HOW SHALL WE DRESS?

Gen. 3:21; 1 Tim. 2:9, 10; 1 Peter 3:3-6; Deut. 22:5; 1 Cor. 11:7, 14, 15

Adam and Eve saw that they were naked. They knew God would not want them to go naked. They felt ashamed as they looked at each other. Eve found some fig leaves. They were large, so she thought she could make them something to wear. After they had put on the aprons she made, they went before God. But God was not pleased with their scanty clothing. "No, that will not do," He said. God took the skins of two animals and made them each a coat. Now they were covered.

The Bible tells us how to please God in everything. It tells us to wear modest clothing. (Ask your teacher to tell you what modest means.) It says women should not wear men's clothing, neither should men wear things that belong to women. Those things are hateful in God's sight. The Bible tells us that long hair is a glory to women and girls, but long hair is a shame for men and boys. Our memory verse is a good rule for us to follow.

Memory Verse: Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God. 1 Cor. 10:31.



Jerry asked as he wiped the tears from his eyes. "Why didn't they run and get into the ark before the door closed?"



When Jesus was baptized, a dove from heaven lighted on Him.


Memory Verse: ... Be ye therefore wise as serpents and harmless as doves. Matt. 10:16.

Noah's Ark

The ark rested on Mt. Ararat, Noah sent out a raven to see if the waters had cone down. Did you ever see a rayen? It's a pretty black bird. Do you remember how God told the ravens to feed Elijah. when there was a famine? Elijah was by a brook and the ravens brought him bread and flesh in the morning and in the evening (I Kings 17:1-7). The ravens obeyed God. The rayen that Noah sent out flew back and forth until the waters dried up, and it found a place to rest its feet. Later, Noah sent out a dove. A dove is a pretty bird. The pigeon is also in the dove family. Did you ever see a dove or a pigeon? One time my father cut a hole in his garage attic and two pigeons lived there. There was a bedroom below the attic in the garage. Some people visited my father and he let them sleep in the bedroom. They couldn't rest because of the cooing of the two pigeons, so he decided to give the pigeons away. A man came for them in the night, put them in a sack and took them out into the country. He put them in a pen for several days. When he let them out, they came right back. My father had to close up the hole and finally they left. The doves and pigeons are loving birds and are faithful.

Jesus says that we are to be "harmless as doves" (Matt. 10:16). They are humble, lowly, and harmless. Can you be like the dove? The dove that Noah sent out returned. He put out his hand and pulled her into the ark. Seven days later he sent her out again and she brought back an olive leaf in her mouth. He waited seven more days and sent her out and she didn't return. So Noah removed the covering off the ark and looked out and saw dry land. The waters had gone away.

Today, there are many who have gone on record saying the ark is still on Mt. Ararat, but it is covered with ice. Many. many years ago it was not covered with ice. One man wrote about a pilot who was flying an airplane in 1916. The pilot told the Russians, that he saw a ship on top of Mt. Ararat, "as long as a city block." The Russians sent men up to see about it. They took a lot of pictures and brought back the report that the big boat was as long as the Bible said Noah's ark was. They said it had hundreds of small rooms in it, also some huge rooms which had fence-like partitions, made of upright timbers, two feet thick. Those rooms would be big enough for elephants. There were a lot of cages with tiny iron bars. On one side there was a big door about 20 ft. square. The Russians destroyed the pictures. The Turkish government now must get along with Russia so they will not let anyone go up there, but maybe one of these days God will let it be opened up for the world to see. -M. Miles




"I don't want to be cut off from God," Dottie said quickly.

"I'll get a stick and hit the old devil if he tries to make me do wrong," Billy said doubling up his fist.




"Larryl" called Mother from the backyard. As he ran to the backyard he

"Yes, that is right, and how sad for the enemy to do such an awful thing. When the wheat came up, all the weeds or 3.


