
"I am not drunk! I am only praying," Hannah answered.







"No, my son, I did not call you," Eli said. "Go back to bed."



From the time the first lifeboat was launched in 1786 at Bamborough, England, tens of thousands of lives have been saved from untimely death by the brave men of the lifeboat service.

Here and there along the coasts are to be found the lifeboat stations. If you live at the seaside, of course, you know all about them. If you don't still you may have read about them many times, and maybe have looked admiringly at brightly painted lifeboats when on your vacation.

The lifeboats are not merely something beautiful. They are made to be used, and the reason why so few of us see them in use is because they only go out to sea—except for practice—in times of storm and peril, often in the middle of night, when most little boys and girls are fast asleep in bed.

To see a lifeboat launched in a winter blizzard—what a thrill that must be! Watching the brave lifeboatmen, gathered at the call to service from their cozy firesides, perhaps from their warm beds, donning their life belts and taking their places in the boat; hearing the word of command to let go, seeing the boat with its precious human freight gliding down the slipway and plunging amid clouds of spray into the stormswept sea—I would stay up any night to see such a sight as that, wouldn't you?

Though many lives have been saved by the lifeboatmen, it has not been without sacrifice. Time and again lifeboats have turned over in the rough seas, and their brave crews have been drowned. Even when lifeboats are made so that they cannot sink, and so that they will right themselves if turned over, the men who work them are always in danger, for their is no knowing what a stormy sea will do.

There are indeed no men more worthy of our respect and honor than the brave crews of the lifeboats, and on dark winter nights, when the wind is howling around our houses, we may well remember them in our prayers.

Still there are other lifeboatmen besides those who venture their lives on the sea.

Life is somewhat like the sea, isn't it? And all the people of the world are the ships floating upon it. There are big ships and little ships, steamers and sailing boats, and tiny little rowboats. Some are sailing proudly across the waters, others are battling with winds of trouble, still others have sprung leaks through the stress of the journey, while many that have struck hidden rocks are sinking beneath the waves.

All around us there is great need of lifeboatmen today. What can be done? What can you do? There is your little boat—can't you turn it into a lifeboat and help save somebody in need?



Last week we read about lifeboatmen. Here are just a few of the many greathearted men and women who have given their lives rescuing children and grown-ups too, who were sinking in the troubles of life.

George Mueller was one whose heart was touched with compassion for all the poor little children left alone on the great sea of life when their fathers and mothers died. Seeing their need, he made himself a lifeboatman, and set out to help them. He opened orphan homes in Bristol, England. Over 20,000 orphans have found a refuge there.

Then there was Dr. Barnardo. When he was a student, he saw eleven poor little boys asleep in a gutter under the open sky. To him they were like little boats sinking in the sea of life. He made up his mind to do what he could to rescue them, and started an orphanhome. Since then 120,000 boys and girls have been admitted, fed, clothed, and trained.

There was William Booth, and Prebendary Carlile, who went to work in the London slums rescuing those who were homeless, hungry and cold.

The great David Livingstone gave his life for the people of Africa. He also became the leader of a great army of missionaries who went to that land to tell the black people about the love of Jesus for them. One of these missionaries was Mary Sellsor, who was later known as the "White Queen" because of the love she showed for the little lifeboats she rescued.

Wouldn't you like to be a lifeboatman, too? You may never be able to wear a life belt and ride out gloriously over the stormy sea to some ship in distress, but you can help in the work of rescue just the same. There are many wrecks on the sea of life, not far away from you, and many little boats which may sink if you do not help them. You may not he like others but that is no reason why you should not do what you can just where you are, and who knows what

God will make of you when you grow up?

You may feel very small now, and think that you cannot help at all, but it is surprising what blessing even a little child can bring into other people's lives. Do you know, there is nothing so cheering, nothing that so makes worried folks forget their troubles, as the smile of a little child? The gentle words of sympathy, the offer of hands and feet in willing service that only a child can make, can sometimes do more to brighten sad and weary hearts than anything else. You try them on mother when she is very tired, or on daddy when he seems a bit "blue," or on your little friends at school when they are out of sorts.

Oh yes, you don't have to wait until you are grown up to become one of God's lifeboatmen. You can be one today. Why not decide to join the ranks now?





The leaders decided to take it to another city to see what would happen. In the next city the people also got sick and many died.


"We shall move it to another city," they said.



"What shall we send?" they asked.


"Let us make golden mice," one said.

They threw away all their idols and prayed unto God, saying, "We have sinned against God." One day they did not eat but spent the whole day praying together.



The people of God cried unto Samuel, "Pray that God will protect us!" Not one of them prayed unto an idol!







"Yes, I do, for I am the man of God. Your father has already found his donkey which you are looking for, so don't worry about them, just come with me to eat and then spend the night here."




"What a foolish command!" Jonathan retorted. "You should all have eaten of the food the Philistines left when they ran, then we could have chased them even farther away!"







"Call him at once! We will not sit down to eat until he is here!"





Michal met the servants at the door. She said, "David is sick!" Saul commanded, "Bring David to me in bed that I may kill him!"



"I will do it for you, my beloved David," promised Jonathan.


The sacrificial feast lasted three days. The first day David was missing Saul said nothing about it, but the next day he was angry because David was not there. "Where is David?" he demanded.




