constantine to free the Christians just as He used Lincoln to free the slaves.


When God appears to judge the world, the earth and sky will be dissolved. Il Peter 3:10. There will be no more opportunity to be saved.

Verse 4 says there will be no tears or sorrow in the new earth. The prophet Samuel tells us that kings bring sorrow, for they tax, they take men's sons for soldiers and their daughters for servants. Jesus will be the only King in the new earth. Also there is to be no more pain in the new earth. Will there be any need for lawyers if there are no more painful problems to bring before lawyers?

The new heaven and earth will be a place of eternal bliss. God will dwell among His people. In one way God dwells with His children now. His spirit is in our hearts as a Comforter, but there are times of chastisement when He seems far away. In that new earth, He will always be near.

Although this is not quite the end of this book, it is a picture of what will happen after the earth is destroyed. Notice that God calls himself Alpha and Omega. That is the name He gave Himself in the beginning of these revelations (chapter 1:8,11). It is very important that we believe that God is the beginning of all things, (the Creator of all) and He is the end of all things. In the end, He will judge and decide if we are eligible to enjoy the new heaven and earth, or if we will be one of those cast into the lake that burneth with fire and brimstone. That is the second death. Revelation 2:11 reads, "... He that overcometh shall not be hurt of the second death." We must keep our faith in Jesus, and He will help us to overcome every temptation or trial that comes into our lives, then we will be ready to go to heaven as the little girl's mother did.





It is the story that Jesus was crucified and arose on the third day!

14 And if this come to the governor's ears, we will persuade him, and secure you.

15 So they took the money, and did as they were taught: and this saying is commonly reported among the Jews until this day.

Let's Talk . . .

Jesus really is the Son of God, for the whole world has changed because of Him. It is very evident that many things about His trial and death were done dishonestly. (Telling the lie that the disciples stole Jesus' body is just one of them.) Have you known of anyone who was arrested in the evening and who was tried the same night? Yes, all night long Jesus' prosecutors hounded accusations at Him. What happened to Jesus' chance to get an attorney to speak for him? Why was He not given the opportunity to build His case and defend Himself? Why did the presiding judge not adjourn the trial in the evening and continue it the following morning? There might be different answers to these questions. But a very important one is that Jesus was being tried by people feverishly anxious to convict and kill him.

Their anxiety increased when he was still living Friday evening. The following day was the Sabbath. They pretended to be wanting to keep the Sabbath to please God. "We must get Him off the cross before sundown," they said, "for God would be displeased if we do any work after that time, for it is a holy Sabbath of God." They must have forgotten that God said, "I love mercy rather than sacrifice," and that all God's laws are based on love. He wants only justice for every man.

How could any person in Jerusalem believe a report that came from such prejudiced, bloodthirsty leaders? But many did and that is why it is commonly reported among the Jews that Jesus was not resurrected.

There are people who are not Jews. who say that Jesus was not Lord but only a man. They say He never arose. If He was only a man like other religious leaders, why has the world never been the same since He lived? The broad ages that span time from the first Easter morning until now have always had followers of this Jesus. Today there are millions of Christ's believers around the world. Even those who choose not to follow Him are affected by His coming, for every calendar has its reference point in the vear of Jesus' birth. Jesus wrote no books, established no school nor university, led no armies, explored no new territories, nor conquered a nation.

He died at the age of 33. His death was not honored, but was that of a common criminal. Yet after His resurrection His small group of frightened disciples became filled with His power and boldly preached, "There is salvation only through the name of Jesus. "This small movement changed the entire world. Who then could believe that Jesus' body was taken out of the grave by His followers, and that He did not walk out of the grave by His own power? Yes, Jesus' trial and crucifixion were a fraud, but it was all in God's plan that each of us could have salvation through His resurrected Son.


Mr. Ramirez, another suffering worker, invited them to share his meals and the tree under which he found a little protection.

(A note about the men walking to Emmaus.)

One was Cleopas, often called Alphaeus. He was the father of Apostle James (Mark 3:18) and the husband of the Virgin Mary's sister, (John 19:25). Historians believe the other man was Luke, the author of the Bible book called Luke.

If the disciples had understood the scriptures they could have rejoiced at Jesus' death. For they would have known that He would rise again. However, they did not understand the prophecies of Christ and were terribly sorry that He had been crucified. Sadly, two of them left Jerusalem for Emmaus. As the men walked they discussed whether or not Jesus was the King that God had promised to send. "Could He be?" one questioned.

"He could be, if He is again alive," the other answered.

"But is He alive or is this a rumor we have heard?"

The Jews believed that knowing the law of God was the most important thing in life. It was common for them to talk about it as they walked from place to place. Deuteronomy 6:7 says, "...talk of them...when thou walkest by the way,..." As the men continued walking, Jesus, in form of a stranger, joined them. After listening a while He questioned them about the happenings which had made them so sad. Then He began helping them understand that it was God's plan that one man die for the sins of the world.

Cleopas and Luke felt a warm, soothing feeling in their hearts, as He spoke the holy scriptures.

"Oh foolish men why do you not believe all the prophets have spoken?" He asked. How the two men wished they had studied and understood the things that the stranger spoke. It would have saved them a lot of worry and trouble. By evening when they reached the village, this stranger had proved by the scriptures that their friend, Jesus, was the man God had sent to give His blood to save all men.

As they sat down to eat together, Jesus took the bread and blessed it and gave a piece to each of the men. Suddenly they realized the stranger was Jesus. Then He vanished.

"Let's hurry back to Jerusalem and tell the Apostles that Jesus is alive and well," one said.

"If we had known all those scriptures He told us about, we could have rejoiced when Jesus died," the other answered. In the darkness, the two started back over the long, dusty road that they had traveled during the day.

Jesus appears in some way to all men. He had spoken to Mary in the garden early in the morning. Later that day He appeared as a stranger and walked along talking with two disciples as they went from Jerusalem to Emmaus. Being late in the day they convinced Him to spend the night with them, and while He blessed the food before eating, they realized the stranger was Jesus! Then He vanished!

The excitement of seeing Jesus alive again spurred the weary disciples. They walked the seven and one half miles back to Jerusalem to find the apostles. Excitedly they said, "Jesus is risen indeed. He did appear to Simon, and to us."

Suddenly, without a door or window opening, Jesus was with them. He said, "Peace be unto you."

The terrified disciples and apostles looked at one another. "Oh my, a spirit!" each wanted to say, but no one spoke. The dread silence was broken when Jesus, knowing their thoughts, said, "Why are you afraid? Why do you think so? Look at My hands and My feet. Touch Me. Does a spirit have flesh and bones?"

They breathed a sigh of relief, as happiness replaced their fears. "Now let's have something to eat," Jesus said. "Do you have any meat?" They gave Him a piece of broiled fish and part of a honeycomb. He ate it.

Some unbelievers say they, too, would believe if Jesus would ap-

"Where did you meet him?"


"On the street, Sir."

Later, Amador, Ramon and Hilberto were transported together to the Tijuana jail. This jail is famous for its cramped quarters, lack of food and unsanitary conditions. Relatives are expected to bring food, clothes, blankets, etc. to the prisoner. The more trusted prisoners are allowed to have lumber brought in with which they build their own shelters. Amador and Hilberto's families were nearly 1,500 kilometers (900 miles) away. Who would help them?

At 7:00 A.M. the next morning a guard unlocked the bars, opened the wooden door and placed on the floor a small chili-pepper can, full of hot water with a few oats cooked in it. Five hours later, one hard piece of bread and one-half slice of bologna was put inside the cell. In the evening, they received another piece of bread and bologna. The menu never changed. They ate only oats, bread and bologna, every day the whole month of June.

Besides the daily three hours of savage interrogation, Amador had nothing to do. He never saw Hilberto, and wondered if he had been sent to another prison or turned loose. He was never given anything to read, no paper on which to write, nor any small craft to occupy his time. There were many days that he never left the cell. He had no exercise nor any sun shine. The tiny, concrete block cell was empty except for a piece of cardboard. He tried talking to the stone walls, hoping the echo of his voice would calm the emptiness he felt from lack of conversation. The cell was too small to produce an echo. All he heard was the dry mournful sound of his own dehydrated voice. His only companions were the ceaseless hammerings of the question, "Why am I here?" and a beastly, gnawing of anger.

The cell had a wooden door inside the bars. An earlier prisoner had carved a picture of the Virgin of Guadalupe on it. Jesus gives power to those who will tarry before Him until they are filled with the Holy Spirit. This is the eighth lesson we have had about. Jesus' visits with men, after His death on the cross. Easter Sunday is the day we celebrate His resurrection. (His returning to life). Early that morning He appeared to Mary, then to a group of His disciples. That same afternoon He walked the road to Emmaus with other followers and in the evening appeared suddenly among His apostles and other disciples who were together in a room. What a busy first Easter that must have been!

Jesus was seen of the believers for thirty-nine more days. During this time all were convinced that He was not a spirit but a living human. On one occasion He was seen of 500 brethren at the same time.

On the fortieth day, a group of followers met with Him on the Mount of Olivet. There He gave His last two commandments. The commands were:

1. Tarry in Jerusalem unto you are endued with power from God. 2. Be my witnesses throughout the world.

After giving these instructions, He ascended up into the sky, and the cloud of distance hid Him from His admirers who were straining to catch just one more glimpse.

Jesus' last words were for all believers. He is speaking them to us today. He says, "Tarry before God until the power of the Holy Spirit fills your being, then you can witness for Me." The Greek word that was translated "power" can also mean "energy." You have studied in science that "energy" is the capacity for performing

work. There is internal energy and inherent energy. Inherent energy is energy that is permanently joined, that is, it cannot be separated. This kind of energy is obtained by a permanent decision to do God's will.

In physics we learn that energy has two forms. One is kinetic energy. It can be reduced to nothing by no motion, or increased by rapid motion. The other, called potential energy, is related to position. Potential energy is always present, but it can be increased according to the position of an object.

The Holy Spirit is potential energy in our lives. The power is always there, but it can be increased by our position. A person's position is the stand he takes on an issue. Taking a strong stand to live for God and never giving up, will increase our energies for living and witnessing for Jesus.

Are you ashamed to tell others you are a Christian? Does living a pure, modest life, embarrass you? When the opportunity comes, do you avoid telling others you believe that salvation from eternal damnation comes only by faith in the blood of Jesus? The Holy Spirit will cause you to feel differently about these things. It supplies an inward confidence and boldness that is above a natural ability. His spirit gives power to do for God instead of for self. Let us all tarry before God until He fills us with the Holy Spirit.

They will soon be cut off and destroyed, but the righteous shall be held by God's hand, guided by His Spirit, and received into glory!"

The sanctuary was a place in the temple where David could talk to God.

Attending church is a way we can communicate with God. While we are quietly listening to God's Word he talks to us, helping us see that living for God is the best way after all. We visit with others whom God is blessing. We may hear a testimony that encourages our hearts. Suddenly we say with King David, "It is good for me to draw near to the Lord." Attending church has gotten us back on track.



The apostles worshipped much the same way we do today. On the first day of the week, they met either in a public building or in someone's home. There was one person in charge of the activities. Although there may have been many ready to speak, only two or three spoke and the others judged. Sometimes even when there was only one speaker, the meetings lasted a long time, as in the case when Paul preached until midnight and the young man fell out of the window from the third floor. He was taken up for dead, and Paul quit preaching and rushed down to pray for the man, who was revived. Then they ate a midnight snack and Paul talked on until the break of day.

The congregation was also expected to contribute to the service. They were to study God's Word and be able to converse about it, using a Psalm or other scripture to exhort the others. They were also expected to sing and pray in the spirit and with understanding, and to have special hymns to share.

Collecting offerings was another activity of the service. Each person was instructed to put aside a portion of money according to how God had blessed him that week. Then when a need arose, there was money ready for the need.

How exciting to have been in a worship service with the apostles! I can imagine Peter in his quick impulsive ways, blurting out when a period of silence lasted too long. I can imagine Matthew keeping notes of all that was said.

We have the same conditions in our congregations; people of different temperaments and backgrounds are worshipping God together. One may think the service is dragging, another believes it is perfect. One thinks there is too much emotion, another believes there isn't enough. We lay those individual ideas aside and worship God in spirit and in truth, as Jesus commands.

On the first day of the week, we gather with other saints and worship God, singing, praying, listening to a sermon, exhorting and giving an offering. That is the way the apostles worshipped God after Jesus went back to heaven.

The parable of the vineyard teaches that men will be punished who continually reject God's messengers and refuse to give Him what is due to Him. The owner of this vineyard is God. That is when He created "grass, and herb yielding seed after his kind, and the tree yielding fruit, whose seed was in itself, after his kind." Then on day six, God made man to tend His vineyard, the beautiful earth.

As you know, man was not content to do as God said, so he disobeyed and got into much, much trouble. From that time until now, God has been sending godly men to help the ungodly come again into communion with Him. But as the parable says, men (the husbandmen) have rejected those leaders and prophets which God has sent. Some have been ignored, others stoned, beaten or killed. Samson paid a high price for breaking God's law. There is always a penalty paid when one of God's laws are disobeyed. The one we will discuss today is pertaining to accidental fires. The law said, "If fire break out, and catch in thorns, so that the stacks of corn, or the standing corn, or the field, be consumed therewith; he that kindled the fire shall surely make restitution."

This means that if a fire we have started destroys the property of another person, he who starts the fire must pay for the damages.

Samson set a fire that destroyed corn, grapes and olives. He made no restitution to the owner, therefore he disobeyed God.

Samson had a reason to be angry. but vet he should not have broken God's law. Anytime a law is broken, there is trouble. People may get by for a long time, but sooner or later the trouble will come. Samson broke several laws and got out of trouble, time after time. After many years, he was captured by his enemies. Then his eves were put out and he was taken down to Gaza where he was bound with fetters of brass in the prison house and forced to grind their grain. Day after day he worked in darkness. He ate the meager rations of a prisoner and slept in the damp dungeon.

Samson suffered severely because of his disobedience, and so does every person. The devil often tricks people into thinking that they can disobey and not suffer. Cain, Lot, Esau, Jacob, Saul and Judas suffered for breaking God's laws.

Regardless of the excuse, all who disobey God will suffer for it.



A Law Jesus Changed

Exodus 22:1-5, 7-8, 12

New word: 1. Restitution is giving an equal amount for loss or damage.

- 1 If a man shall steal an ox, or a sheep, and kill it, or sell it; he shall restore five oxen for an ox, and four sheep for a sheep.
- 2 If a thief be found breaking up, and be smitten that he die, there shall no blood be shed for him.
- 3 If the sun be risen upon him, there shall be blood shed for him; for he should make full restitution; if he have nothing, then he shall be sold for his theft.
- 4 If the theft be certainly found in his hand alive, whether it be ox, or ass, or sheep; he shall restore double.
- 5 If a man...shall put in his beast, and shall feed in another man's field; of the best of his own field,...shall he make restitution.
- 7 If a man shall deliver unto his neighbour money or stuff to keep, and it be stolen out of the man's house; if the thief be found, let him pay double.
- 8 If the thief be not found, then the master of the house shall be brought unto the judges, to see whether he have put his hand unto his neighbour's goods.
- 12 And if it be stolen from him, he shall make restitution unto the owner thereof.

Jesus' Law About Stolen Goods Luke 6:28-30, 32-35

- 28 Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you.
- 29 And unto him that smiteth thee on the one check offer also the other; and him that taketh away thy cloke forbid not to take thy coat also.
- 30 Give to every man that asketh of

thee; and of him that taketh away thy goods ask them not again.

- **32** For if ye love them which love you, what thank have ye? for sinners also love those that love them.
- **33** And if ye do good to them which do good to you, what thank have ye? for sinners also do even the same.

Jesus said He did not come to abolish the laws that God had given to Moses, but to fulfill them. He did, however make some changes in the laws. The law about stealing is one. He did not reverse the law and say that stealing is okay. No. He said, if you have been a thief, quit stealing. Go to work and provide for yourself and family. Then give to others in place of taking from them.

The part of the law that Jesus changed was how we deal with the thief. The Law said, "If a thief be found [stealing]...and be smitten [hit] that he die, there shall no blood be shed for him. But, "If the sun be risen upon him, there shall be blood shed for him...." In those times, a person who committed a planned murder was to be killed for it. That is what is meant by the phrase "blood be shed." If a man protecting his things killed another, in the darkness, it was not considered murder. Fighting until someone was killed to avoid loss was considered murder during daylight. Jesus said. "Don't fight over things. If a man takes away thy cloak forbid not to take thy coat also." That is the only part of the law that Jesus changed.

Jesus commands Christians to make restitution for things they have stolen while in sin. Restitution is giving back or paying the equal value of something. Sometimes it is paying more than the value. In the olden times a man earned his living by using his oxen. If an ox was stolen, the man not only lost the ox, but also the money he could have been earning with the ox. A thief was expected to pay back either two or four prices of an ox, depending on what the situation was.

Many, many people have gotten special blessings for repaying stolen goods. Some have confessed to crimes which should have required a jail sentence. In every case I have heard about, the person was forgiven the crime. Many have been forgiven of great amounts of money and never had to pay. Others have experienced leading the offended person to salvation after making restitutions. Jesus commands thieves to make restitution, and He will bless them for doing it.

Jesus taught that the offended person is not to require a restitution. The offended one is to forgive the thief. He is not to fight with his fists, with words. or in attitude to protect his things. Jesus knew that material things are not really very important, when compared with a human. He said we should love our enemies. This is something a sinner cannot do. A sinner gives to those who will return the favor. He loans to those who will pay him back. Jesus said, "My followers must do better than the sinner. They must loan and not expect to be repaid. They must give and expect nothing in return. They must let their things be stolen and not get them back. They must forgive not only seven times in one day, but seventy times seven. All this is impossible without the Holy Spirit living within a person. No, Jesus did not come to take away the responsibility of obeying Moses' law. He came to give us grace to live even better than the law required. -Charlotte Huskey
