So, on the morrow the Lord did as He had said and all the cows in Egypt died. But none of the Israelites' animals did.


But Pharoah's heart was hardened and he would not let them go.



Never had anything like this happened before in the land of Egypt. Many fields of barley and flax were destroyed. Only the wheat fields and rye were not ruined.




Pharoah sent for Moses. When he came, Pharoah begged, "I have sinned against your God and you. Please forgive me just this once and ask your God to take away these locusts."

Pharoah called for Moses and said, "Go. Serve the Lord. Take your little children, only don't take your flocks of sheep and herds of cattle."




But the Lord hardened Pharoah's heart and he would not let them go.



The Egyptians saw the Israelites go and chased after them. When they got into the sea, God took the wheels off their chariots.


The Egyptians said, "Let us flee from Israel for their God fights for them."


God said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea and the waters will come back and cover the Egyptians."

She flew on a giant 747 that was reformed into something like a hospital nursery. It was stocked with hundreds of baby bottles and formula, thousands of diapers, and hundreds of bassinets for the babies to lie in.

When the jet landed on the runway at Saigon, several old army buses chugged toward the plane. They were crammed with babies and children. With a whoosh, the plane doors opened and the soggy heat and stale smells of Saigon drifted into the cabin.

Karen stepped to the door, bent down and took hold of three screaming babies handed to her. As she rushed to put the babies each in a bassinet, her eyes filled with tears. She was helping to rescue these tiny human beings from certain death. As the plane roared into the sky and soared over the ocean, Karen changed diapers, fed and burped babies, cuddled and rocked them, and she prayed for them.

More than 400 children were taken on that first load and all together over 2000 orphans were put into the arms of waiting parents-to-be.

This happened over 25 years ago. Today they are adults living in a free country where they can learn and prosper. Also, they can worship God without fear of persecution that the Christian Vietnamese suffer. Karen is thankful that she helped deliver these lives from death or from the slavery they would have suffered.



Moses told them, "This is the bread that God has given you to eat. Gather enough to eat every day, but no more than that."


The people called the bread: Manna, which means "What is it?" The manna tasted like wafers made with honey. The people gathered it every morning and when the sun was up it melted.

Moses said, "They came to ask about God. When they have a problem they ask me what God says they should do and I tell them God's laws."



Thou shalt not steal.


Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.


Thou shalt not covet anything that is thy neighbor's."

Suddenly Muslim men rushed into the church, waving guns and swinging an axe. The Christians tried to leave but the attackers stopped them. Many were beaten and had their clothes torn from their bodies. The pastor's Bible was burned and the church altar abused. Finally the attackers left; the building destroyed. The Christians' bodies were hurt, but their faith in Jesus Christ was stronger.

These attackers were never arrested nor punished for the crimes they committed. In fact, the government leaders are Muslims and they don't think any law was broken. If

Christians had attacked Muslims and burned a Koran, the Christians would have been punished by law.

Pastor Rahmed Masih knows that Christians are not treated fairly in Pakistan but he lives by the two commandments that Jesus gave. He and other pastors asked missionaries to bring a Mobile Medical Clinic to their country. Now that it is there, these pastors and doctors help the poor and needy whether they are Muslim or Christian.

The Muslims question how the Christians can be so kind to them because they are not kind nor fair to Christians. Many of them are turning to Jesus because they see His love in the lives of these obedient Christians. —Sis. Connie Sorrell







We smiled at each other and her eyes told me she knew who I was. Oh, how thankful I am that I was kind to her in the days when we were children! Now she helps me.




Then God departed in anger, lifting the pillar of cloud from off the tabernacle. As soon as He did, Miriam became a leper—white as snow!

Sometimes it is hard to be patient, but patience at the right time could save our life. —Sis. Connie Sorrell



Moses and Aaron fell on their faces and said, "Lord, a few men have sinned, will You destroy the whole congregation for them?"


God said, "Tell the people to get away from Korah, Dathan and Abiram's tents."

Rahab said, "Two men came to me but I didn't know where they were from. They have left the city already but if you hurry you can catch them."


The men quickly went out the city gates to try to catch the spies.


The people camped by the city of Jericho. God talked to Joshua and told him how He wanted the people of Israel to fight against Jericho.


Joshua sent men to look and they found the stolen things in Achan's tent.





Jael came out to meet him and said, "Come in. Turn in here, my lord. Don't be afraid."


Sisera went into her tent and she covered him with a blanket. He said, "Could I please have some water to drink?"
