Earth's Beginning

"Maybe your science teacher would be interested in seeing some fossils that you have found," Mr. Meed said to Jim as they were going home from the river.

"That sounds like a great idea! At least it would be more interesting than discussing the earth's beginning. Everyone in my class has to find a theory about the world's beginning and write at least 300 words giving reasons the theory could or could not be true," Jim said disgustedly.

"Hmm, there are some odd beliefs about it." said Mr. Meed. "Some think a star exploded and a chunk got caught in the sun's gravity. They believe this star became the earth. Others believe that a star passing close to the sun pulled long arms of gas from the sun. Eddies whirled within these arms of gas. They theorize that the gas cooled and somehow formed the earth and other planets. Perhaps the most popular belief is that the earth was formed from a myriad of small fragments in a great cloud of dust and gases swirling around the young sun. As bits and pieces of cosmic debris collided, the earth became larger

and larger, as did the other objects in the inner solar system, including the moon. Others believe the earth was a ball of fire spun off by the sun, then cooled."

"But how could any of these theories be correct, when the earth was created before the sun?" Jim asked.

"They couldn't be," Mr. Meed answered, "that is what you are to prove."

"I think I will write only what the Bible says about the earth's beginning. Other students may laugh at me, but what the Bible says is how it happened and it's just as believable as any theory."

"You think so because you believe in God's power. How about the children who have read only books with the evolutionary point of view?"

After thinking for awhile, Jim asked, "How could a theory of earth's beginning be scientifically proven?"

"A question on my last science test was, 'How do scientists find facts?' I wrote, 'First, a scientist forms a theory. Then the theory must be tested many, many times under different conditions. The scoffers in our lesson today believed that God has created all things (verse 4.) Today, however, many scoffers do not believe that God created all things. Perhaps you have read some of the many different theories of how the earth was formed. People are trying hard to explain how things came into existence without God having done it. This is called the theory of evolution. Those who believe this theory are called evolutionists.

A popular theory of how the universe began is the "big bang" theory. Perhaps you have seen educational films that picture the earth being formed in this way. Films in many of our national parks show this theory.

The theory assumes that billions and billions of years ago, vast fields of gas gradually became tightly compacted. The gas became tighter and tighter until it began glowing with heat. Finally, set off by its own heat, or heat from who knows where, the gas exploded! Wow! The blast from the explosion shot huge chunks of rock into space. From these the galaxies of our universe were formed. These masses of rock began orbiting under the tremendous forces and high speed. These orbiting masses of molten rock, including our earth, have been rushing through space ever since.

Some believe these rocks grew in size as dust and other material in space stuck to them. Where did the dust come from? If the dust came from the other rocks then those rocks had to grow smaller.

From where did the gas come? This same theory, which affirms that the earth was formed from the explosion of hot gases at the time of the "big bang" also affirms that the forming of natural gas took millions of years during a time when water covered more of the earth's surfaces than it does today. The theory is that, "Down through the ages, great quantities of tiny marine plants and animals, called plankton, died and settled on the ocean floors. These masses of dead plants and animals were covered

by sand and mud. Many of these layers formed and were changed by heat, pressure and bacteria into gas."

Many explosions occur when fire ignites gas. Mobile homes and large houses have been blown to pieces. But with these explosions (according to the "big bang theory") large rocks were formed and went orbiting through the air. How can we believe that our solar system and the 100 billion stars forming the giant pinwheel which orbits through space came from a "big bang?"

The apostle Peter is telling us of a "big bang" in the future. He said, "The heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also...shall be burned up."

Scientists have placed the "big bang" at the wrong end of earth. Instead of it being at the beginning of the earth, it will be at its end!

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It can neither be tested, nor observed. No man was there at the beginning to see what was happening."

"That is right," Mr. Meed added.
"You see, whatever we believe about earth's beginning depends on where we put our faith. People will have faith in books that teach evolution, or they will have faith in the Bible which was written by holy men of God."

"Jim," Mr. Meed said, looking very serious, "John Dewey said man's belief in evolution will change the way men act toward other men, towards their country, and towards God. Mr. Raven said Darwin's doctrine of evolution is not about physics and chemistry but about man's place in things and his religion. John Dewey, Mr. Raven and other wise men knew the theory of evolution is of spiritual matter, not scientific matter. Whatever a person believes about the beginning of everything is the basis of what he thinks about God."

"Is there any record besides the Bible about earth's beginning?"

"Yes, there are many records. One of the oldest is the thousands of tablets found at Ebla in northern Syria. Some pre-flood writings have been found in the ruins of Ur, Kish and Fara. Other historical documents, written soon after the flood were found at Obeid, near Ur, and at Larsa. The many fossils buried in the earth are also excellent records."

"Is Genesis the only book of the Bible that tells about the Earth?"

"No, there are places scattered all through the Bible about creation. One verse in Hebrews 11:3, says, "The worlds were framed by the Word of God, so that things which are seen (such as the earth, life, planets, sun, etc.) were not made of things which do appear." Everything we see came into being only by God's command. Is it hard to believe?"

"Nope! There is no way that billions of stars, moons, planets and meteorites could be whirling in space year after year and not be knocking each other out of orbit. Only God could design such a plan."

"You're on the right track, Jim," Mr. Meed said. "I hope no one ever bumps you off."

"Remember, I promised myself and my friends that I would do what Jesus would do. I think He believed God created the universe, so I'll believe it, too. Anyway, God didn't need an evolutionary process to make things. He made fish and bread for the 5000 hungry men to eat as fast as they could eat, so He didn't need four billion years to get the earth like it is now. All He had to do was say, "Let there be....and there it was! That's what my report will be about."

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Our Young Earth

How long does it take to make an island, a canyon, or a mountain?

The cold November wind of Iceland lashed the fisherman's face. It caught his net. He threw it out again. That is when he noticed smoke rising from the North Atlantic about four miles out from Geirfuglasker. "Look! Smoke!" He shouted to his partner. "A ship's on fire!"

The ship's captain radioed for help and headed the small fishing boat in the direction of the smoke. Moments later the captain radioed again, "No ship in danger. But fire is shooting out of the icy ocean."

Dr. Thorarinsson, a well-known geologist was at the scene in a couple of hours. He watched from the deck of a ship a safe distance away as red volcanic rock and ash spouted into the sky. Gigantic flames lashed upward as if trying to lick the sky. Through binoculars he saw an island being formed.

Two years later, in 1965, he built a house on the new island. This new island was named Surtsey. The house was headquarters for scientists studying the new plants and animals that invaded the island.

Several leading evolutionary geologists watched as natural forces within the earth formed not only a new island, but one with a landscape that appeared to be thousands of years old. "The var-

ied and mature landscape was almost beyond belief," Dr. Thorarinsson wrote. "What elsewhere may take thousands of years...the same development took weeks or even a few days here."

Evolutionists use a uniformitarian time scale for estimating the age of the earth, rocks, fossils, etc. According to this time scale, changes in the earth's surface are a gradual process rather than sudden upheaval. Geologists were taught by Surtsey (the new volcano) that this time scale could be very misleading.

Shortly after the island's first birthday it had a mountain, which has an active volcano, wide sandy beaches, impressive cliffs which were greyish white and resembled the cliffs on the English Channel. There were hollows, secluded valleys, soft waving surfaces and boulders worn almost round by the surf. Gales and sandstorms dealt blows on this island within its second year.

Some geologists watched as small amounts of lava flowed gently down to the edge of the sea. When the cold sea water splashed upon the hot lava, it shattered into a billion small bits of sand! When Surtsey was a two-year-old island it looked like it could have been 10,000 years old! Surtsey Island is good evidence that our earth is young, much younger than evolutionists want to admit.

The violent eruption of Mount St. Helen on May 18, 1980, gave some more geological surprises. In six minutes it

Verse to Memorize

In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth. Genesis 1:1.



If we had been there on the first day of creation, we would have experienced a darkness darker than the darkest night. There was no moon, nor star, nor any speck of light. Then God said, "Let there be light." And—there was light! Still there were no moon, stars, nor sun. These were created on the fourth day.

On the second day, we might have seen billows of vapor rising from the earth. We know that hot water turns into vapor and rises into the air. But there was no sun, nor wood, nor gas for heating this water. It arose only at God's command and formed a canopy of water in the sky. This canopy of water protected the earth from the harsh rays of the sun.

On the third day we might have heard God's great voice thunder, "Let dry land appear." Then we would see rushing water plunging into the lower parts of the earth. Quickly, mountain tops would appear. The mountains would seem to grow taller and taller as more and more water falls away into the oceans and lakes. The water would rush on until dry plains surround the mountains. Before the day would be over the plains would be covered with grass, plants and fruit trees.

A very bright light would appear on the fourth day. Toward evening it would disappear, and a round ball-like light would be in the sky; and millions of very, very tiny lights would appear. Some would twinkle and some would only glow steadily. Kenneth N. Taylor in Creation and The High School Student, said that on a clear night we can see only as much of the universe

as an ameba can see of the ocean in which it drifts. So, trying to count the stars would be as impossible as trying to count the grains of sand on a beach. The sun, moon and stars were created on the fourth day of creation.

If we had been with God during the fifth day of creation, we might have seen many, many different kinds of fish filling the clear rivers, lakes, and oceans that were empty. Not only would there be fish in the water, but also some very large mammals. From every direction birds would be appearing. Black, white, yellow, red, blue and multi-colored birds would be flying overhead.

After watching the miracle of creation we would surely exclaim,

"Our God is so great, so loving and mighty.

There is nothing that He cannot do."

Some Christians like to connect creation with the evolution theory. They say each day of creation was perhaps a thousand or a million years. If this was so, how could plants live a thousand or a million years on earth without the sun? The sun was created a day after the plants. Plants could live a day without the sun.

Is it important that we believe the first chapters of the Bible just as they are? Did Christ believe them? What did the apostles say about creation? The first chapters of Genesis are referred to at least 100 times in the New Testament. The apostle Paul told Timothy, "All scripture is given by God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, and for instruction." (II Timothy 3:16.)

At Jesus' command the storm ceased, blind eyes saw, deaf ears heard and crippled legs walked again. Could not the universe be created in one week at His command? The answer is "Yes." The creation happened a long time ago, but we should never doubt it. —Charlotte Huskey

leveled enough trees to build 640,000 houses. The mountain paradise was turned into a bald wasteland.

Mud and rock avalanched into Spirit Lake, causing waves up to 850 feet high on the north shore of the lake. As the water returned to the lake, it scoured slopes of trees, plants, soil and volcanic debris, dumping a 320-foot-thick deposit on the bottom of the lake. This wood, bark and plant life under the log mat, and water pressure has already formed peat.

Peat is the first material in the formation of coal. This peat is already much like certain coal beds of the Eastern United States. Until now, scientists have believed that coal was formed over thousands of years. They will be testing this peat often to see how soon it changes into coal.

Twenty-three square miles of a valley on the north side of the mountain were covered to an average depth of 150 feet with rocks and volcanic debris. In this valley, hills and gullies formed within five days which geologists would have thought to have taken hundreds of years. Some of these gullies are 50 feet deep. A miniature "Grand Canyon" over 100 feet deep is believed to have formed in one day. The erosional features of Mount St. Helen are not unique, but are similar to those seen elsewhere.

At Lituya Bay, Alaska, an enormous wave destroyed the forest along the shore as high as 1720 feet above the ocean. It stripped the hills of vegetation and changed the mountain into a wasteland. Scientists thought that such stripping would have taken thousands of years under "normal" conditions.

On November 20, 1980, at Lake Peigneur, Louisiana, a well driller accidentally penetrated an underground salt mine. Two hundred forty million cubic feet of lake water emptied suddenly into the mine. This caused tree-like patterns of channels in the lake bed for a depth of 200 to 300 feet.

On the night of June 8, 1974, a rain storm in southern Brazil eroded a valley

16 feet deep, 50 feet wide, and 1600 feet long into a gently sloping field.

Scientists estimate that the 277 mile long Grand Canyon, curved by the Colorado River, took three to six million years to form. This all took place long before man kept records of erosion. But one of the world's largest man-made disasters was the unrestrained flooding of this same river between 1905 and 1907. In nine months the runaway river formed 43 miles of channels with an average width of 1000 feet, and depth of 50 feet. It removed almost four times the amount of dirt removed while digging the Panama Canal. If the Colorado River had kept eroding at that rate for 113 years it could have cut another canyon as large as the Grand Canyon. Or, if it had kept on the same rate for just three million years, the canyon it carved could be 2,000 times deeper than the Grand Canyon. This is just more evidence leading us to believe that the earth is young.

The moon also tells us that the earth is young. Scientists believe that the earth and the moon are about the same age. They also know that strong ultra-violet light and X-rays change rocks to dust at a very slow rate. Even this small amount could, during a billion years, cause the moon to have at least twenty miles of dust on its surface. But the astronauts did not sink into miles of dust when they landed on the moon. They only found enough dust to make good footprints!

Surtsey Island, Mount St. Helen, flooding, well drilling, a small amount of moon dust and a multitude of other evidence has caused many great scientists to believe that the earth is less than ten thousand years old, not 4 1/2 billions years old!

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Each After His Kind

Buried within the ground are many historical records of our earth. These records help us know things of the past that are not recorded in writing. Some of these hidden records show encampments of men who lived only on the plants and wildlife of the area. Others are cities with simple industries. When the dirt covering is removed, buildings are found with tools, furniture, paintings and other objects in them.

Other records, called fossils, show what plants and animals lived long ago. Although there are billions of fossils, they are few compared to the many plants and animals which have died. Most dead plants and animals decay and change into dust. To form a fossil, the living things must be buried very quickly and kept under much pressure.

In Carlsbad Caverns, a bat is preserved in a stalagmite. The bat has not decayed, so we know the bat was covered quickly by the stalagmite. Fossils are usually only a print of the plant or animal. These often show clearly the feathers or delicate wings of insects or fins and fleshy parts of the fish. Some fossil molds left by humans show the misery of the person at the moment of his sudden burial. Fossils are often found in limestone because it is much like cement and hardens quickly.

For many years men have studied fossils to understand the past. But the

past 100 years, paleontologists (men who specialize in the study of fossils) have been hunting for fossils of animals that would link the different kinds of animals together. In this way they hope to prove that all animals are from the same ancestry.

For example, if birds came from reptiles, fossils should be found of animals that have both reptile and bird characteristics. Some fossils would have more characteristics of reptiles and less of birds, while other fossils would be mostly bird-like. These fossils would show the connecting links between reptiles and birds. This would be a different species of one kind of animals.

It is recorded in Genesis that God created each animal after his own kind. There are many different dogs, but they are all dogs. We have many different cats, but they are all cats. Animals with both dog and cat characteristics would be the missing links.

Many natural history museums exhibit different sizes of fossilized horses. It is an effort to show that horses evolved or changed from a small three-toed horse to the large horse of today. According to the evolutionists, the first horses lived 50 to 65 million years ago (long before the earth was created). The next horse called the middle horse lived 35 million years ago. Thirty million years ago, a little larger one was around. The next horse appeared about 26 million years ago. All these horses had three

God did not create animals in the order evolutionists say they developed. Evolutionists say animals evolved slowly into the different animals that are on earth today. They supposedly began from very simple animals and changed through millions of years. According to their speculations, mammals were the last kind of animal to develop. The Bible says that God created the fish, birds and some mammals (such as the whale) on the same day. Evolutionists say fish developed first then amphibians, later birds evolved. The Bible says creeping things which would include amphibians (frogs. toads, salamanders etc.) were created after birds were created. Man. who is the highest form of life, is supposed to have developed last, but from the Bible we read that creeping animals cattle, beasts and man were all created the same day.

Each of these animals were created "after its own kind," which means in its own group. Cats are one group. Cows, oxen, water buffalo are one group. All dogs are one group. Within the dog group the mother can be a collie and the father a German Shepherd. But have you ever seen babies from a dog father and cat mother? A dog and a cat are not of the same kind. Horses are another group. A donkey and horse can have a baby, but not a cow and a horse. A cow and horse are not of the same kind.

Although people were created on the same day as animals, man was created very differently. When God created man, He breathed into his nostrils and "man became a living soul." Male and female animals were created at the same time. Woman was made from a rib of the man, and she was also a living soul. Their children were also living souls. Man's creation was a special act of God.

People were also created with greater abilities than animals. They are able to solve problems and make decisions. The Pyramids in Egypt, the Hanging Gardens of Babylon, and the huge walls of ancient cities show that ancient man had great reasoning powers. They were not all cave men. Some civilizations today are still using bone knives and stone arrowheads, while others have traveled to the moon.

By following their instincts, animals do many wonderful things, but when presented with problems outside the bounds of their instinct, they are very limited. Take the ant as an example. Each ant is born with an instinct to do a specific job, which it does. Ants live in colonies for survival. Some gather food, and some clean and feed the babies. Soldier ants squirt chemicals from a nozzle in their head. which tangle the legs and antennas of their enemies. They protect the colonies from enemies. Some ants keep slaves. Wood ants are "dairy farmers." They keep herds of aphids ("ant cows") underground. Some even build barns for their herds! Although the ant can do many things, it cannot choose the kind of work it does. It does the work it was born to do.

Human decision-making powers go beyond an animal's instinct. They can change occupations, choose the size of their families and communicate more intelligently. They reason and understand things about the earth and outer space that no animal could understand. Each day they can learn something new.

Perhaps someday we will know much more about creation. Until then let's not believe the unproven theories of evolution, for the evolution theory cannot qualify as a scientific theory, much less as a scientific truth!

toes. About one million years ago horses looked like they do today. So we have 64 million years of horses slowly becoming larger and larger, but only five fossils to prove it. If we found one fossil for every thousand years, there should be 63 thousands fossils, showing this three-toed creature becoming more and more like a modern horse.

Now let's think about what might happen in another million years if people found fossils of the different kinds of horses today. The American Miniature horse is sometimes only one and onehalf feet tall. There are Shetland ponies, three feet or more, the Walsh pony, the Arabian, American Quarter and Saddle horses, the Shire and on up to the Belgian, which is over six feet tall and weighs as much as 2200 pounds. Each of these horses is larger than the one listed before and also a little different. They could be exhibited as the evolution of the horse, when really the horses were just different horses that lived at the same time.

Here is a fact the exhibits never state: "two modern-type horses were found in the same geological strata (the same layer of earth) as the horses that lived supposedly 50 to 65 million years ago." Paleontologists usually consider that animals, whose fossils are found in the same strata, lived near the same time, not 35 to 65 million years apart.

Some fossils exhibited as prehistoric horses look more like racing dogs, such as greyhounds, than like the straight-backed, long-faced modern horses. Their feet are also more like dog's feet.

Archaeopteryx, a fossil bird is sometimes claimed to be a link between birds and reptiles, because it was thought to be a poor flyer, had claw-like growths on the edges of its wings, and had teeth. Today however, there are some birds, such as the ostrich, rhea and penguin, who do not fly. The hoatzin of South America and the touraco of Africa are much like the archaeopteryx. All these are classified as true birds.

Were the teeth a sign that it was part reptile? Some reptiles, such as turtles, do not have teeth; some fish have teeth, some do not; some mammals have teeth, some do not; and some birds have teeth, some do not. Most paleontologists, however, do believe that the archaeopteryx is a true bird because other fossils of true birds were found in the same strata of earth, showing they had lived in the same time period.

One Master Creator made everything, and He used the same ideas in many different kinds of plants and animals. Environment may change plants and animals, but scientists are finding that they change only within their own kind. They remain basically the same. The Sea Lily that is living today is identical to the fossils dated by evolutionists to be 136 million years old. The bat looks like a bird and is a mammal, but it remains the same as fossils made from sudden burial. Some of those according to evolutionists are "50 million" years old.

Men may look another hundred years for fossils to connect all animals together but will not find them. God created each animal after his own kind and put within that animal the ability to reproduce another like itself. (Genesis 1:21.) Characteristics (such as a disfigured face), which animals or man might acquire while living are not passed on to their young. God set the bounds for each to stay in his kind, and all of them will.

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Plaster-Of-Paris Men

If man came from apes, then a million fossils should be available that show the linking characteristics between the two. According to the evolutionary theory, the change began more than five million years ago. I would think with all the excavating there should be found at least one fossil for every five years of time.

It seems men have a greater desire to find the "missing link" between man and apes than the missing links between the other kinds of life. Let's look at some evidence used to try to prove they are connected.

Back in 1891, Dr. Eugene Dubois thought the missing link between man and apes would be found in the East Indies. He went to Central Java and within a year he had dug up the top of a skull, a fragment of a left thigh bone, and three molar teeth. They were not found together, but within 50 to 75 feet of each other.

Evolutionists were thrilled with the find. Dr. Chapin exclaimed, "It is fortunate that the most distinctive portions of the human frame should have been preserved. Using these portions we can reconstruct the entire being." This man stood halfway between the man and the ape.

What portions were found? The top of a skull, a left thigh bone and three molars were found. From a piece of head bone, one leg bone and three teeth, what can be learned about how a creature looked, who supposedly lived 750,000 years ago?

It was not until 1922 that scientists decided that this Java man, for so he was called, was just a big blunder. What Dr. Dubois actually found was the skull of a gibbon, leg and premolar of a man, and two molars of an orangutan! For thirty years, however, the Java man had been exhibited in museums and praised by books as the missing link between man and ape. Some magic was needed to produce a man from only a gibbon's skull, leg and tooth of a man, and two orangutan teeth. Magic plaster-of-paris formed most of his body.

But the search was on, and in 1926 the Science Newsletter announced, "The jungle speaks again on man's prehuman relatives: A perfect skull of prehistoric man is found. This find, which is complete and sound, will be kept in Dutch East India, as transportation of such relics is prohibited." This important relic turned out to be the knee bone of an extinct elephant!

Another famous would-be link between ape and man was the Piltdown man. Around 1910, Charles Dawson found a reddish-brown skull in a gravel pit where some road work was being done. Later, in the same pit, was found a jawbone of about the same color and two dark teeth. Dr. Authur Smith of the British Museum created a bust of how

he imagined this ape-like man looked. He named it the Piltdown man and placed it in the museum. The Piltdown man was written about and pictures were taken of him. All this was put in children's science textbooks. Henry Osborn, of the American Museum of Natural History, called him the Trinal Ape-man: I suppose because he was made of three parts. Yes, only three parts, and much plaster-of-paris! For forty years children around the world studied from their school books that the Piltdown man was the missing link between man and ape.

In 1949, Kenneth P. Oakley examined the bones under new methods. He found the bones readily absorbed fluorine, that their color was only surface deep and collagen fibers could be seen under a microscope. These three tests showed that the bones were not old. Using a microscope, Mr. Oakley found file marks on the teeth. The teeth had been filed to look like man's teeth. Also, the black paint on the teeth could be scraped off. The teeth and jawbone were found to be those of a modern orangutan. It was nothing but a hoax (a trick). But for 35 years innocent children had been taught that the Piltdown man was proof that they were related to apes. The whole thing was revealed to the public by a splendid article in the Popular Science Monthly. It was entitled, "The Great Piltdown Hoax" and reprinted in the October 1956 issue of the Reader's Digest.

The Nebraska man, another apelike man, was created out of plaster-ofparis in 1922. He was supposed to have lived in the United States of America one million years ago. At the Scopes Trial in Tennessee, William Jennings Bryan was made to look like a fool because he didn't believe in evolution. The recent discovery of the Nebraska man was used as evidence for evolution. Twenty years later, in 1943, S.E. Winbolt, in the Pelican Book Series, Britain, B.C., alluded to the Nebraska man as a genuine link between man

and ape. What fossils or bones of the Nebraska man were actually found? One tooth! That's right, only one tooth. In the years since the Scopes Trial, it has been discovered that this tooth belonged to a peccary, a species of a pig now extinct in the United States. "Give us a tooth, and plenty of plaster-ofparis," the evolutionists cry, "and we will create a whole race of fossilized apelike men."

Now we come to another missing link that was exhibited in the museums and whose pictures you still see in books. He is called the Heidelberg man, but he is really just one jawbone. The jawbone of Mr. Heidelberg was found in sand and was said to be from 375,000 to 700,000 years old. If bone could be preserved that long in sand, we'd probably be tripping over bones all the time. At any rate, the Heidelberg man is in the books for study, although even scientists have great differences of opinion about him. Some said it was a valuable find, while others said it was worthless. One scientist said a whole race of South Sea islanders have massive jawbones like the Heidelberg man. Another showed the skull of a modern Eskimo to have the same appearance. Using plaster-of-paris, the ape-like man was made and demonstrated as proof of the evolution of man. As far as I know, the Heidelberg man is still referred to as proof that man evolved from an ape.

It seems that when there is a great desire to create an ape-man, it can be done from plaster-of-paris, using as evidence of a once-living creature either a pig's tooth, the top of a man's skull, the jawbone and molars of an orangutan, the skull of a gibbon, leg and tooth of a man, or just one jawbone! The search continues without success for ape-man fossils. Millions of American tax dollars are spent each year in this search, but each uncovered fossil of man is found to be basically like man is today, for that is how God created him.

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The Hidden City

If you have a chance to visit Italy, you might enjoy visiting Pompeii (pahm-PAY-ee). It is a city buried when Mount Vesuvius (veh-SOO-vihus) erupted in A.D. 79. It happened about 45 years after Christ died.

Visitors can walk on sidewalks built up higher than the narrow, paved streets. They can see Jupiter's Temple, which was ancient when Christ was on earth. They may stroll around the temples of Apollo and Fortuna Augusta and imagine being present when the pagan priest offered the blood of sacrifices, drank wine and practiced obscenities as part of his religious worship. You might prefer to visit the old Roman public hall, see hand blown glass wine vessels, or the faceguards of gladiators who fought to their deaths in the amphitheater. Some would enjoy seeing the golden dishes of rich Romans who had vacation villas at Pompeii, or the beautifully crafted iron ovens. Bread, 1800 years old, was found in one of these ovens! About half the city has been uncovered, so there is much to see!

At the time of the eruption, around 20,000 people lived in Pompeii. Mount Vesuvius had been smoking and spitting ash and stones for eight days before the deadly explosion. But the eruption buried Pompeii in one hour.

An estimated 2,000 persons were buried in hot, volcanic ash. Some had escaped earlier, others were fleeing, while still others crouched beside the city walls as if seeking protection from the hot flying stones. Some statues of the fleeing persons can be seen in the city.

Pliny the Elder, a Roman officer in command of a fleet of oar-powered war galleys was across Naples Bay when Mount Vesuvius began smoking and spitting stones. He took his fleet across the bay to rescue as many unfortunates as he could. The shore was blocked by debris and red-hot ash. Pumice and rocks pelted his men and vessels. He finally got to shore under the light of gigantic volcanic flames lashing upward as if trying to lick the stars. He found the buildings shaking and darkness on the city. In the morning, he returned to the shore and found waves tossing dangerously wild as if water was being sucked away by the earthquake and spit back again. Pliny, overcome by the fumes, collapsed on a sheet, and pleaded often for cold water until he died.

While Pliny the Elder lay begging for water, people by the hundreds were fleeing from the suffocating smoke, hot ash and rocks. Some had pillows on their heads, while others

held rags over their mouths to filter out the poisonous gas.

The officer's nephew, called Pliny the Younger, wrote an account of this disaster. He wrote, "The day is dark as night without a lamp, and a horrifying dark cloud, like a great fish trapping net, is coming down over us." Cutting through the thick darkness from every direction came shrieks of women, cries of children, groans from the aged and angry shouts of men. The thunder of racing feet blended with the roar of the volcano. As he was leading his mother away from the city, he had to take her out of the road to keep her from being trampled by the escaping multitudes.

At long last a little sulfuric yellow light broke through the darkness and Pliny the Younger saw the landscape covered with scorching ash that looked very much like a blanket of steaming snow. Ash was still falling.

When the explosion died away, Pompeii was buried under 20 feet of ash. Not a house top could be seen.

Besides this city, two smaller cities, Herculaneum and Stabiae were also covered. Lava and mudslides covered them 45 to 65 feet deep. Some records say Herculaneum is under 100 feet of mud. The river also had changed its course and flowed into the Tyrrhenian Sea at another place.

Strange as it may seem, after a few years, fears of the volcano died down and people moved back into the area. They planted vineyards, orchards and other crops in the fertile volcanic ash. Soon cities were built. Pompeii, Herculaneum, and Stabiae were forgotten beneath the lava, mud and ash deposits for over 1700 years.

Sometimes peasants living in the area dug for treasure under the ash, but nothing more until A.D. 1500 when workers digging a tunnel dis-

covered part of an amphitheater, forum and a temple. However, this too was soon dismissed from their minds.

In 1748, almost 250 years later, a peasant digging in a vineyard struck a wall. From that time on, excavations have been conducted.

Before its destruction, Pompeii's mild climate, fair blue skies, beaches and Bay of Naples attracted much business and many wealthy, godless Romans. They built elaborate winter mansions with marble floors and wall murals whose vibrant colors have lasted 1700 years. Some have portraits of the family who lived in the villa. Luxury was the rule of the Romans.

The city boasted 118 bars and taverns, besides gambling houses, theaters, several public bath houses and restaurants where beautiful girls danced around the tables. Evidently they were selfish, lustful people. Even some wealthy Pompeians lived in villas outside the city wall.

The signs on the walls indicated that the poor were oppressed. One read, "Curses on you, landlord, you sell water, but drink unmixed wine yourself." The poor paid rent and bought water from persons who drank expensive wines for water. The stone tubs and vats of many laundries show that either slaves or the poor peasants worked very hard.

Bodies of men, women, children and animals were buried quickly. This hot rock formed molds of their bodies. Men have filled these molds and made statues. These plaster statues show the agony on the faces of those people long ago as they tried to escape. These statues can be seen in Pompeii today.

Perhaps many of these people were unprepared to meet God. Would you be ready if God should call for you today?

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The Earth And Noah's Flood

A very good evidence of the Noahian Flood is the multitude upon multitudes of fossils found in the Cambrian layer of the earth. This snows that sudden death came to animals all over the world. The Pre-Cambrian layer which came just before the Cambrian layer has only a few fossils.


In science books you may have seen column pictures showing the evolution of animals. The most simple animals are at the bottom. Animals a little less simple are shown above the most simple. Above those are the animals whose bodies are a little more complex. On and on it moves up, with the most complex animals shown at the top. This supposedly proves the theory that all animals evolved from simpler forms of life.

If the area where you live suddenly flooded so deep that no one could escape, which land animals would drown first? Would it be birds or people? No, it would be the simple animals.

During the Noahian flood it was the same. The most simple, one-celled animals died first. The smaller, dense, marine creatures, those with heavy shells, or those which did not move at all, were some of the first to be buried by the deep mud that the big flood carried. Next to be buried were animals which were lighter and could move around a little faster. After that, might be the slow-moving shore creatures. Then the water rose and caught the reptiles as they struggled for higher ground. As the flood became deeper and deeper, the dinosaurs, mammoths, hippopotamuses and other mammals were unable to escape. Those with short legs or very heavy bodies might of drowned first. Last of all, man and birds could find no higher ground and they too were drowned. Because more complex bodies tend to float more easily, their fossils are found buried closer to the top of the layer.

Fossils in the layers of earth show that this is what happened. There would naturally be some animals that would not be fossilized in this order. For example, crippled men or animals, or birds with broken wings. Also, small sea animals were caught in water currents and carried to higher places and buried there.

At the Dinosaur National Monument in Utah, 300 dinosaur skeletons were removed from the park. The north wall of the monument is still almost solidly covered with dinosaur bones. What, except a great flood, could have washed so many

Two thousand years after creation, wickedness was so strong that God decided to destroy the people. This was the only way to stop sin. Because Noah was righteous, God told him to build an ark to save himself, his family and a pair of each animal.

This was a big job. Noah went right to work. He hired helpers to cut down and split and shape logs to form the hull. Hundreds of wooden pegs were whittled and used for nails. The ark was three stories high—compartments for different animals were built on each floor. A cleaning system was also built into the ark. Gallons and gallons of pitch were drawn from the trees. This was spread over the hull to keep water from seeping through tiny cracks. Noah warned the people of the coming flood while he was building.

A few years ago some scientists became interested in looking for Noah's ark. Fernand Navarra, an explorer, began reading about it. He found the Bible said it rested "upon the mountains of <u>Ararat</u>." Mt. Ararat is 17,011 feet high and located in Turkey, near Russia and Iran. An ancient historian, Josephus, described a ship in an icy grave on this snow covered summit. Marco Polo, a famous early explorer, said the ark was in the mountains of Ararat but year round ice and snow prevented investigation.

In more recent years, a Russian pilot saw the dark shape of a ship in ice. The Russian czar sent 150 men in search of it. It was reported that the men found the ark. But the Commu-

nist regime came to power soon after the men's return and records of the expedition were lost.

In 1952 a helicopter pilot took pictures of a prow sticking out of the ice, 1400 feet up on the mountain.

After much study and preparation, Fernand Navarra and his expedition of men hazarded their lives to climb the snow-covered mountain. Near the summit, where strong wind had blown away the snow, he could see the form of a massive ship's hull mostly encased in ice. After some searching, the men found a cave formed in the ice from volcanic steam. Through this cave they found some wood exposed. They sawed away a five foot piece of the beam. It was hand tooled and covered with a dark sticky substance. At the Madrid Institute of forestry in Spain, scientists estimated its age at five thousand vears.

Although men have sinned against God, He has had mercy on them and let them prove for themselves that the story of Noah's Ark is true.

big, heavy dinosaur bones together in one place and buried them?

There are many other huge graveyards where animals' bones are found compacted together. The bones are piled together in much the same way sticks and small logs are washed together by local floods. However, these sticks and logs of local floods have not formed fossils because sediment from the flood did not bury them. The worldwide flood carried tons and tons of sediment in which both plants and animals were buried.

Mammoth skeletons have been found all over Europe, as if buried by an overwhelming flood. In the same laver or strata of earth are found many different kinds of animals: the lynx, fox, ibex, wolf, badger, antelope, bison, red deer, horse, hyena, rhinoceros, ox, leopard, rodents and several kinds of birds. These animal graveyards show us that some catastrophe such as a worldwide flood buried them. If it had not, their bodies would have been eaten by other animals, or they would have decayed. Plants and animals that decay are changed into soil, or dust. (Genesis 3:19.)

Oil beds and coal seams found worldwide also speak of great water pressure being over all the earth. Although evolutionists say coal was formed over millions of years in swamps, there is much evidence that huge amounts of plants were washed together. Some coal seams are 100 feet thick. A lot of vegetation was needed to make that much coal! Large boulders and fossils of marine life have also been found in coal. Fossilized trees, sometimes upside down, are found extending through several layers of coal. Have you ever seen a tree growing upside down in a swamp? The great flood uprooted trees and all kinds of plants and carried them together with rocks and sea life until

they fell into a low place. Here the bark and heavy plants sank to the bottom and the logs floated on top. Soon a great bed of coal was formed. (This is happening today in Spirit Lake, on Mount St. Helen.)

We know that volcanoes, local floods, mudslides, and many other catastrophes do happen. These sometimes bury animals and plants and fossils form.

Archaelogists often uncover fossils made from these kinds of catastrophes. A worldwide flood is the most likely way that hundreds, and sometimes thousands of animal bones, could be piled into one place. A catastrophe such as a worldwide flood is the most likely way vast areas of tropical forest could be quick-frozen or vast beds of plants washed togather.

Fossils of almost every kind of animal can be found in the same layer of sediment rock. These animals lived in the same era and died together, probably during the flood. Dinosaur and human footprints have been found together in the United States, Australia and Russia. Were these dinosaurs and men running together to escape a common danger, such as the flood? Maybe not, but their footprints in stone are records to show that they lived at the same time, not thousands or millions of years apart.

The earth and the Bible speak to us saying, "There was a worldwide flood."

Raphael Finds The Ark

"The Ark's been spotted again," Mr. Navarra said to his son, Raphael. "A French helicopter pilot has taken a picture of its' prow sticking out of a glacier." He laid down the newspaper. "I'm going to climb Mt. Ararat and find it myself."

"Find what, Dad?"

"Noah's Ark. Yes, I'm going to find that Ark if it's the last thing I do." He slapped his hand down hard on his knee.

Pushing aside his third grade math book, Raphael asked, "May I go with you? I promise I'll stay close to you and not get lost."

"Not this first trip, but maybe another time. Only experienced mountain men can climb Aghri Dagh. Many men have died on her hazardous icy slopes."

Among the men who gathered with Navarra to plan the expedition on Mount Ararat was an Armenian who knew about the area. He had narrowly escaped death when a Moslem ruler ordered the death of all Armenian Christians. From their hiding place, he and his sister watched their parents being slaughtered. During the night they rowed across a lake and slipped through the darkness to their grandfather's home. To their

surprise, he too had escaped. Whispering in secret their grandfather told them about the ark on the mountain. "You must find it. I tried but I was too weak. Now I am too old."

After lengthy preparations, the men started on the expedition. Raphael waited impatiently for his father's return.

The Turks call Mount Ararat, Aghri Dagh, or The Mountain of Agony. It is very rugged and so high it is covered with ice and snow all year round.

Guides are hard to find because blizzards can come any time of the year. The first guides left the expedition at 10,000 feet. They said above that was "magic land" and no one dared go into it. Everyone said it was impossible to find the Ark. They said many men had never returned.

On August 11, the old sage of the village came to the camp and said, "Young men, we know all there is to know about this mountain. We know God brought the Ark to rest here, after men were destroyed. Noah was 600 years old when God told him to get into the Ark. Seven days later rain poured down. Fountains erupted over the earth's surface. Water gushed from these openings, for the earth contains about fifty times more water underground as it does in rivers. Soon every river, pond, lake and ocean overflowed. Water rose higher and higher until the highest mountains were covered.

Some unbelievers think it impossible for enough water to accumulate in forty days to cover the highest mountain. But the water from one volcano accumulated a flood which carried a 100,000-pound boulder. When Mount St. Helens erupted on May 18, 1980, water caused a mud and rock avalanche careening into Spirit Lake, forming waves up to 850 feet high. During the Flood hundreds of eruptions formed, spouting out millions of gallons of water every minute.

The ark floated about 500 miles from where it was built. In a few months it went aground on the side of one of the Ararat mountains and stuck.

Three months later Noah looked out the window in the roof. He saw tops of mountains; however it was four more months until the ground was firm enough for him to release the animals and leave the ark. Noah's family and the animals had been in the ark for one year and ten days.

Fossils, buried deep in the earth. are a record of this great destruction of life. There are so many fossil gravevards that scientists can hardly keep records of them all. In these fossil gravevards, remains of every kind of animal, as well as humans, are found strewn, mangled, and twisted together as if they were washed together by water. In Geiseltal. Germany, 6000 fossils of animals with backbones were found. Sicily has a graveyard of hippopotamus.' In the old red sandstone in England, where shoals apparently dried up after the flood, there have been found 1000 fish in twisted states of agony crammed together in one square vard. A million fossilized clams were found in a three foot thick layer of sedimentary rock in Texas. All these fossils and many, many more are proof of the flood.

The flood was 4,000 years ago. Evil is about as bad now as it was in the days before the flood. You may feel like your family and a few more families are the only righteous people on the earth. There are many more that you do not know about. But take courage, God will help you to live right just as He helped Noah.

out disobeying the Holy Law." Quickly he left!

They knew they must disobey the Holy Law and go into "magic land." Navarra thought the Ark would be at Kop. Those who had seen it from the air said it was iced over in a lake with the prow sticking out. After a long, hard search he found an old shepherd who promised to go into "magic land" and take them to Lake Kop. For days he led them over a laborious trail, up steep banks, down valleys and around vertical cliffs to the lake. The Ark was not there.

Disappointed but not ready to quit, they climbed on to 13,500 feet. Confronted there by a huge glacier wall that looked impossible to get over or around, they set up camp. The shepherd guide refused to go on. He and the Turkish friend turned back. Only the expedition group was left. Cutting steps into the ice wall, they got to the top.

Standing on top of the dreaded glacier, they saw beautiful snow-covered peaks, valleys far below, and Great Chasm of the Ahora Gorge, which separates the two peaks of Mount Ararat. There was still no sign of the Ark.

While looking over the world below and lamenting about going back without finding the Ark, four bears came up over the edge of the glacier and started toward them. People had warned them about bears, foxes and poisonous snakes, saying, "Unarmed, you will never come back." They jumped, yelled and waved their arms. The bears kept coming! Suddenly a strange noise from another direction attracted the bears and off they ran toward the noise.

It was only 2:00 p.m., so they kept walking and looking. Before very long they noticed the ice had changed color. It was dark. Was it the Ark? They could see what looked like the prow of a big boat. They measured the

dark ice. The size fit the size of the Ark!

Convinced it was the Ark, Navarra returned a year later with a more complete expedition. This time they were able to take more accurate measurements and make better maps of the route.

Three years later in 1955, Fernand Navarra took his son Raphael and another expedition group. The summer had been very hot. The glacier had melted so much that the area looked different but they found their way to the top. Navarra wandered here and there. Finally, thinking he was lost, he said, "Let's turn back."

Raphael was not ready to give up. Hooking on a rope, he slid on his stomach to the edge of a cliff, and peered over. A short time later he calmly announced, "The boat, Father, I can see it." Down the ice cliff they climbed with the ropes. "The ice doesn't look very thick. Hack it away," Raphael urged. "Maybe we can touch the Ark."

After more investigation, they found a place where the steam from the partially extinct volcano had melted a cave in the glacier. First one and then another of the men chipped away at the ice until they got through.

Each one touched the Ark! As they climbed down the mountain, Navarra replied, "Raphael, the old sage said, 'To see the Ark one must be as pure as a newborn child.' You must be that pure!"

The Explosion Of Mt. Pelee

"The wages of sin is death." Romans 6:23.

"From my window I see Mount Pelee is still sending out ash, which has already covered everything. Although four miles away, we hear her rumbling and the sulfur smell is so strong, people outside wear wet handkerchiefs over their mouths and noses. The horses stomp and snort. But my husbands says, 'There is no immediate danger.'" Mrs. Prentiss, wife of the American consul, wrote to her sister in Massachusetts.

All around Martinique Island, big signs announced the coming elections on May 11. Other signs read, "Join the fun excursion with the Gymnastic and Shooting Club on Mount Pelee, May 4th. Games! Food! Fun!" The city of St. Pierre purred with excitement!

Tourist guides checked out the trails up Mount Pelee to its two craters. "Corkscrew" was nearer St. Pierre. Most tourists would want to climb only to it. The city's population of 28,000 was growing daily as tourists poured into the city. Thousands more were expected.

Besides the elections, St. Pierre's annual, "Mardi Gras" was under way. Carnivals, feasting, drinking, dancing and other festivities were in full swing. Mills hummed steadily, grinding wheat into flour. Bakers worked extra hours baking bread, cookies, cakes, pies, cream puffs and sweets of all kinds. Bars were open all night. Dancers performed in the streets nightly.

During all this merrymaking, occasional tremors rattled windows and knocked dishes from shelves. Sometimes parties and dancing were interrupted, but most of the people paid little attention. After a person is drunk on wine, life is a little tipsy and danger seems far away.

Volcanic dust now covered streets, houses and everything. It crept into the tiniest cracks of the grand hotels, covering snowy white bedding where rich foreign guests slept. It covered the leaves of the sugar cane, and the fruit trees that grew on plantations. On May 13, Mount Pelee hurled up hot rocks with its huge cloud of ash. The next day she did it again!

Investigators climbed the mountain. Sulfurous gas and puffs of steam had been coming from a new opening on the mountain's side for a month. They reported, "A small new volcanic cone about 30 feet high has been formed. Hot water is flowing from its side and filling the once dry lake bed."

"I guess old Pelee decided to give back our lake!" one scientist said laughing.

"Should any lava flow, it will run down the other side of the mountain away from the city," another explained. All agreed the city was in no danger. Business and partying continued.

Roraima, a Quebec-line steamer, arrived during "Mardi Gras." The ship's crew and tourists entered St. Pierre but the two Canadian missionaries were told to stay on the ship until it left and be sure to leave with it. Little more is known of the missionaries; however Roraima was one of two ships which stayed afloat during the explosion. The other 16 ships sank.



God's Mercy On Lot

Not many years after Noah, there was much wickedness on the earth. It was surprising that people could be so wicked. Surely they knew about the flood destroying all the wicked people. Shem, one of Noah's sons, was an eyewitness of the flood, and he may have been living yet.

The abused children, men and women of Sodom and Gomorrah were crying to God for help. Their cries reached the ears of God, and He sent two angels to Sodom and Gomorrah. They were to check out the condition and to warn Lot that the city would be destroyed.

Abram begged God to spare the city. God promised to save the city if he could find ten righteous in it. The angels found only four. Lot and his family were the only ones. The angels' experience with the vile men was so horrible they told Lot to get himself and his family out of the city as soon as possible and not look back.

In the morning while it was still dark the angel led Lot, his wife and their two daughters out of the city. His sons-in-law and other family members would not go. As they were escaping, his wife looked back and turned to a pillar of salt. That day the Lord rained brimstone and fire upon Sodom and Gomorrah.

It is believed that the remains of these wicked cities are under the Dead Sea. During an archaeological expedition, Dr. Kyle uncovered evidence that the area around the Dead Sea was once a very fertile, prosperous and heavily populated region. Evidence also shows this civilization ended suddenly about 2000 B.C. Now it is a barren wasteland.

In Genesis 14:10 we read about "slime pits." These pits were bitumen, asphalt and pitch—a lustrous black petroleum product which melts and burns. Today there are vast beds of it on both sides of the Dead Sea. Underneath a nearby mountain is a layer of salt 150 feet thick. Above this is a layer of marl mingled with free sulfur.

Dr. Kyle believes God kindled the gases and an explosion threw red-hot salt and sulphur high into the sky. Gravity pulled it back to the earth, causing hot brimstone to rain over Sodom and Gomorrah. Thus fire and brimstone rained on the area and stopped the wickedness.

On the last day of April, 1902, Mrs. Prentiss wrote to her sister again. City newspapers continued to announce the excursions and the elections. People saw no immediate danger but frightened animals were fleeing from the mountain. Small, yellowish speckled ants and footlong black centipedes invaded the city. The sugar mill was a favorite asylum. Either insect has enough poison to kill an adult, if bitten several times.

Reptiles also came from under rocks and out of holes. They sought refuge in shops, houses and under cars. Fer-de-lance snakes, whose bite can be fatal in minutes, swarmed into the city, killing dogs, horses, chickens, and fifty people. The army was called to fight the snakes. Over one hundred poisonous trophies were collected.

Shortly after midnight on May 2, loud blasts terrified the slumbering citizens. From their windows and doors, they saw a huge cloud, darker than night, creeping over their city like a large fishing net. Gigantic zig-zags of lightings sometimes pierced the darkness. Mrs. Prentiss wrote again. This time her letter said, "We are standing on the brink of hell."

The next three days, torrents of rain fell! The mountain's twenty rivers overflowed. Flash floods swept boulders, brush, trees and anything caught in its wild currents. On May 5, about midday the banks of the newly filled lake burst! A deep, one hundred foot wide avalanche of near-boiling hot water plunged down Blanche River! Four miles away and 3,000 feet below was the sugar mill. Only the tallest chimney could be seen to mark where it had been. Thirty workers were buried alive in hot mud. Fearing the poisonous ants and centipedes that had invaded the mill, most of the workers had not come that day.

Earlier this very day, the Governor of Martinique Island had sent another committee to again evaluate the danger Mount Pelee posed for the city. The report was that the crater's openings, and the valley in the mountain would tend to send the lava away from St. Pierre and out to the sea. The governor then made preparation to go to St. Pierre and stay to console the frightened people. He also stationed the army

on the main road to turn back refugees trying to escape. Most roads on the island were blocked by ash-laden branches and trees which had fallen across them.

About 2,000 Pierrotins had left the city. But another 2,000 persons living in the country and on the mountainside had sought refuge in the strong stone buildings of the city. Many walls were two or three feet thick, and some reinforced with iron. Mouillage Cathedral was packed full every day with people praying. Many believed God was sending judgment on the city. Some hoped when they repented, God would calm Mount Pelee.

While authorities assured the people of safety, Mount Pelee boiled, groaned and grumbled. Her thunderous bellows were heard one hundred miles away on May 6th. By May 7, the harbor was so full of vegetation washed there by the floods, that the nineteen ships looked like they were anchored on land. An Italian ship whose captain knew about the eruptions of Mount Vesuvius in Italy, hurried out of harbor that day.

At 7:50 a.m., Mount Pelee exploded! The blast lasted only two minutes. It is believed that within three minutes 28,000 people were dead. That was May 8, 1902. According to some reports, another 10,000 died later.

Nothing was left in St. Pierre but a few broken walls and foundations strewn with thousands of charred bodies. Most of the bodies were found with their hands over their mouths as if to shut out the poisonous gases.

There were only three survivors. Four days later the rescue team found a man alive in the city's dungeon-like jail. Another had run to a village four miles away. Ten-year-old Harviva Dellrile was picked up by the crew of the French cruiser Suchet who had come from Port-de-France about 12 miles away to look for survivors. Harviva was floating, unconsciously, in a charred broken boat two miles out in the bay.

This lesson is about the natural state of every person. The natural man is sinful. God says "we are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags...." (Isaiah 64:6.) We must believe we are sinful or we will be self-righteous and that is as filthy rags to God. We cannot be godly unless God changes our natural state into His image.

Small children show their nature soon after they are born. King David wrote in Psalm 58:3, "They go astray as soon as they be born, speaking lies." Children who have not yet learned to talk can lie by their actions. It is a part of the natural man to lie to get what he or she wants or to keep himself out of trouble. It is a part of human nature to take what we want, not considering other people. It is natural to kick, hit or fight to get what we want.

The small child doesn't know how to control his or her actions, so their nature shows clearly. As we grow older, we learn to control our nature, at least part of the time. If we are honest though, we will admit it is impossible to be godly without the presence of God in our lives.

The natural man is a powerful force within each person. Proverbs 16:32 reads, "He that is slow to anger is better than the mighty,

and he that ruleth his spirit than he that taketh a city." It takes great power to control our nature.

When I was a child, I sometimes thought it wasn't fair that Adam and Eve's sinful nature passed down to us. Now I believe that most every person I know would have sinned just like Adam and Eve did. Eve reasoned the fruit was good for food and would make her wise. Why shouldn't she want to eat of it? Most people reason the same way when they are tempted. Only by the power of the Holy Spirit can we resist temptation.

Yes, each person has a sinful nature and a human spirit. Each of us needs the grace of God to be good Christians.

Jesus' death on the cross gives the Christian power to conquer sin. It is true we have all sinned. Next week we will study God's plan for salvation.

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The Dam Did Not Hold

The Teton Dam in Eastern Idaho stood taller than a 30-story building. It was three fifths of a mile long, spanning the deep canyon of the Teton River with its enormous walls of broken volcanic rock. Millions of tons of clay, sand, silt, gravel and rock were used in the construction of the dam. Some had strongly argued against building it. They were afraid it might not hold up. Nevertheless the dam was built and declared to be entirely safe. The large canyon filled up with water making a good-sized lake. Through the years houses were built in the valley below the dam.

The first hint of disaster came on June 5, 1976 when at 7:00 a.m., a worker at the dam site noticed a little water was dripping out of the canyon wall near the edge of the dam. This did not look too serious, but by 10:30 a.m. a second leak was spilling onto the dam itself and had eroded a good-sized hole in the edge of the dam. It was then that Mr. Robertson, the chief engineer, began to be concerned that the dam might break.

Mr. Robertson called in a construction crew and ordered them to push great boulders into the hole on the face of the dam. However, the bulldozers sank into the sand and mud, and the drivers barely escaped. By 11:00 a.m. it was clear that the dam was doomed. Another leak was found on the far side near the base. Mr. Robertson telephoned a short message to the sheriffs of the towns below: "Believe the Teton Dam may break. Notify people below the dam of the possibility."

The local radio stations were informed of the danger, and though the warning messages went out, no one realized how quickly the collapse would actually come.

Don Ellis, owner of the radio station, casually decided to visit the dam and see how bad the situation really was. He was horrified and broadcasted a description of the possible disaster on the radio so people could escape.

Many did escape. Those who did not hurry were caught in the terrible deluge. The whole side of the dam collapsed.

A 40-foot wall of water plunged down the canyon. Behind it came a roaring flood that crested 100 feet high. Down the cayon and into the Snake River Valley poured the mighty wall of water, carrying with it people, animals, automobiles, houses, barns, trees and bridges. The wall of water carried away whatever was in its path. It swept the valley clean, even uprooting trees whose roots had held them safely in many storms.

Years ago there were no guns, hand grenades, tanks, bombs or airplanes. War weapons were clubs, axes, swords, knives and sometimes rocks. (David killed the giant with a rock.) Soldiers wore armor to protect themselves. Ancient men covered their bodies with several layers of animal hides. Later, men made metal shields and body armor of specially hardened leather. This did not give them sufficient protection, so men developed metal armor from bronze and iron.

Shields and body armor differed in sizes and shapes with the time and region. But its purpose was to protect from enemies attacks.

When a person is saved by Christ, he escapes the kingdom of Satan and becomes a soldier for the Lord against Satan. Satan and all his demons are angry and make war against the new soldier of God. That is why Paul said, "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles [tricks] of the devil." The armour that God has for His children is not made of hardened leather, bronze or iron. They fight not against other men, but against spirits. The battle is a spiritual battle.

Many battles take place in the soldier's mind. God said, "Put on the helmet of salvation." It will protect the mind. Our "helmet" is the hope of salvation. It is an assurance that God has forgiven all sin. The saved person must wear his helmet. This helmet will help him or her to resist temptation from the devil.

God provides the armor. Each soldier must keep the armor on. God provides truth, and the Christian must keep it in his heart and mind. We must think on God's Word and His goodness instead of thinking of this world.

The breastplate of righteousness protects the heart. We are using the breastplate when we make ourselves behave correctly.

The shield of faith will protect the Christian from the fiery darts of the wicked one. Often the devil's darts come by thoughts coming to our mind. Other darts come from people. Unless we are careful, we will be angry with the person instead of the devil. Faith is trust in God. When the devil shoots a dart, just trust in God and the fiery dart will not burn!

The sword for spiritual warfare is the Word of God. This piece of armor needs sharpening often. Mental battles with the devil sometimes dull the sword. The devil can give one hundred reasons why something is right, although God's Word says it is wrong. Sharpen your sword by studying the Bible so you can be true to God.

After you are saved, "present your body (daily) as a living sacrifice," and put on the whole armor of God. If you don't, Satan will trample you under his filthy feet.

Eleven persons and thousands of cattle perished in the overwhelming tide. Millions of dollars of damage was done. Men had trusted in a dam that simply couldn't hold.

The Teton Dam disaster reminds us of a more serious disaster that is coming. God will someday bring judgment on this sinful world. Nothing will change the awful tide in that day, and it will be too late to seek a refuge. "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men,..." Romans 1:18.

Today there is a place of refuge from the coming wrath. It is in the Lord Jesus Christ. He is the Saviour whom God Himself has sent into this world to save sinners.

"For when we were yet without strength (unable to help ourselves),... Christ died for the ungodly." (Romans 5:6.) Christ is the sure refuge and only hope for sinners. "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." Acts. 4:12. All who trust in Jesus now will be safe in that awful day. All others will be cut off, forever, from God.

Many people trust in their good character, their good deeds or their religion for their soul's salvation. These things, however, like the Teton Dam, will all prove unsafe and useless in the day of judgment. Dear reader, what are you trusting in?

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Operation Auca

Pronunciation Guide: Arajuno— a-rahoo'-no. Auca—ow (as in now)-ka. Dayunma—dye-u'-ma.

On January 6, 1956, five men waited in the jungle of Ecuador. Three of the five stood facing the river and shouted phrases of welcome. Their reward came as three Auca Indians stepped hesitantly out of the jungle and crossed the river.

Jim Elliot, Ed McCully, Nate Saint, Roger Youderian and Pete Fleming were men dedicated to God and His work. When they left America they knew they might never come back, yet they were willing to be used of God.

Dayuma, an escaped Auca slave, taught Jim Elliot some simple friendly Auca phrases he could use. She told them not to trust the Aucas, because they will act like friends, then kill.

About this time, Ed McCully and his wife Marilou moved their family to Arajuno, a place near Auca territory. From there, Nate Saint, the pilot of the five, took Ed and flew over the jungle looking for the Aucas' village.

The missionaries planned to drop gifts from the airplane to the Aucas below. This would show the Aucas they were friendly. With Nate piloting, they flew over the village and dropped their first gift—a kettle filled with bright buttons and tied with colorful streamers. They didn't see any Aucas that time,

but on their next trip they saw one. He was running and trying to catch their gift—a machete. After they dropped it, more Aucas came out to look at it.

The five men wanted the Aucas to become familiar with them and to realize they only wanted to be friendly. So, on their next flight, they hooked up a loudspeaker system. They used the phrases Jim had gotten from Dayuma and yelled, "I like you. I am your friend." Soon they hoped they could meet the Aucas on the ground and tell them about the Lord. As they flew over, Nate looked for a possible place to land, but there was none.

Nate had fixed a way for them to drop their gifts by using a long cord with the gift attached. He would circle the plane so the gift dropped into the Indians' hands. On their sixth week of gift drops, the Aucas grabbed the cord and tied an Indian headdress to it. The missionaries rejoiced at this sign of friendship.

They began to call the Auca village "Terminal City." This was to keep their work secret. When they brought the next gift, they saw a model plane on the roof of an Auca house. They were thrilled, sure that the Aucas felt friendly now. After much prayer, they felt that the Lord was ready for them to make another move. They began to talk of a meeting on the ground.

After a long search, Nate found a beach on which they could land the

King David said a righteous man is like a tree growing beside a river, which gets plenty of water so it always bears fruit and never withers.

When a person believes in Jesus as his Lord, Jesus puts a "well of water" in his heart. (John 4:14.) It's a well of everlasting water and provides spiritual water needed to bear righteous fruit. Our fruit is our actions. There is no spiritual water without Jesus in our heart. The fruit borne will be ugly fruit, just like natural fruit is snarly and ugly when the tree does not get enough water. Also the heart without Jesus is "deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked." Only when the water of God's spirit is in the heart can we behave correctly.

Galatians 5:22-23 says, "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance." A Christian will have these characteristics when he is a branch of Christ's holy vine. An apple tree bears apples, and a banana tree, bananas. So a branch from a holy vine will bear holy fruit.

If your fruits (actions) are hateful instead of loving, your connection to the Holy Vine needs repairing. Get busy reading the Bible and praying more seriously and your fruit will change.

Romans 6:22 reads, "But now being made free from sin, and become servants to God, ye have your fruit unto holiness,..." Jesus removes sin from our lives. We are no longer servants to it, therefore we do not produce sinful fruit such as fornication, witchcraft, wrath, strife, envying, murders, drunkenness and reveling (partying).

A Christian gets into Christ's holy vine by being grafted in. First God breaks the Christian off the old root of sin. makes him a new creation, then by way of a very delicate method. He attaches the Christian to the Holy Vine. The Christian then draws his nutrients (food) from Jesus' holy roots. How could a branch bear sinful fruit when his roots are holy? The Holy Spirit is flowing from Jesus to the branch so its fruits are holy. The Christian will not sin unless he cuts himself off from Jesus. As a natural branch will wither and die if it is cut from a tree, so a Christian will die spiritually when he is separated from Jesus. Then he will not be a tree with green leaves and delicious fruit. But if he stays in Christ, he will bear good fruit. -Sis. Charlotte Huskey

plane. The missionaries called it "Palm Beach." Plans were they could stay. Six by nine pictures of themselves were dropped with the next gift so the Aucas would recognize them on the ground. The Aucas gave them a parrot.

The five missionaries set the date for a possible meeting on Tuesday, January 3, 1956. Nate flew Ed to Palm Beach first, then he brought Jim and Roger. After they were settled, Nate flew over Terminal City and gave the invitation. The next day, Nate and Pete flew to Terminal City. There seemed to be fewer Aucas than usual, and they hoped some might already be coming. They flew back to wait with Ed, Jim and Roger.

After another day or two, Nate and Pete flew to Terminal City again and repeated the invitation. An Auca pointed toward Palm Beach. This sign cheered them.

On that day in January, while Ed, Roger and Jim shouted foreign words, their hope was fulfilled. Three Aucas, a young man and two women, crossed the river. The missionaries named the man "George." They called the younger woman "Delilah." Jim met the Aucas with gifts. Before long, their guests were at ease and talked happily.

Nate took George, who seemed interested in the plane, for a ride over Terminal City. George yelled down at his friends, who were very surprised to see George in the plane. When they landed at Palm Beach, George leaped out of the plane and clapped his hands in delight. The five missionaries lifted their heads to signify their heavenly Father, and gave thanks for these visitors and the opening it gave to witness for Christ. They tried to hint to George that they would like an invitation to visit Terminal City, but he wasn't enthusiastic.

Nate and Pete flew back to Arajuno with the pictures they had made and their written records.

No one came the next day, so Nate and Pete took the plane and scouted Terminal City. The Aucas seemed frightened, so Nate dropped some gifts and yelled. "Come, come." They saw George, who pointed toward Palm Beach. They noticed most of the Aucas were gone. On their way back to Palm Beach, they saw a group of Aucas headed to the camp. When they landed, they informed the others and radioed the news to Marj Saint (Nate's wife). They promised to contact her again at 4:30 to report the outcome.

At 4:30, Marj Saint was unable to get in touch with the men. The next day, thoroughly alarmed, the five wives asked another missionary friend, Johnny Keenan, to fly over Palm Beach and check on the men. When he returned, his news was bad. The plane was torn apart and there was no sign of the missionaries.

On January 11, a ground search party found a body floating in the river. The wives' trust in the Lord was the only thing that helped them through this tragedy. They knew He had a plan for them. Later, planes found other bodies in the river. None of the five had survived.

Investigators found signs of a struggle on the beach that seemed to indicate the missionaries had backed into the river. Apparently, even then, the men had tried to show they had love and not hate. Nobody discovered why the Aucas had attacked.

News of the missionaries' deaths was spread throughout the world, and many were inspired to become missionaries. Many totally dedicated their lives to God because of the five who had died for Him so willingly.

Rachel Saint, Nate's sister, worked with the Aucas through Dayuma, the Auca girl. George, Delilah and the other Aucas seemed unchanged and happily accepted the gifts new missionaries dropped to them. The new missionaries continued to build on the foundation Jim, Nate, Pete, Ed and Roger had laid. Their vision was to show the Aucas the love of Christ. One day the dream became a reality. The missionaries had not died in vain!

It was a bad recording, but Dayuma listened eagerly. The women were her aunts. The things they said on the tape drew Dayuma back into the past fears and hatreds. They said "Delilah" who went to Palm Beach was Dayuma's younger sister. After hearing the tape, Dayuma told Rachel she was ready to return to her people and tell them about God, so they flew back to Ecuador.

When Dayuma met her aunts, they told her what had happened in the tribe since she had left. Dayuma told them about God. The aunts said Akawo, Dayuma's mother, had searched for Dayuma when she left. They told Dayuma that "George" of Palm Beach had married Delilah, Dayuma's sister. The aunts told Dayuma about the airplane that had dropped gifts in the jungle. she left. George followed her, but the aunt stayed. George and Delilah met Akawo in the jungle, and they told her the foreigners were bad and would kill her if she went to see them. They said the foreigners had beaten them and tried to kill them. When the aunt came back, she said George and Delilah were lying, because the foreigners were good.

The Aucas believed George and Delilah's story, so they made many spears and went to Palm Beach. They killed the missionaries there. When another plane sent by the missionaries' friends came to drop gifts, Akawo believed Dayuma must still be alive.

After the aunts had told Dayuma about the tribe, they went into the jungle with Dayuma. There Dayuma was reunited with her mother, Akawo. Several of Dayuma's other relatives were also there. They told her George had been killed. They did not feel sorry though, because George was a killer himself.

More and more of the Aucas were believing God's Word. Kimo was the first Auca man to tell Bible stories to his people. Uncle G. began to talk to the Lord as he hunted in the forest. He told the Aucas how he had killed and now was sorry. Kimo had also killed the foreigners. Uncle G. said it was very bad. Because the missionaries had not fought back, the Aucas were touched. It was through the deaths of the five missionaries that the Aucas' hearts were softened to the truth. Rachel and Dayuma rejoiced over the salvation of the Aucas. Today the dream of reaching the Aucas with the gospel is being realized. —Janet McMurrin

Exodus 12:1-14

- 1 And the Lord spake unto Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt, saying,
- 2 This month shall be unto you the beginning of months: it shall be the first month of the year to you.
- 3 Speak ye unto all the congregation of Israel, saying, In the tenth day of this month they shall take to them every man a lamb, according to the house of their fathers, a lamb for an house:
- 4 And if the household be too little for the lamb, let him and his neighbour next unto his house take it according to the number of the souls; every man according to his eating shall make your count for the lamb.
- 5 Your lamb shall be without blemish, a male of the first year: ye shall take it out from the sheep, or from the goats:
- **6** And ye shall keep it up until the fourteenth day of the same month: and the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall kill it in the evening.
- 7 And they shall take of the blood, and strike it on the two side posts and on the upper door post of the houses, wherein they shall eat it.
- 8 And they shall eat the flesh in that night, roast with fire, and unleavened bread; and with bitter herbs they shall eat it.
- 9 Eat not of it raw, nor sodden at all with water, but roast with fire; his head with his legs, and with the purtenance thereof.

- 10 And ye shall let nothing of it remain until the morning; and that which remaineth of it until the morning ye shall burn with fire.
- 11 And thus shall ye eat it; with your loins girded, your shoes on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and ye shall eat it in haste: it is the Lord's passover.
- 12 For I will pass through the land of Egypt this night, and will smite all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; and against all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgment: I am the Lord.
- 13 And the blood shall be to you for a token upon the houses where ye are: and when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and the plague shall not be upon you to destroy you, when I smite the land of Egypt.
- 14 And this day shall be unto you for a memorial; and ye shall keep it a feast to the Lord throughout your generations; ye shall keep it a feast by an ordinance for ever.

The Message: The lamb that was killed for the feast of the Passover was a type of Christ. As the blood of the lamb was to be applied to the door posts, so the blood of Jesus must be applied to our hearts if we are to escape eternal death.

"Get out of my sight!" Pharaoh shouted angrily at Moses. "If I ever see your face again I will kill you!"

After Moses left Pharaoh, God told him He would bring one more plague upon Pharaoh after which he would gladly let the Israelites go. According to God's instructions, he told the Israelites to kill a lamb for each family and sprinkle their door posts with the lamb's blood. This midnight supper was called the 'Passover' because the angel passed over the houses of those who obeyed the command God gave Moses. To remind them of this night. God commanded the Israelites to eat such a supper each year at this time.

Now the Egyptians had not sprinkled blood on their door posts or prepared a midnight meal. Every one of them had gone to bed as usual, expecting to sleep all night. But at midnight all were awakened, even Pharaoh. He hurried to the bedside of his oldest son and found him dead. Pharaoh cried loudly. In every Egyptian home there was the same sad cry. At once Pharaoh sent a swift messenger to Moses commanding him to leave at once with all the Israelites and their belongings.

The killing of a lamb without blemish each year at the Passover was more than a memorial of Israel's deliverance from Egypt. It typified a much greater deliverance—freedom from sin through the precious blood of Jesus. Christ, the Lamb of God, was the perfect sacrifice.

Sacrificed For Christ

There is a growing intolerance for Christians in India. In July of 1998, the body of a deceased Christian was dug out of the grave and dumped outside a church. Two months later, an armed group of Hindu activists went into a churchrun kindergarten, beating and molesting the sister teachers.

This is very sad and there may not be an end in sight because some Hindu leaders believe such "punishment" against missionaries is fine. The Evangelical Fellowship of India reported there were more than 90 acts of violence against Christians in 1998 alone.

In January 1999, Dr. Staines and his two sons died in their jeep when a militant anti-Christian mob set fire to it. The Australian missionary had come to India over thirty years before. He helped establish the Mayurbhanj Leprosy Home and worked for years to eradicate leprosy in the region. Through his work he expressed the love of God. He let the natives see the work of God's Word in his exemplary life.

The missionary was in Manoharpur helping run a "Jungle Camp," a Bible teaching camp held

in that remote village each year. He and his two sons Philip, 9, and Timothy, 6, were asleep in their jeep in front of the church when an angry mob of about 50 men stormed the village. They stationed armed guards around the homes of Christians who might try to save Staines and his sons.

Leaving each guard in his place the remaining mob marched on to the church and silently poured gasoline over the Staines' jeep. Then they formed a circle around it to prevent anyone from rescuing Staines. While they chanted "Barjrang Kali" in reference to one of the Hindu goddesses they watched the missionary and his two sons burn to death.

Dr. Staines had helped to translate the New Testament into Ho, a local tribal language. The Bible Society of India published the Ho New Testament in Oriya script in 1997.

Dr. Staines had proofread the entire typeset text himself, and he bought the whole print run of 3,000 New Testaments for local distribution. He was hoping to start work on the translation of the Old Testament.

The murder of Dr. Staines and his two sons, however, has secured

Because of His great love for us, God sent His only Son from paradise to earth. He was moved with pity when He saw the awful misery sin had brought into the lives of men and women. Although He had given laws for people to live by, these laws only brought condemnation. They could not give people power over sin. The purpose of the law was to show man his own sinfulness and his inability to help himself.

God yearned to be near His people. This was the very reason He had created man. He wanted them to love Him in return. If only they would allow Him to rule their lives He could free them from their awful load of sin.

There was only one way man could ever be set free from sin. It required a great sacrifice. Not just any sacrifice would do. The lambs sacrificed under the law had to be perfect, without blemish of any kind. These lambs were the type of the only sacrifice that would bring man back to a state where he could once more be acceptable in God's sight. Jesus, God's only Son, was alone worthy to be this sacrifice.

And Jesus loved us so much He was willing to leave His beautiful home in heaven to live on earth, to first teach men how to please God, and finally to give His very life to

atone for our sins. In this way we can once more be at-one with God.

His was no ordinary death—every detail was a fulfillment of prophecy. When His clothes were divided among the soldiers, they cast lots to see who would get His coat. More than a thousand years before David wrote in Psalms 22:18, "They part my garments among them, and cast lots upon my vesture (coat). Psalms 69:21 says, "...and in my thirst they gave me vinegar to drink."

When the soldiers came to break the legs of those who had been crucified, they were surprised to see that Jesus was already dead. Instead, a soldier pierced His side. Again, David had written this would be so. In Psalms 34:20, he wrote, "He keepeth all his bones: not one of them is broken." The prophet Zechariah wrote, "...they shall look upon me whom they have pierced,..." (Zechariah 12:10.)

Knowing from the beginning the agony He must endure, vet Jesus' great love for us compelled Him to come and die that we might be saved. God commands us also to love others, just as He did. With the love of God in our hearts, we will have a great desire to see others saved. It is thrilling to read the biographies of men and women who risked their lives, as the missionary in our story, to spread the gospel. Many have left their comfortable homes to live right among the people they hope to win. It has sometimes cost their very lives, but God works powerfully through such sacrifices to save those who will accept the good news of salvation. -Sis. Nelda Sorrell

The violent deaths of these noble Christians should not surprise us. Wasn't Jesus abused and killed? What did He say to His disciples? Jesus said, "If they have persecuted me, they will also persecute you.... If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you." The children of Israel were on their way to Canaan, the land God had promised them. When they came near the kingdom of Arad, he came out and fought against Israel and took some of the people prisoners.

The people prayed and vowed to God that if He would deliver these enemies into their hands they would utterly destroy all the cities of king Arad. God heard their prayer and delivered their enemies into their hand. The Israelites destroyed all the cities of king Arad, as they had vowed.

This great victory and God's mercy to them should have still been fresh in their minds. But soon the people became discouraged because the way they had to go was rough. They began to speak against God and Moses, showing no gratitude for God's many mercies to them.

The people complained that they had no bread or water and accused Moses of bringing them into the wilderness to die. "We hate this light bread," they said, referring to the manna God daily provided for them.

While they were complaining, snakes crawled into the camp and bit many people. These snakes looked like fire, and the poison from their bite felt like fire. Those who were bitten died. The wilderness through which they had passed was, no doubt, infested with these fiery serpents all along. Up to this time God had wonderfully preserved His people from receiving hurt by them. But to chastise them for their mur-

muring, the snakes, which before had stayed out of the camp, now invaded it.

At once the people realized they were being punished for complaining against God and Moses. They knew they had done wrong, and they were sorry. Quickly they came to Moses and said, "We have sinned, for we have spoken against the Lord and against you. Pray to the Lord and ask Him to take these snakes away."

Instead of taking the snakes away God provided a means by which those who were bitten could be healed if they obeyed His command. God told Moses, "Make a fiery serpent and put it on a pole. Then whenever anyone is bitten, he can look at the pole and he will be healed."

So Moses made a serpent of brass and put it on a tall pole in the middle of the camp. From then on whenever anyone was bitten by a snake, the person looked up at this and the snake bite was made well.

The serpent of brass had no power to heal. The people were healed by faith when they believed God and obeyed by looking up to the brass serpent. If they refused to look up they would die from the snake's bite.

John 3:14 says, "And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up." The snake was lifted high up on a pole. Jesus was lifted up on a cruel cross. As looking at the brass serpent with faith healed the Israelites, so we must look up to Jesus to be healed from sin and all its evil effects. An Israelite who refused this method of cure would die; so if sinners despise Christ's righteousness and refuse to accept Him as their Savior, they will perish in their sins.


"No, no, he did fall in. You've got to save my dad!" Pinky shouted. The whole family laughed. They didn't believe him because he had exaggerated so many times.

"Jump, Or I Will Shoot"

Have you ever watched a sailboat race? They are beautiful. The boats look like great birds with outstretched wings sailing over the water. Sailboats can reach high speeds, although their only power comes from the wind. Some countries use sailboats mostly for recreation, however, in other countries sailboats are used for coastal and inland shipping.

Before boat motors were invented, there were some very large sailing ships. The largest of these was the Preussen; a five-masted, full-rigged German vessel built in 1902. The Preussen measured 433 feet long (132 meters) and 45 feet (16 meters) wide and could carry 8,000 short tons of cargo. It had magnificent sails that caught the wind and forced the ship across the water. Men used heavy ropes to change the direction of the sails according to which way the ship needed to go.

Tall straight poles of wood or metal, called masts, held the sails. Masts on those old sailing vessels jutted high into the air. Near the top of the mast was the truck, a small platform through which the ropes to raise and lower the sails passed.

Only occasionally did men climb the mast to replace the ropes or loosen a torn sail. On some sailing vessels guard rails protected the man working on the truck, however, in many vessels the truck was only a small bleak platform. The ship in our story had no railing on this platform high in the air.

One calm, sunny day the ship in our story anchored in the harbor and most of the crew went ashore. The captain's small son, Wilford, ran freely on the deck exploring it. Seeing the truck high up on the mast he decided to investigate it. Wrapping his little legs and arms around the mast he began climbing. Hand over hand he pulled himself up, up, the pole. As he got higher, the mast began swaying but he held on. On and on he went, placing hand over hand, pulling his body behind until he reached the truck. Then he climbed out on the small platform high above the deck.

Wilford was standing on the truck without any protection when one of the sailors coming back on the ship noticed him. Not realizing the danger, the small boy threw his arms into the wind and gave a yell of triumph.

God loves children. Because of His great, loving concern, He gives a commandment specifically to them. He adds to this commandment a special promise, saying that it is the first commandment with promise. The commandment, "Children obey your parents," if obeyed, brings with it the wonderful promise of long life and well being.

Obedience is the child's most important lesson. Learning to be immediately obedient to your parents and those over you is the necessary foundation of a truly happy and successful life. The younger this lesson is mastered, the better.

God, in His providence, watches over those who are obedient to a father and mother. He regards a falling sparrow (Matthew 10:29); He will surely be mindful of an obedient child. He numbers the hairs of the head (Matthew 10:30); He will certainly bless the child that honors Him by obeying a father and mother.

Obedience to parents is conducive to length of life. Those who are most obedient in early life have the best prospect of living long. Obedient children are saved from the vices and crimes that shorten life. Also, obedience to parents is connected with virtuous habits. It will make a child industrious, temperate and sober; it will lead him to restrain and govern his wild passions; it will lead him to form habits of self-control, which will save him from the snares of sin and temptation all his life.

We can learn a great lesson from the Alaskan Bull Moose. Each fall, during the breeding season, the males of the species battle for dominance. They actually go head-tohead, antiers crunching as they crash together. When antiers are broken, the moose is defeated. His antiers are his only weapon.

Almost always, it is the heftiest moose with the largest and strongest antlers that wins. You might say then that the battle is "predetermined" the summer before. It is then that the moose eat nearly round the clock. The one that consumes the best diet for growing antlers and gaining weight will be victor. Those who eat inadequately will have weaker antlers and less bulk. The fight itself involves far more strength than skill.

The lesson for us? We will face spiritual battles all our lives. Whether we are victorious depends not on our physical skills or brainpower, but on our spiritual strength. Now, while you are young, is the time to develop this strength through strict obedience to your parents and advisors.

Colossians 4:5 teaches us to "redeem the time." This means we are to make the most of every opportunity. When Paul wrote to the young minister. Timothy, he instructed him how to be "prepared unto every good work." (II Timothy 2:21.) Now is the time to prepare yourself to be your very best for God and His service. Use your young mind for prayer, reading and memorizing God's Word, and listening as the Gospel is preached. By this you will develop enduring faith, strength and wisdom. Then God will keep you from the snares of the devil. Then your life will be an honor to your parents and to God, as well as a great blessing to -Sis.Nelda Sorrell others.

Jesus sat down near the temple treasury. The money boxes were nearby where the people gave their offerings. Jesus saw rich men give large offerings. Then He saw a poor widow stop to put in two small coins. Together these coins were worth less than a penny.

His disciples were surprised when Jesus turned to them and said, "Truly, I tell you this poor widow has given more than anyone else. Others had plenty to give. She is poor, yet she gave all that she had!"

The poor widow had faith that God would supply her needs. Her love for God compelled her to give; though she had so little. There is a special promise to those who give. In Luke 6:38 Jesus says, "Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again."

Giving to the Lord will never impoverish us. Rather, this is the best investment we can make. Jesus Himself promised a good return on the money we give. He also says our return will be in direct proportion to our giving; the more we give, the more we will receive.

This is also an investment anyone can make. John 6:9 tells us how Jesus fed a multitude of hungry people. He was only a young boy and he had only five barley loaves and two small fishes in his lunch but he gladly gave them to Jesus. With this gift Jesus fed the multitude and had twelve baskets of

leftovers! Never hesitate to give because it seems so little. With God's blessing it will meet the need.

In his book, "Personal Experiences," Bro. Susag tells of a time he and another minister were in need. He says:

"Bro. Ahrendt and I were holding some meetings in the locality between Bertha and Hewitt, Minnesota, We were staving in a log house-just the two of us. We ran out of kerosene, and were also out of money. Bro. Ahrendt took the can and started to walk to Hewitt-a distance of six or seven miles-in the snow, hoping to meet some brethren who would ask him why he was carrying that can-but he met no one. He went to the post office. got the mail and concluded that he would have to go back without kerosene; however, on opening one of the letters a dime dropped out. He immediately went to the store, bought the kerosene and returned home.

"One evening Bro. Ahrendt said to me, 'Brother Susag, I'm hungry for some eggs; let's pray the Lord to send us some eggs.' I replied, 'How can we expect to get eggs out here? I haven't seen any chickens around here, nor in the bush where I have been.' 'Well,' he said, 'the Lord can bring them from somewhere.' That evening on our returning from service we found something setting on the table covered with a newspaper. Brother Ahrendt lifted the paper and found a tiny basket with five eggs in it! New Word: A covenant is a binding promise or bargain.

19 And God said, Sarah thy wife shall bear thee a son...and thou shalt call his name Isaac: and I will establish my covenant with him for an everlasting covenant, and with his seed after him.

The Message: The most valuable inheritance a father can give is godly instruction backed by a godly life. Abraham was faithful to always obey God. God knew Abraham would teach his children to keep the way of the Lord.

Abraham loved and trusted God. He knew God's voice and was quick to obey whatever He commanded. He also prayed with his household and taught them to love and serve God. He had no child of his own until he was very old, yet he taught his household, consisting of many servants, as faithfully as if they had been his own children.

God had made a covenant with Abraham. He promised to give the land of Canaan to him and his descendants. He also promised that he would have many descendants and would someday be a father of many nations.

There was never a doubt in Abraham's mind that God's promise would be fulfilled; He took it as a very serious responsibility to teach his household. He carefully taught them to keep the way of the Lord, to be serious and devout in the worship of God and to be honest in their dealings with all men.

They in turn would teach their children so that his household after him should keep the way of the Lord. Thus the fear of God would continue in his family when he was in his grave. Doing this, he fulfilled the conditions of the promises which God had made him.

When I was eight or nine years old I was walking home from school. It was a long walk and about half way home I had to cross a busy fourlane boulevard. There was no signal

or even a crossing guard at that time.

On this particular day I was standing on the curb waiting for a break in the traffic. A lady in the lane next to me decided to stop to let me cross. Without thinking I immediately ran across her lane. Just as I stepped into the next lane I saw a car in that lane coming fast. I tried to stop and in doing so threw out my hand to keep my balance.

The car whizzed by just inches from me, clipping my thumb. Otherwise I was shaken, but unhurt. As I walked on home I decided I wouldn't tell anyone about my close call—I knew I should have been more careful.

My mother met me just as I stepped into the house and for some reason reached out and grabbed my hand as she spoke to me. I couldn't help crying out in pain. She, of course, wanted to know how I got hurt so I told her of my close call.

That evening my father, Francis Doolittle, told my mother that he was driving along that afternoon when a heavy feeling came over him so strong that he started to pray. After prayer he felt no better so prayed again, but still it didn't lift. Finally he pulled to the side of the road and earnestly begged the Lord to take care of the problem. After this, the burden lifted.

When my mother told him what happened to me on the way home, they realized this was the same time that the Lord burdened him to pray.

This incident made a strong impression on me as a child and is still fresh in my memory. I have often thanked the Lord for sparing my life and for godly parents who taught me how to trust Him.

Pray Humbly

The Message: Prayer is our opportunity to speak with God Himself. He tells us to pray always. This assures us that He is ever near us; always listening for our prayers.

Before telling the story of the unjust judge. Jesus immediately tells us the meaning of this parable—we ought to pray always. It is both a privilege and a duty to pray. What an honor it is to be invited to speak with God Almighty. the Creator and Ruler of the universe! Very few people are admitted to the presence of truly great people. If they are given this opportunity they must do so at the convenience of the dignitary. But God invites us into His immediate presence at any time, day or night. He knows how weak and helpless we are. He knows that as long as we are in the world we will face trouble. heartache and danger. For these reasons He tells us we should always pray. I Thessalonians 5:17 tells us to "Pray without ceasing".

Wisdom and humility teach us that we are dependent on God for everything. Without Him we can do nothing. This puts us into an attitude of complete dependence on God at all times and a spirit of prayer—of continually lifting our hearts to God in petition for help, guidance and, also, thanksgiving for His many blessings to us. In this way we are always praying.

Prayer strengthens us spiritually. In mythology there is a story about a giant named Antaeus. In order to keep alive, Antaeus must touch the earth as often as every five minutes. With each and every touch he became twice as strong as before. This illustrates the power and nature of prayer. Every time we truly touch God through prayer we receive real strength and increased faith.

When we have a need we should bring it to God in prayer. Our prayer

may not be answered immediately. We are taught then to continue to pray until the need is met. God cannot be compared to an unjust judge—He loves us far more than we can realize. He wants to give us the very best. The Bible tells us that all things work together for our good if we love God. (Romans 8:28.) So, if our prayers are not answered at once we must continue to pray, knowing God has a purpose in the delay.

The prayer of faith waits on God. A minister was once holding a revival. An infidel came to the meeting to ridicule and hinder others from accepting God. Seeing his intent, the minister stepped up to him and asked, "Are you a Christian?"

"No," the infidel answered emphatically.

"Well, do you want to be one?"

With a sneer the infidel answered, "I should say not!"

"Then shall we kneel and pray together?" asked the minister

"I do not believe in prayer, " answered the infidel.

"Well, then, will you allow me to kneel and pray for you?"

"Yes, but it will do no good," replied the infidel sarcastically.

The minister knelt and poured out his heart in prayer for the infidel's salvation. When he got up the infidel remarked, "I don't feel any different at all."

"Wait," the minister answered, "wait awhile. God works in His own time."

Two years later the minister met the infidel again. "See, your prayers were not answered," the infidel told him.

"Just don't get uneasy," the minister assured him. "We must not rush God."

After a few more years this same infidel went to another service. God had been dealing with him. This time he yielded to God and was wonderfully saved in answer to years of continued prayer.
