Lasting Love For The Bible

In 1523, William Tyndale was busy in his cold, stone room in the castle of Sir John Walsh. He was translating the Bible into English and all his work was done by hand under candle light. Though it was hard work, Tyndale loved every second of his labor.

He was dedicated to a vow that he had made to some lazy monks who were telling lies about the Bible to poor peasants. He had said, "If God spare my life, ere many years pass, I will cause a boy that driveth the plough to know more of the Scriptures than thou knowest."

In England during Tyndale's time, it was against the law for a common man, woman, or child to read a Bible. First of all, the Bible was not written in English so that they could read it, and second, they were told only the Roman Catholic leaders could read and interpret God's Holy Word. Therefore, the poor people paid lots of money to the Catholic leaders who were to tell them what the Bible said and pray for them.

Tyndale knew what the Bible said in Latin, Greek, and Hebrew, and he did not like the lies that the Catholics were telling the people. He loved the real Bible truth and he wanted every man, woman, and child to know and love it also. God inspired him to translate the Bible into English and in 1525, he had his first Bible translation printed.

This made Pope Clement VII very angry. He did not want people to know the truth and be saved directly by the blood of Jesus, as the Bible teaches it. He had King Henry VIII to send soldiers to arrest William Tyndale and put him in prison.

Though they hindered Tyndale's work, they did not stop his English Bible from spreading over the country to the hungry people who were eager to read God's Word for themselves. In

1535, it was against the law to have one of Tyndale's English Bibles; however, people were willing to hide them and risk their lives because they loved God's Word so much.

Tyndale suffered many things, somewhat like Apostle Paul. He suffered shipwreck, loss of his writings, was followed by secret spies, and betrayed by friends. Through all of this, Tyndale was faithful to God and to His Word.

In 1536, Tyndale was taken to the stake and burned. His final words were: "Lord, open the king of England's eyes." He wanted everyone to know the truth in God's Word.

Almost one hundred years later, King James I came to the English throne. He wanted the Bible printed in English so all his people could read it for themselves. Guess what Bible he had the translators follow? Yes, William Tyndale's sacrifice and love for God's Word is even blessing us today when we read our English Bible.



CITIES OF REFUGE

After the land had been divided among the tribes of Israel, the Lord told Joshua, "Tell the children of Israel to pick out certain cities as cities of refuge, as I instructed Moses."

The Israelites had always believed that the relatives of a dead person had a right to kill the one that caused their relative's death, even if the death was accidental. But God wanted every one to have a fair trial. No one would be put to death in a city of refuge unless they had killed someone on purpose.

If a person accidentally killed someone, they were to run as fast as they could to one of the cities of refuge. The keeper of the gate would let that person enter, but not those who chased him. The person would be given a trial and, if he was found not guilty, he could live in the city of refuge without being afraid of death.

As the Israelites scattered from Gilgal to go to the land that had been given them, they needed some way to always be reminded of God's commandments. For this reason the tribe of Levi was not given a separate inheritance as the other tribes.

The heads of the Levite tribe came to Eleazar the priest and to Joshua. They told them, "The Lord told Moses to give us cities to live in with the surrounding country as pasture for our cattle."

So each tribe gave the Levites cities out of their own inheritance. In this way the Levites were scattered through all the tribes. There they could teach the people how to serve and obey God.

After this the Lord gave the Israelites rest from war. There was no enemy to come against them, because the Lord had delivered all their enemies into their hand. The Lord did not fail to do anything that He had promised the Israelites. He gave them every good thing that He had promised.


After the king had received their gift, he sent Ehud and the men away. When they had gone just a little way, Ehud sent the other men on home, but he returned to the king's house.







"But go tell Jesus' disciples and Peter that He will meet you in Galilee, just as He told you."





One day a man of Israel named Gideon was threshing wheat in a secret place. As he worked, an angel appeared to him saying, "The Lord is with you. You are strong and brave."



"Yes," said Mother as she hugged her children, "that is a good thing."




"This is nothing less than the sword of Gideon, a man of Israel," the other man answered. "God has delivered Midian and this whole army into his hand!"


When Manoah heard these words, he prayed and begged the Lord, "O my Lord, let the man of God come to us again. Let him teach us what we shall do to the child that shall be born."
