"How does the spider know how to make her house?" asked Janie. "Did she go to a spider school and learn how? Or did her mother show her?"



"What happened then?" asked Susie.


"Father said one dog was enough around our ranch, and we would have to get rid of Queenie." answered Uncle Fred.

Then Mike and Mother bowed their heads.


Mike said: "Thank you, God, for good grape jelly that You sent the rain and sunshine to grow grapes for. And thank You for all the other good things You give us, Amen."

"Why would Jesus be any different from other babies, Johnny?"



Next Sunday Tommy took Father and Mother to Sunday School and church services. Both of them were saved, too.



The teacher smiled at him.


"You can use this Bible every Sunday here at Sunday School. When you have come to Sunday School for one year, it will be your very own," she said. Carl was happy! —Sel.

Soon the old lady came back. She said, "I will help you. Everyone needs a helper at times."


All of us need God to help us, too. Jesus said the Holy Spirit would help us in times of trouble.

Just then the lights came on. think I will undress in the dark anvway, just for fun," said Susan. so many of God's creatures can work in the dark, I can, too!"



"Get your friends and come back this afternoon," Mrs. Patterson told him as he went down the walk. "There is a good place to play ball in our back yard."







"Is a whale an animal?" asked Randy. "I thought whales were fish. They live in the water."







A server put a piece of meat and fish into their dish. It looked good. Judy was hungry, and wanted to eat.


Mother took an ooloo from her purse. It was a rounded knife, with a handle at the top. She cut off pieces of meat for each one.




"God did it!" Judy said when she got up.

So the twins prayed more than ever. They prayed when they walked to school. They prayed after they were in bed. They did not pray aloud, but they knew God could hear them.



"This is for Stan," said Philip. "I hope he will get well real soon. I want to play with him again."


All at once Philip was happy. There was a big smile on his face. He began singing a Christmas hymn.
