



"I am glad Danny followed Jesus," said Daddy. "I needed to be caught."







"You surely can!" said Daddy.





Jesus is not pleased with children who do not obey. You should ask Jesus every day to help you obey your parents.




Judy said on the way home, "I feel so good inside now, Mother. Jesus has made everything turn out all right."







"Did the animals bite Noah?" Cindy asked.



"I am glad we won't ever have a flood like that again," said Betty.





"Mother, it works when you obey Jesus, doesn't it?" Mary said as shekissed her mother good night.




"You can have that apple, Mother, I'll take this small one," Allen said. Donald took a smaller one, too.






