Ahaziah sent another captain with fifty men to see Elijah. The captain said, "O man of God, the king says, Come down quickly."


Elijah said, "If I am a man of God, let fire come down and burn you up." Fire came down and burned up the men.

As they went on, a chariot of fire and horses of fire appeared. The chariot separated Elijah from Elisha and Elijah was carried up into heaven.



Spreading The Gospel

The leaders of this country aim to take away the most basic rights of citizens and make it impossible for them to live...I don't consider the spreading of Christian literature a crime. I give out tracts and will continue to do so whenever I have any opportunity."

The judge sent Sister Solovieva to prison for making this statement. He wanted all her gospel tracts burned and she was told to never speak about God or Jesus again.

Sister Solovieva would not agree to this and she did not whine or beg for his mercy. She was willing to risk her freedom and life to give the gospel to others about her.

Yes, it was hard on the body to

survive in prison, but her soul fed continually on His Word and she sang songs of praise to God. Others learned about the Lord from Sister Solovieva so that her witnessing continued in spite of the judge's desire to stop her.

Are we willing to tell others about Jesus or hand out gospel tracts? Do we shrink away when someone "accuses" us of being an old-fash-toned Christian? When others about us are doing wrong, do we stand for what is right?


The lepers found much food in the camp. They found gold and silver and fine clothes too. They ate the food and took some of the nice things.

Jehu said, "How can everything be all right while your mother, Jezebel, keeps doing wicked things?"


Joram turned around to get away. Jehu shot him with his bow and arrow. He had Ahaziah killed and drove his chariot to Jezebel's house.




Josiah said to his men, "God is very angry with us because our parents have not obeyed the words of this book. Go and find out what God is going to do to us."


Daniel spoke to the prince's servant. He said "Feed us vegetables and water for ten days. Then see how we look and do what you want with us."

A year went past. King Nebuchadnezzar was walking in his palace. He said, "Isn't this my kingdom, that I built with my own power?"


As soon as he said this a voice came from heaven that said, "Nebuchadnezzar, your kingdom is taken away from you."



Wang took 200 yuan (about \$25) from his pockets and a watch and laid them on the floor. Some of the police searched the house, knocking and throwing things around. They took more money, a Christian book, hymn books, praise-song tapes and two tape recorders.

One officer stood in front of Wang and yelled, "Who taught you to believe in God?"

"No one," he replied. "I want to believe in God myself."

"Nonsense," he yelled back.
"These meetings are cults and antiparty. Take him away," he ordered.

Officers handcuffed Wang so tightly that his wrists bled. He was shoved into a car and taken to Xiao County Police Station where he was questioned, stayed true to Christ, beaten and sent to a detention house. Later he was accused by the Communist government of "meeting unlawfully and joining a cult." The Labor-Education Committee ordered Wang Zhaomin to work with Brigade Two in Datong District.

Every day Wang and other prisoners work eight hours without food removing rocks from a mountain. They only have one meal a day which is half a box of rice, a small bowl of soup, and a tiny piece of salty vegetable without any oil. Often the men

are dizzy from hunger, and their hands are cut and bloody from the rocks, but they dare not stop working because guards will beat them.

Early in the morning, King Darius hurried to the lion's den. He called out, "Daniel, has your God saved you from the lions?"


Daniel answered him, "O King, live forever. My God sent His angel, who shut the lions' mouths and they could not hurt me."

A Brave Man's Testimony

Mehdi Dibaj was a brave man. Once an upper class Muslim living in Iran, Mehdi heard about Jesus Christ through Christian foreigners and when traveling from Iran. He studied the Bible, liked what he read, and believed on the God who inspired the writing of Holy Scripture. The more he learned about the love of God and His Only Son. the more Mehdi wanted everyone to know about Him. A well-learned man. Mehdi translated Christian radio programs and books into Farsi. the common language of Iranians. He knew this was illegal to do but he wanted his fellow countrymen to learn about the true God who created mankind after His own image.

In 1985, Pastor Mehdi Dibaj was arrested and accused of denying the Muslim faith. In court, he was given a chance to defend himself and this is what he said:

"Men choose a religion, but a Christian is chosen by Jesus Christ. To be a Christian means to belong to Christ. Jesus asked me to renounce even my life, to follow Him faithfully, not to fear the world even if my body must perish. I prefer to know that God, the Almighty, is with me, even if it means that the whole world is against me.

"I am in God's hands. For 45 years I have walked with the God of miracles, and His goodness is for me a shadow that protects me in His plove.

"The God of Daniel, who protected his friends, protected me during my nine years in prison, and all torments changed to my good, so that I have the fullness of love and gratitude.

"Of all the prophets, Jesus alone was resurrected from the dead, and He remains our living Mediator forever. I gave my life into His hands. For me, life is an opportunity to serve Him, and death is the privilege of getting to be with Him."

For saying this, he was condemned to death. When his Christian friends in other countries heard this, they wrote letters to the Iranian government who released Mehdi from prison to stop the political pressure. Later, though, Dibaj was killed in a village park probably by some Muslims.

Dibaj is with the One who chose him to be His. —Sis. Connie Sorrell


Mordecai would not wear the clothes. He sent her a message telling her about the law. He told her to go to the king and ask him to save their lives.



Job's friend, Eliphaz, said, "You must have done something wrong or God would not be doing this to you."


Job's friends, Bildad and Zophar, thought Job must have sinned too.
