"He cry until then," she said with a sigh. "I tired of crying Jesse."


As they drove away, Shana, Zach's sister said, "I'm glad my little brother doesn't cry like that." Zach smiled.

Our lesson today is about God's Word. We have God's written words in the Bible. Each book was written as men were directed by God. As the person was writing, God was putting into his mind the words to be written.

The first book to be written was Genesis. It was written many hundreds of years before John, but both books give the same truth. Genesis 1:1 says, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." John 1:1-3 says, "In the beginning was the Word,...and the Word was God.... All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made..." (The Word was Jesus. John 1:14.)

Many men have studied the Bible trying to prove that it is not true. As they studied, however, many became convinced that it was true and that God is real, for only a supernatural power such as God could have inspired such a Book. The books were written in different countries by people who did not know each other or what the other had written, yet their messages fit together like pieces of an interlocking puzzle.

Here are some other reasons why men have come to believe that the Bible is God's Word: They read where it said that the Assyrians would be destroyed and saw that they were destroyed. They read that the country of Israel would be destroyed. They saw it was destroyed. They followed the advice given in Proverbs and found that it worked for their good. They read that Christ said, "Come unto me and I will give you rest." Whatever was in the Bible they found to be true.

God's words are different from the words of people. Men's words have power according to the authority given them of God. Here are some examples: An angry king's words can cause his whole country to tremble. By his words, the President of the United States can control all the armed forces. The principal of your school can order all the children to go home, and they will go. The words of your city mayor have power, so do those of your mother and father. But none of their words have power to create a world, calm a storm, heal the sick or raise dead people. God's Words do.

No person's words will stand forever. When a king dies, his words have no power. When a president is out of office, he has no power. God's Word lasts forever. Heaven and earth will pass away, but God's Word will not.

Man's words must be broadcast to reach many people. God's Words can be in all places at the same time. He can speak to you in the United States of America and to someone in Japan at the same time.

Besides these differences, God's Word has supreme authority. All other authority is under Him. Even though people may ignore God's Word while they are living, at the end of their life their actions will be judged by what it says. There is no way to escape the authority of God's Word. For this reason it is very important to know what God says.

There are many commandments in God's Word. For the next twelve lessons we will be studying a portion of God's Word called the Ten Commandments. We will also study the new commandment which Jesus gave. Most of the rules of conduct in the Bible are based on these commandments. God is pleased when we obey them.

"An egg is easily broken," Sandy said. "I don't see how God can be like an egg."



Exodus 20:1, 3

And God spake all these words, saying. Thou shalt have no other gods before me.

Deuteronomy 13:1-3

A god is a being thought to have more than human powers and also worthy of worship. But God is a spirit of love, who created all things. So He is the originator. He is omniscient, which means that He knows all things. He is also omnipotent, that is, He has unlimited power. God has always been and will never die. God is in every place at the same time. Please note that God begins with a large, capital letter. The other is a god. It begins with a small letter.

The first man and woman worshiped the true God that had created everything. But they did not always obey Him. When they disobeyed, sin entered into the world.

After sin entered the world, people turned away from God. They worshiped the natural forces that they did not understand such as the sun, wind and rain. Later people gave forms to their gods. Some were thought to look like men, with bodies, voices and human desires.

Each country had its own imagination of gods, so images were made according to their many different imaginations. Worship services were as varied as were the gods.

While most people believed in many gods, the Hebrews worshiped only the true God. Because of this, they were called the Children of God, and God blessed them above all the other nations. He commanded, "Thou shalt have no other gods before me." The Hebrews loved and served this invisible God for hundreds of years.

After they became a great nation, there was trouble and the nation divided. One king built an idol for his people to worship, hoping this would

keep them from going back into the other nation to worship the true God. It did keep the people under his control, but God was displeased.

Some people were not bold enough to bow to this image but they loved the image because of their patriotic spirit. The image became an idol hidden in their hearts.


Did they cut open their hearts and place the idol inside? No. An idol is not always an image made of metal or stone.

Anything that is loved very, very much can become an idol. Sometimes people say, "Little Michael is the idol of his family." Michael is not their god. But the family loves him and is devoted to him. If God wants to take Michael on to heaven and the family is unwilling to let God take the child, then Michael has become their idol. Anything we love more than God is an idol.

God said He would set His face against those who have idols in their hearts. It would be horrible to have God's face turned against us. The air we breathe, our food, our strength, our happiness all come from God. We cannot be happy without His approval. So let us always keep idols out of our hearts.

God loves us and gives us many blessings. We must love Him with all our heart, with all our soul, with all our strength, and with all our mind. In this way we will be obeying the first of the Ten Commandments. "Thou shalt have no other gods before me."

Exodus 20:4-5

- 4 Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, or any likeness of any thing that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth:
- 5 Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them: for I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate me:

Deuteronomy 4:15-20, 23-26

- 15 Take...heed unto yourselves; for ye saw no manner of similitude [image] on the day that the Lord spake unto you in Horeb out of the midst of the fire:
- 16 Lest ye corrupt yourselves, and make you a graven image, the similitude of any figure, the likeness of male or female.
- 17 The likeness of any beast...the likeness of any winged fowl (bird)...
- 18 The likeness of any thing that creepeth on the ground, the likeness of any fish...

In the beginning God created Adam and placed him in the beautiful garden of Eden. Every evening God came to this beautiful garden and talked with Adam. Later Adam disobeyed God and that caused sadness. He and his wife. Eve. were sent out of the garden. Although they had disobeved God, Adam. Eve and their sons still wanted to be friends of God. Their sons, Cain and Abel, built an altar and sacrificed an offering to God.

Every person is born with the desire to worship God. If they are not taught how to worship the true God. they will worship other things. That is why there are so many religions in the world.

Ancient people worshiped the natural forces which they did not understand. They bowed in worship to the sun, the moon and the stars. Wind, lightening, thunder and rain were also worshiped. Soon men were forming images from wood, stone, gold and silver. These they placed on high altars and bowed in worship of them. As years passed, gods were made in different forms. Some looked like people, some were like animals, or half man and half animal. Gods shaped like birds, fish and creeping animals, were also worshiped.

People all around God's children were worshiping these images. But God strictly commanded that His people not make nor bow down to any images, for God is a spirit. A spirit can be felt but not seen. God said that we should worship Him in faith without seeing anything. Faith is believing He hears and sees our worship, although we cannot see Him.

Many religions use images. Some are pictures, some are statues, others are varied metals formed in different shapes. Any person that worships an image is breaking God's commandment.

A Wooden Gate called a torii is the symbol of Shinto.



The wheel below is an important symbol of Buddhism. It is called both the wheel of the Law and the Wheel of Life.

God showed His love by creating the beautiful world which has in it everything that people need to live comfortably and happily in. The Bible tells us in I Timothy 6:17 that "God gives us richly all things to enjoy." Should we appreciate all God has done for us? Yes, we should, and we should have so much love and respect for God that we will only speak His name in love.

There is great spiritual and physical power in God's name, just as there is great electrical power in a hot, electrical wire. We respect hot, electrical wires because being careless with them may cause much damage or even death. It is the same way with God's name. In God's name there is power for eternal salvation, for healing, for wisdom, for understanding, for money, and other material needs. There is also the power of death in His name.

For these reasons, His name must be highly respected and used only in the proper way. The third of the Ten Commandments, says, "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain." Being guilty before God is very dangerous because God has power to cast into hell. (...Fear him, which after he hath killed hath power to cast into hell; yea, I say unto you, Fear him. Luke 12:5.) Those who take God's name in vain, will be held guilty before God until they ask forgiveness for their offending words.

There are many ways in which a person can "take God's name in vain." Let's discuss just a few of these.

Sinners sometimes "take God's name in vain" by using it when angry. How many times have you said something when angry that you wished you

had never said? It is so very easy to do, that most everyone has done it at one time or another. Sinners often bring God into these angry speeches. They say words that mean, "God is no good," or "I hope God causes something really bad to happen to you." Don't allow yourself to speak God's name when you are angry.

Another way to "take God's name in vain." is to use one of His names when making a promise. Do you ever say, "I promise under God," or "I cross my heart and hope to die?" Do you really hope you will die? Who has power over life and death? Saying such words is bringing God into a promise. Have you ever been to a trial in a courtroom and seen a witness place a right hand on the Bible and raise a left hand then say, "I swear to tell the truth and nothing but the truth so help me God?" When men take political offices they sometimes place one hand on the Bible and swear to do their best in the office. Promising to tell the truth or do our best is good. but if a person is not honestly seeking God to help him speak only the truth, or to do his very best, he or she is taking "God's name in vain." God's name is too sacred to use carelessly when making a promise.

Another way that many are taking "God's name in vain" is by saying they are Christians when they are not. A Christian is a person who believes in Jesus and keeps His commandments. He should at least keep the two which Christ said were the most important. They are, "...Love...God with all thy heart,...soul,...mind, and...strength: and...thy neighbor as thyself." Mark 12:30-31. Many who claim to be Christians do not love the Lord with all their heart, soul, mind and strength, nor their neighbor as themselves. Evil, hateful actions show their lack of love. If we say we are Christian let us show it by our actions. Then we will not be taking God's name in vain.

The name of the God who has done so many marvelous things should be respected above all other names.


employers. Although he practically begged for work, no one hired him.

Honor Your Father and Mother

Exodus 20:12, 21:15, 17

Many, many years ago God made the earth, sun, moon, stars and sky. Then He made all the animals that live on earth. Last of all He made a man and a woman.

God breathed into man's nostrils and he became a living soul. Every human born is a living soul. God also gave the animals breath, but it was not the breath of God, therefore, they did not become living souls. When a man or woman's breath is gone, the life that God put within them is gone.

A person's life is sacred because people are a special creation of God. Therefore, God gave the commandment, "Thou shalt not kill." People are not to kill people. God allows them to kill animals but not each other. God gave each person life, and only He has authority to take that life.

God put a penalty of death on a murderer unless it was an accidental act which caused the death. If it was accidental, the killer could be protected inside one of the cities of refuge until the time of his trial. If found innocent he was not put to death, but could live inside this city.

Ahab caused a death, although he did not murder. He wanted to buy Naboth's vineyard, but Naboth would not sell. Ahab's wife had Naboth falsely accused and stoned to death. People such as Ahab who caused a murder but did not kill were not put to death by the authorities. They received punishment by an act of God. Ahab was killed in battle.

Jesus taught a stricter law on murder. He said if a man hates his brother he is a murderer, and a murderer has no part in the kingdom of God. Jesus also said that being angry with your brother without a cause was reason to be brought to judgment.

Jesus knew that if one person hates another he can destroy that person by talking evil about him. Therefore Jesus called it murder. It is murdering the person's emotional life. Sometimes murdering a person's emotions can cause sickness and death. It can also cause spiritual death to both the murderer and the murdered.

A common form of murder is abortion. Abortion is taking the life of a tiny, helpless baby. God's laws said that every murderer was to be put to death. That law is not enforced in the United States of America. Our laws protect those who do this evil, but God says He will act with vengeance on such unjust actions.

Let us be very careful that we do not murder anyone by talking against them, by abortion or by killing. We must guard our feelings and not allow hatred or self-ishness to get into our hearts. These are seeds that can fall into our hearts and grow until they are powerful enough to cause us to murder.

Mary hurried away to her room and fell on her knees, thanking God for this blessing. She exchanged her only quilt and homespun sheets for another year's room and board. Before the year was finished, people in the villages around the school were talking about this unusual student. Several school principals came to hire her.

Mary took a school that paid her well. But instead of spending it on herself, buying pretty

clothes and other fine things, she bought more books. She also hired a tutor so she could learn what was being taught in the colleges which she could not enter.

"Sometimes I wish I was a boy, then I could get a scholarship and go to college," she often said. Sometimes this unfairness caused Mary to cry bitterly.

The influence of the school was kept religious, for its leader was a godly woman. Every term of school felt the stirring effects of a revival and many unconverted girls found their Savior while attending the school.

When God created man and woman, he put within them a great desire to love and to be loved. Adam loved Eve and she loved him. Adam and Eve both loved God and they loved the animals that He had created, but they had a stronger love for one another. There was a desire in Adam that only Eve could satisfy. There was a desire in Eve that only Adam could satisfy.

From Adam until now, men have this desire that only a woman can satisfy, and women have a desire that only a man can satisfy. For this reason God instituted marriage. This desire is satisfied in a marriage relationship that God has ordained. If a marriage is out of God's ordained will, the couple will have trouble. They may live together and find some satisfaction, but they will not have the happiness that God intended for them to have.

God planned that a married man and woman stay together until one of them dies. Sometimes, however, men and women divorce and marry someone else. Jesus called this adultery and said plainly that this was not God's plan. There are Christians who say that Jesus allows for divorce if their mate has been untrue, but Jesus did not say that.

But Moses did give permission for divorce on the grounds that the women would suffer extreme abuse if hardhearted men were forced to stay in a marriage which they wanted out of. Moses was having pity on the women, not teaching that men should disobey God's law.

"Thou shalt not commit adultery" is for our good, just as all of God's commandments are. Children need to live together with both parents. There are certain needs a child has that only his or her mother can meet. There are other needs that only the father can satisfy. When parents break God's law and divorce, they not only hurt themselves and their mate, but also the children, the grandparents and other family members.

Adultery and fornication are two sins that carry very sorrowful consequences. If a person steals, the damage can be mended by repaying. If a lie is told, it can be made right again. If a person is untrue to God, he can repent and God will make him a new creature. But adultery can get so involved that sometimes it can never be mended.

Fornication is a sin that affects children. Many adulterous grownups committed fornication when they were children. If you will keep yourself pure before marriage your chances are much higher that you will never commit adultery.

Some young people think that fornication only hurts themselves and no one else. Usually several people are hurt, and if abortion follows there could be scars that will last for a lifetime. Sometimes unwanted children are born. These children may have to suffer many things.

Mother looked sternly at him. "Well, if you do, you will be sorry. Besides my punishment, God will also punish, and He is strong enough to do a good job. No one ever benefits from stealing."

But Eddie did not believe her. That very evening, after a hard day at work, his father emptied his pockets on the dresser, took a bath and lay down to rest. Eddie saw his knife, a handkerchief and some pennies, two nickels and one dime laying there. When his father was asleep Eddie quickly snatched the dime and scampered out of the room. Away he ran down the dirt road, past the rows of brown houses that all looked alike and up the hill to the company store.

"A dime's worth of gumdrops, please," he told the store clerk. He watched the clerk put in red ones that tasted like cinnamon, green ones that tasted like spearmint, and white ones that tasted like peppermint.

"Thou shalt not steal," is the Eighth of the Ten Commandments. You may have heard this commandment many times and know it by memory, but do you know there are many different ways that people steal? Five different types of stealing are mentioned in the scriptures used in this lesson.

In the Ten Commandments, God said, "Thou shalt not steal." Then God gave the penalty for stealing a person. Have you ever thought of kidnapping as a form of stealing? God considers this kind of stealing so terrible that he placed on it a very high penalty. The penalty was death. If the kidnapped person has been sold or is found alive, the kidnapper must die.

God also placed high penalties for stealing useful animals such as oxen and sheep. Besides giving milk, the ox was used to till the fields and carry heavy loads. His owner also earned money doing jobs with the oxen. Losing an ox was like a farmer losing his tractor or a traveling salesman losing his car. Because oxen were so necessary, a thief was to repay its owner five oxen for each one stolen.

Sheep were also very important because they were easy to care for and gave both food and clothing. Thieves who stole sheep were to repay four for each sheep.

God also commanded not to defraud. *Defrauding* is getting money by deliberately misrepresenting something. My uncle bought a car in which bacon rind had been used to quiet the noisy connecting rod bearing. In a few days the motor broke to pieces, and the seller could not be found. He had defrauded my uncle.

Robbing is stealing by force or threat. People are called criminals who rob, but in God's eyes every form of stealing is robbing. When we cheat on a test, we steal a grade we do not deserve. When we are untrue, we rob ourselves of respect.

People can also rob God. How? God is due our praise, love, thanks and a portion of our time and money. When we do not give these things, we are robbing Him. It is as much a sin to rob God as to rob a bank. So watch out. Unless we are careful to give, we will rob God.

Another kind of stealing is exploiting. Exploiting is when an employer works people like slaves and pays them as little as possible. In Bible times, some people had only enough money to buy food for one day at a time. So God commanded the employer to pay every day. If he did not, he was exploiting the poor, and that is a form of stealing.

Jesus taught about stealing also. He said that people should stop stealing and go to work so they could have to give to the needy. This would be a change in attitude. Instead of taking from others, give to others. His standards are to give to those who ask and not expect anything in return, and if others take from us, be willing to give them something else.

All five kinds of stealing are breaking the command, "Thou shalt not steal." God placed a curse on those that steal. He said that they will be cut off, unless they repent of stealing.

"Hello, Eddie," she replied in her usual, pleasant voice. "So she didn't come to punish me," he said to himself. "She doesn't know I took the dime." That was the trouble with stealing, it makes you afraid when there is no reason to be afraid.

When his mother came out of the store, he asked, "What did you buy?"

"Powdered sugar, to make icing for the poppy seed rolls," she answered with a smile.

"Powdered sugar to satisfy my sweettooth," he thought. And those are two more troubles with stealing. There is no *need* for it, and even if you aren't caught, you *feel terribly* bad inside.

At least he had a big, red rubber band to make a slingshot. That was better than having nothing for all that he had been through. But when he reached into his pocket, it was gone. Immediately Eddie started looking for the missing rubber band. For a long time he searched in the tall grass that grew behind the store. Now here was another trouble with

stealing. You never benefit, just as his mother had said.

All Eddie had to show for stealing was trouble. What would he say to his father who had worked hard for the dime? How could he smile for his mother when she gave him a poppy seed roll all covered with sweet icing? He knew she had sacrificed something to be able to buy powdered sugar to satisfy his sweet tooth. He felt too mean to go home. He wanted to hide behind the chicken house and never again see his parents. But he needed a place to sleep and he was so hungry for his mother's rolls.

But Eddie was a strong boy. By the time Mother called, "Come to supper," he had other plans.

When the family was seated around the table, they bowed their heads and Father thanked God for the poppy seed rolls and milk.

Then Eddie told them about the dime, the gumdrops, the big, red rubber band and how badly he felt.

When he finished, they looked at each other with surprise and sorrow. Then Father said, "We will thank our Savior again." He prayed, "Lord, we thank Thee for teaching our son the sadness and wrong of stealing..."

When they had finished praying the second time, the family smiled at him and all the badness of the past was erased.

"Here," Mother said, passing him a roll.
"Now I'm sure this will more than satisfy your sweet tooth."

Never, never in his whole life did a poppy seed roll taste so good to Eddie.

In today's lesson we have the story of Ananias and Sapphira. Several brethren in the congregation where they attended had sold property and had given the money to the apostles. Ananias, and his wife, Sapphira, also sold property so they could give to the apostles. But for some unknown reason they decided to give only a part of the money earned from the sale of the property. That was fine, for it was theirs and they had a right to give whatever they wished to give. The mistake they made was agreeing to pretend that they were giving all the money.

Ananias gave the money to Peter and pretended it was all they had gotten from the sale. When Peter rebuked him for this dishonesty, he fell over dead.

Three hours later Sapphira came into the temple. When Peter asked her about the amount earned from the sale, she gave the same information that her husband had given. Suddenly she, too, fell dead. The men who had buried her husband, carried her out and buried her beside him.

What a great penalty Ananias and Sapphira paid for not being truthful.

We are not likely to see anyone fall over dead because they tell a lie. If this should happen, there would not be many people living in our country, for most every person has told a lie sometime in their life.

We are thankful that God is merciful. There does come a time, however, that the untruthful person will die a spiritual death for being dishonest. God is merciful and will forgive those who repent of their dishonesty and He will restore them to spiritual life again. If a person dies with sins of dishonesty, he will not be able to enter into heaven.

The devil is the father of all lies. If we tell or pretend a lie, we are serving the devil in that way. Do we want to be servants of the devil or servants of Jesus?

Perhaps you would be punished for something you did, so you pretend you did not do it. That is "bearing false witness." Maybe you have copied a lesson and pretended you did not know you should not copy. Pretending to love someone and talking bad about them is another form of "bearing false witness," even if the stories told are true.

Pretending to have character or attitudes which we do not have is another form of "bearing false witness." God wants Christians to be honest about themselves and admit their failures and imperfections. In this way they can grow into a more perfect image of Christ.

Do you have a habit of lying or pretending? God wants you to repent of it, and He will help you to become an honest person. Ananias and Sapphira got into big trouble for pretending.

Coveting is Dangerous

Exodus 20:17

17 Thou shalt not covet. [Covet: An uncontrolled desire for something.]

Deuteronomy 5:21

21 Neither shalt thou desire thy neighbour's wife, neither shalt thou covet thy neighbour's house, his field,...or any thing that is thy neighbour's.

Romans 7:7

7 ...I had not known sin, but by the law: for I had not known lust, except the law had said, Thou shalt not covet.

Psalms 78:18

18 ...They tempted God...by asking meat for their lust.

Numbers 11:31-34

- 31 And there went forth a wind from the Lord, and brought quails from the sea, and let them fall by the camp,...
- **32** And the people stood up all that day, and all that night, and all the next day, and they gathered the quails:...
- 33 And while the flesh was yet between their teeth,...the Lord smote the people with a very great plague.

"Thou shalt not covet" is the last one of the Ten Commandments. These Ten Commandments were given to God's people when they were traveling from Egypt to Canaan.

They escaped from the covetous people of Egypt who had enslaved them to make bricks for their great cities. They escaped in the middle of the night with no tools or weapons and only a little food. But God supplied them with weapons from these Egyptian enemies who were drowned while trying to follow them across the Red Sea. Every morning God gave His children manna for food and when they were thirsty, He opened new springs of fresh, clean water. To make the journey more pleasant. He formed a cloud that protected them from the blazing sun. This cloud was a glowing light at night.

God took good care of His traveling children, but they became dissatisfied and began to covet. One evening as Moses was walking through the camp, he saw the people standing in the tent doors crying. They were begging for meat. "We have nothing to eat except this horrid manna," many complained.

Others said, "We wish we were back in Egypt eating fish, melons, onions and leeks."

Moses was troubled so he hurried away to talk with God. "What shall I do with these covetous people?" he asked.

God said, "I will give them meat for which they covet."

"That would take all the fish in the sea," Moses answered.

"Is my power limited?" God asked.

The next day a strong wind blew in hundreds and hundreds of quail. The people caught quail that day, that night and the next day. They ate and ate and ate. Soon the covetous people began getting sick. Many died from disobeying the Tenth Commandment, "Thou shalt not covet."

Coveting and lusting are much alike. Coveting is an uncontrolled desire for something that belongs to someone else. Lusting is wanting something even if God does not want you to have it.

Wanting to eat meat is not a sin. It was, however, sin for the Israelites to be so dissatisfied that they were willing to return to slavery in order to have what they wanted.

Coveting or lusting will control the person who allows it in his life, just as it did the Israelites. King Solomon lusted after beautiful women. This lust controlled him and he married women who worshiped idols. They led him and his kingdom away from God. Samson lusted after a Philistine woman. She caused him to be captured. This brought him torture and death.

Lusting has destroyed many strong people. But it does not have to destroy. A person can resist coveting and lusting. It is difficult to tell our body, "No" when it is coveting something, but by God's help it can be done. This is the only way to obey the Tenth Commandment, "Thou shalt not covet." "You mustn't be so afraid," Mother said. "Last night you were afraid of the dark. Yesterday it was trouble at school. Ahn you have to be strong to live."


"I don't want to live," Ahn wailed.

The following four years we hid out in Kabsan among prisoners. There were many things to make me afraid but I trusted in Jesus."

"Did you go to church every day like you do now?" Ahn questioned.

"There was no Korean Christian Church in those years, Ahn. Neither did I have a Christian friend nor a Bible."


On the way home from the cemetery, Ahn said to her mother, "Why do the women cry so for the dead, and fight so with the living?"

God is love, yet He told the Israelites to destroy the people in Canaan. Why? What had they done?

The people of Canaan worshiped the idol Baal and the goddess Ashtaroth. When they worshipped these gods, they did not sing hymns, nor learn how to live at peace with each other. Neither did they ask their god to help them be better.

Instead of learning how to be better, the worshipers of Baal and Ashtaroth participated in very ungodly sensual pleasures. From these services many unwanted babies were born. Many of these babies were then murdered in sacrifice to Baal and Ashtaroth. Apostle Paul said, When they worship they "worshiped devils." When they sacrificed, they "sacrificed to devils." (I Corinthians 10:20.)

In excavations at Gezer. Mr. McAlister, of the Palestine Exploration Fund (1904-09), found the ruins of a High Place where Baal and Ashtaroth were worshipped. It was a walled enclosure, open to the sky. Within the walls were ten rude stone pillars, before which the sacrifices were offered. "Under the debris, in this High Place, McAlister found great numbers of jars containing the remains of children who had been sacrificed to Baal. The whole area proved to be a cemetery for newborn babes.

"Another horrible practice of the Canaanites was called foundation sacrifices. When a house was to be built, a child would be sacrificed and its body built into the wall, to bring good luck to the rest of the family. Many of these were found in Gezer,

They have been found also at Megiddo, Jericho and other places."


So, Canaanites worshiped, by immoral indulgence, as a religious rite. and then murdered their first-born children, as sacrifice to these same gods. Now do you wonder why God commanded Israel to exterminate the Canaanites? Should a civilization of such abominable filth and brutality exist? "Archaeologists who dig in the ruins of Canaanite cities wonder why God did not destroy them sooner than He did." Canaan was very much like Sodom and Gomorrah, the cities God destroyed by fire and brimstone. Its people were wicked, like the people were before the great flood that destroyed all humans except Noah and his family. God said to Noah, "My spirit shall not always strive with man."

There comes a time after people have continually rejected God that His Spirit will not give them another chance to repent. Often when that time comes, something destroys that person or nation. Let's each be very careful that this does not happen to us.

Then she raised her eyes toward heaven and prayed, "Oh Jesus, take me out of the world. There is too much trouble for me to live."




Critics say there was no need for a miracle to cross the Jordan for it was a small, shallow river. During dry or very cold weather it may have been shallow. Perhaps at those times it was easy to cross for a great deal of the river's water comes from Mount Lebanon's melting snow. Each year in the spring, however, water from the melting snow causes the Jordan River to flood. Joshua and his people crossed in April when floods from melting snow had the whole area under water.


When the feet of the priests stepped into the raging flood water, the river rose up in a great heap "very far from the city Adam. that is beside Zaretan." (Joshua 3:16.) Adam was 16 miles to the north. Below that the water drained off, and left the rocky river bottom dry enough to walk on. At Adam, the Jordan flows through clay banks 40 feet high. In 1927 an earthquake caused these banks to collapse, so that no water flowed past them for 21 hours. God may have used some such means to make the1 river dry. Or maybe the water stood up in a wall without anything holding it there. We do not know how God did it.

We do know God showed His great power. This was very im-

portant to the people of Israel, for they were moving into a country full of fierce, warring giants who were ready to destroy them. It was also important that Israel believe their God was more powerful than the idols in which the giants trusted. It was also important that these giants saw God's great power, for it caused them to be afraid of the Israelites.

This is the second time that God showed His power by opening up a body of water so His people could go through on dry land. God did great things among his people just as he told Joshua he would. —Charlotte Huskey "Halley's Bible Handbook, p. 159.)

You must also repent of your sins and believe that Jesus is the Savior of your soul. Then be baptized, if possible, to show the world that you are dead to the world and believing in Him. (The thief who died on the cross with Jesus did not have an opportunity to be baptized.) In this way a person can have eternal life.

God sent His only Son that whosoever believeth in Him could be saved from eternal destruction. God gave His commandments many years before Jesus came. If obeying His commandments would have saved people, He would not have later sent His son.

Many religions teach that a person can earn eternal life by

being good. This is false. Are your parents constantly telling you to be good, and punishing you when you are not? If so you, too, may be thinking that you will get into heaven if you are good. That is not so. Some people act good that do not believe in Jesus.

The only way to have eternal life is by doing what Jesus said. He said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." To believe is not just believing at one time. It is believing every day of your life until it ends.

Have you been obeying God's commandments yet not believing that only through Jesus you can go to heaven? If so, change today and believe in Jesus and be baptized. Then you will be ready to go to heaven.



God's people had come into Egypt because of a famine. Pharaoh, Egypt's king, put them in Goshen where they could care for the animals which the hungry Egyptians were trading to him for food. They had also brought with them their own cattle which soon grew into great herds.

It had been their custom to kill cattle during a worship service. They asked God to accept the blood of this animal as a token of their acknowledging God as the Giver of both physical and spiritual life. Some of the meat was burned. The rest was eaten in a solemn meal before God.

Cattle were sacred to the Egyptians and they worshipped the Apis bull.

For many years, God's people were treated nicely because Joseph, a member of their family, was next to the king in authority and he had saved their country during this famine. Perhaps during the time Joseph was ruler in Egypt, God's people were allowed to worship as they wished. (The Bible does not say.) But as years passed, other kings came into authority who did not know Joseph nor his people.

These new Egyptian rulers did not allow a worship that destroyed animals that they held sacred. Besides that, they feared a revolt because the Israelites now out numbered the Egyptians. To avoid this, they made slaves of the Israelites. They killed their baby boys, and cruelly mistreated God's people until the people cried to God for help. When God allowed them to escape, Pharaoh, king of Egypt, said, "Go serve the Lord as ye have said."

During this 430 years, the Israelites had many times seen the Egyp-

tians worshipping the bull or an image of the bull.

When Moses got the Israelites away from Egypt he had to teach them how to worship God. Shortly after escaping they made a covenant promising God they would do all that He spoke. Moses went up on the mount to receive God's laws for the people.

Forty days after they made this promise to God, they made an image of the bull which they had so often seen the Egyptians worship. Then they, too, worshipped it. They deserved to be destroyed but Moses begged God to spare them. Moses, however, did punish them. He ground the golden calf into fine dust, sprinkled it on their water and made them drink it. In this way he showed them how powerless the idol was.

God sent a plague on the people because they worshipped the golden calf.

There are religions in the world today that hold the cow sacred. Some of these religions are active in America. Have you noticed how many public parades have a Brahma bull or some animal of the cow family parading down the street along with the Shriners. Some are dressed as clowns, some driving little cars, some playing in a band, others driving in old cars, etc. They are very amusing to spectators. But is God pleased that cows are paraded as sacred in our "Christian" towns and cities? Should we not rather be sending choirs throughout the streets singing hymns of praise to God and our Savior. Jesus?

God allowed enemies to destroy the Israelites who followed after gods of the world. What will happen to the countries today who are ignoring the commandments of God and worshiping the gods of the world?

How easy it is to do what we see others doing. But God wants us to obey His commandments and do as Jesus would do. Are you doing what Jesus would do or doing as your friends do?

Jonathan found his friend David and told him, then they parted to never see each other again. David went into exile. He hid in far away cities, in caves of the mountains, in the wilderness and even in other countries.

Jonathan could have rebelled against his father and gone to help David, but he submitted to his father. Years later he was killed beside his father as they fought together against the Philistines. What a beautiful example of being submissive to a father.

Children should be submissive to parents. When parents do not approve of a friendship, their opinion should be respected. If it is

God's will that the friendship continue, God will in time make your parent willing.

Many bad marriages have been saved because young people submitted to their parents and did not marry the person they thought they loved. Many married couples are suffering today because parent's advice against a marriage was ignored.

Be another Jonathan. Be loyal to your friend, then submit to your parents and let God work. God will work out something very good for you, when you submit.

"And you will worship the shrine!" she shouted.


Ahn did not answer.

People all over the world are worshiping something. There are thousands of different religions. Some believe that all religions that profess belief in a supreme being and teach good behavior are ways to get to heaven.

But what about those who worship images? Is their path leading to heaven when God said. "Thou shalt make no graven image... nor bow down to them"? Is idol (image) worship a common practice today, or did only the people of olden times worship idols? Are people more intelligent today and know that God is a Spirit and He must be worshiped in Spirit and in truth, with no connection to any image? Let's read what The World Book Encyclopedia says about idol worship in our world today.

Page 213 of Volume number 16 shows a chart of the major religions of the world. There are 10 major religions on this chart which was made in 1973. Eight of these ten major religions practice image worship in one form or another. Some use pictures, others use statues of people or animals, some use structures of one kind or another. These things are respected as sacred.

Protestantism and Judaism were the only two listed on the chart that do not worship images.

All people who profess to follow Christ's teachings but do not belong to the Roman Catholic Church or one the the Eastern Orthodox Churches are considered by the world to be protestant.

There are many protestants but all these people are very few compared to the many who worship images. For every one person who worships God without using an image, there are over 669 who worship by using images. This is true although it may seem very odd because you may not know anyone who worships idols or images.

It was the same way in King Nebuchadnezzar's country. Only a very few people worshiped the true God. All the others worshipped idols. Of all the rulers present that day when the king set up the golden image, only the three Hebrews did not worship it. These were brave, young men.

If today you were ordered to bow before an idol, would you do it? The story in this paper tells about a young woman in Korea who was brave like Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego. She did not bow when everyone else on the mountain bowed before an idol.

It takes strong, brave boys and determined girls to not do what most everyone else is doing. Have you been strong for Jesus? Are you able to say, "No," when others are not doing what is right? Pray to God and He will help you to be strong like Shadrach, Meshach and Abed-nego.

At that instant the telephone rang. "Yes, sir...yes sir...yes sir...yes sir," he said respectfully, then quickly began searching through a drawer.


Exodus 14:13-14 came into Ahn's mind, as he talked, "Do not fear! The Lord will fight for you."


Elijah promised to stay there until Ahab came. He did.

At each small town the train stopped and the door opened. Ahn feared each time the door opened that a policeman would enter and arrest her. By this time every policeman in Korea had a description of her.



24 And...the God that answereth by fire, let him be God. And all the people answered...It is well spoken.

26 And they took the bullock...dressed it, and called on...Baal from morning even until noon, saying, "O Baal, hear us. But there was no voice, nor any that answered. And they leaped upon the altar which was made.

27 ...Elijah mocked them, and said, Cry aloud: for...either he is talking,...or...in a journey, or peradventure he sleepeth, and must be awaked.

28 And they cried aloud, and cut themselves... with knives and lancets, till the blood gushed out upon them.

29 And they prophesied until the time...of the evening sacrifice, that...there was neither voice, nor...answer, nor any that regarded.

Baal was the god of the Canaanites. He was worshipped in various forms as the god of weather, of war or fertility. Baal worshipers called on Baal when they needed rain, or when there was too much rain they prayed to Baal to send more sunny days.

Archaeologists have uncovered much important information about Baal. One stone shows Baal holding an axe and thunderbolt. Baal was worshipped for hundreds of years by many different countries and civilizations, including the Canaanites, the Assyrians, the Babylonians, Greeks and Romans.

Elijah challenged Baal on his own grounds. If Baal controlled the weather, then he controlled the lightning. Elijah said, "The God who answers by fire from heaven is the true God." The priest and people agreed that was a good test.

This is not the first time God has proved himself among His people by controlling the weather. Years before this, the Israelites had begged for a king until God finally gave them one. Samuel cautioned the people about the mistake they were making by leaving the direct leadership of God to follow a king. He said, "It is wheat harvest time, a time when rain doesn't come, but God will send rain and thunder today, just to show His power." God did send

rain at harvest time.

Another time that God demonstrated His control of nature was when Joshua was in a battle and needed a little more daylight. God caused the earth to stop rotating for awhile.

God used nature to prove who He was because His people were surrounded by people who trusted Baal as the controller of weather and fertility. Fertility is the reproduction of plant and animal life, so these two are the basic of all nature.

The 450 prophets of Baal and the 400 prophets of the grove prayed all day to their god who was suppose to control the lightning, but no lightning came to burn the bullock that they had placed on their altar.

When it was time for the evening sacrifice, Elijah took over. Next week we will see what happened.



Let's Talk . . .

Elijah had challenged 450 prophets of Baal and 400 prophets of the groves. They all agreed that the God which answered by fire was the real God. The prophets of Baal had cried to their God all day. In this lesson it is Elijah's turn to pray.

The Hebrews had no word for nature other than the idea of the activity of God Himself. It was God who spoke in the thunderstorm. God was blessing when the rain fell; He was cursing when the drought came. God breathed in the wind, and He judged when there were earthquakes. He manifested His glory in the heavens. They saw God working in the activity and mysteries of nature yet they understood that He was also above and beyond all nature.

Now let us learn some things about Baal so we can better understand why it was so important that the worship of Baal be stopped. Baal and his wife Ashtaroth were the gods of the Canaanites and other nations around Israel. The Baal family, (he and his goddess wife Ashtaroth and other less important gods) were called upon to solve problems of weather, war, and fertility. Ashtaroth was the personification of the reproduction principle. The reproduction of all life was attributed to her. If plants grew, it was because she caused the seed to sprout. If fruit trees did not produce fruit it was because she was angry. If the cattle had many calves, she was thanked. If a horse produced a fine foul, Ashtaroth was praised. When a woman had no babies, it was said that she had angered the god Ashtaroth.

Baal took the place of the true God. Besides this, during worship service the most hideous things were done, often sacrificing humans, especially newborn babies.

God sent a drought and other troubles on Israel trying to get them to stop this hideous worship, but they kept doing it. After three and one-half years of drought, God told Elijah to destroy the prophets of Baal, and he would send rain.

First though, Elijah must convince the people that Baal had no power and that the Lord God only could help them out of their troubles. After the demonstration on Mount Carmel the people were ready to reject Baal and to again serve God. (Although Jezebel did not change.)

It took a lot of courage for Elijah to challenge Queen Jezebel and all her prophets. But in doing so he showed God's great power and that Baal had no power. God is in control of everything.

Their reports inspired Ahn greatly until she began wishing that she could join them, though she dare not, lest the officials hunting her would also find the hidden community of Christians.



What a lot of work to do in one day! He must have been exhausted!

How thankful Ahab should have been. Instead of thanking God for the rain, Ahab went home and told Jezebel that Elijah had slain all her prophets of Baal and of the groves.

But he found that he was mistaken when Jezebel's messenger arrived telling him of her plans to kill him by the morrow. Knowing that Jezebel was capable of carrying out her plans, he left promptly for Beersheba.

He must have felt he would be safe in Beer-sheba for it was in the southern tip of the Promise Land and under the authority of King Jehoshaphat. But he took no chances. He left his servant there and went on. A days journey out of Bree-sheba, he stopped to rest. There an angel came bringing him food and water.

Elijah ate the food and then walked on another 150 miles until he came to Mount Horeb. There he found a cave in which to hide. It had been forty days since he had eaten.

God visited him while in the cave and asked, "What are you doing here?"

Elijah complained to God. The Samaritans were Jews who had intermarried with the Assyrians and adopted some of their religious customs. They built their own temple when the Jews refused their help in reconstruction of the temple at Jerusalem. The Jews hated the Samaritans. A Jew would not eat or drink with a Samaritan nor eat in a clean dish from which a Samaritan had eaten.

In this lesson we can also see that some Samaritans didn't like the Jews. Jesus was a Jew so He was refused a place in the Samaritan village.

This was not the only time that Jesus had no place to sleep. He traveled from village to village sleeping wherever He could find a place. Often He went to the mountains and prayed during the night. He said that the foxes have holes in which to sleep, the birds have nests, but I have no place.

All through the years that people have been on the earth, the righteous have been rejected by the world. Able was rejected by his brother Cain. Somewhere in the world today, possibly in the area where you live, a Christian is being rejected and needs to be visited. He needs encouragement and may have other needs that you could supply.

Jesus only allowed those who had repented of their sins into His kingdom. They were righteous and had helped needy brethren. Those who had not repented, who had not helped, were turned away. We must all repent, and helping others is very important also.

Have you repented? Have you been helping others? Perhaps you do know someone who needs help. Some people are helping the homeless. They need to be ministered to and introduced to Jesus, and sometimes this includes giving temporary shelter and food. Maybe you could help with a project like that.

People must be careful who they help, for the Bible plainly teaches that "those who do not work, should not eat." Jesus did not teach that Christians should feed and cloth those who are unwilling to work.

Jesus tauaht we were to help those who were sick or unable to work, or those who were spreading the gospel (which is hard work). In some countries preachers and aospel workers have very little to eat and live in huts. Others are being persecuted and must leave their homes and stay hidden. Even though you may not know of anyone like this, there are many. You may help them by giving to projects designed to help the needy or by sending offerings to missionaries who will pass it on to the needy ones in their area.

When you lay down in your bed tonight, ask God to bless those who have no bed. Then promise Jesus that you will help someone.
