



STEPHEN'S TESTIMONY AND DEATH

Suddenly the Muslim mob exploded into an angry mass, grabbing any nearby Christians and beating them. Fritz's wife was dragged, beaten and kicked until the security officer stopped the mob. Fritz and his wife were taken to a military office for their safety but they could not live there.

Soon Fritz and his wife were back at the chapel, living in a back room of the building. On December 12th, a larger mob surrounded the chapel, chanting, "Attack! Attack!" This time the police did not come to Fritz's rescue.

It did not take long for the mob to enter the church. They destroyed everything in sight. They cut off the electricity, leaving the rooms in darkness. Before Fritz and his wife could escape, a club came across his wife's head. Fritz was beaten, burned with cigarettes and rolled in the broken glass from the church windows.

Fritz went unconscious and when he awoke he was lying on a heap of wood from the chapel. He was choking on smoke as flames circled around him. Fritz prayed, "Lord, I give my soul and spirit to You."

Fritz doesn't remember how it happened, but he found himself being lifted from the blaze. He was spared from the fire, but the mob stoned him and left him for dead. Later some of his congregation came and took him to their home. His jaw had been smashed, nerves in his eyes were damaged beyond repair and he suffered from a concussion. Yet Fritz still prays and sings to his Saviour, Jesus Christ.



When they came to a place where there was water the Ethiopian said, "See, here is water. What keeps me from being baptized?"


"If you believe with all your heart, you may be baptized," Philip answered.


"What God has made clean do not call common!" the voice answered.

When Cornelius saw Peter, he fell at his feet to worship him. Peter lifted him up and said, "Stand on your feet. I am a man like you."



Let us pray that these Chinese sailors will understand and believe the Word of God. Jesus died for their sins and He wants them to make heaven their home also.






The shepherds said to each other, "Let us now go to Bethlehem and see this thing which the Lord has made known to us."

Truly the greatest gift we can give someone is our love.


