

THE CREATION, PART II







And God saw everything that he had made and it was very good. He blessed all of His creation and said, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth."


On the seventh day God rested from His work. He blessed the seventh day and commanded that it be a day of rest to all people.

But one day the woman was walking in the Garden and she heard the voice of the serpent, the devil. He said, "Has God told you you cannot eat of all the trees of the Garden?"





Adam crept out of the bushes. "I was ashamed because I was naked and hid myself," he said.


"How did you know you were naked?" God asked. "Have you eaten of the tree I told you not to?"

Hungry To Hear God's Word

In the little country of Laos (south of China) live the Khmu tribe. They are the natives or the first ones to live in Laos. When the Lao tribe invaded the land 1,000 years ago, they drove the Khmu tribe into the mountains and took away the fertile valleys from them. As the Lao tribe became stronger, they made the Khmu people their slaves. Today, the Lao government is communist and the Khmu people are still "Kha"—a bad name for slave.

One reason why the Khmu people are mistreated is because many of them have become Christians since 1885. That's when a missionary named McGilery traveled there by elephant and brought the gospel to these poor people. Since then, the Khmu Christians find comfort in salvation from their suffering, hunger and rejection. After slaving long hours in the fields, they eagerly gather among the trees at night to sing, pray and listen to a Gospel Teacher. The Bible is not written in their language, so Teachers who can translate the Loas Bible travel from village to village and hold Bible camps.

Even though they study late into the night, no one falls asleep or complains about being tired. To them learning God's Word is a life line that will pull them out of the poverty and spiritual darkness that they are bound with. After the Teacher reads the *Bible* and instructs the group, he gives a test to see how much they learned.

One group of students stayed up late to study God's Word and took a

test early the next morning. Twentytwo of them made a perfect score and most were very close to it. The teacher said, "The reason they are so eager and have such zeal for the Lord is that they have been oppressed and have no freedom."

Missionaries left a JESUS film with one pastor who was the only one with a VCR. A few months later the pastor wrote that he was not able to sleep much since the film came because people came to watch it 24 hours around the clock. Even when he was sleeping, they would wake him up exclaiming, "Wake up! We want to watch it again!"

Let us be like Khmu Christians—hungry to hear God's Word.

"What have you done?" God said. "Your brother's blood cries to me from the ground. Because you have done this, crops won't grow for you and you will become a hunted man."


"My punishment is more than I can bear," Cain cried. "If you send me away from Your presence anyone who finds me will kill me."

But men also began to become more and more wicked. A man named Lamech killed a man for bruising him and another man for hurting him. Because of this God's heart was saddened for making man.



Sixcel is a good witness for the Lord. Let us be eager to share the good news with others about us.






So they mixed their clay and made bricks. Then they baked them and used teamwork to bring them to the right place and put them together with mortar.



After these things God spoke to Abram again in a vision and said, "Don't be afraid, Abram. I am your shield and your reward."


Finally Abram asked, "Lord, what will you give me since I don't even have any children? My wife can't have any so all I have is a servant, Eliezer."



So she stayed home more and prepared for their first child. In a few months they had a healthy baby boy! The new parents were so happy and thankful to God! Daniel wanted to be a good father and love his son like the Heavenly Father loved him.

Their baby boy was born in the cold month of December, 1868. Perhaps he caught pneumonia—it is not known—but through an illness the Lord took the baby to heaven. Lying in Daniel's arms, Tamzen cried and cried. It was a sad time for both of them but the Lord gave them comfort.

The gospel work was calling to Daniel again. While her husband was busy holding revival meetings all over the state of Ohio, Tamzen was keeping house in a little place in the country. Perhaps she had a few hens to feed and gather eggs from every day. She may have had a cow or milked a neighbor's cow for the milk, and she probably had a cat or two to lap up the last drops.

Tamzen prayed for Daniel for she knew he was tired, riding horseback from one community to another, preaching at night and praying for the sick during the day. With the Lord's help, Bro. Daniel Warner continued his ministry as a circuit preacher. He traveled by train to the states west of Ohio. On June 25, 1873, he wrote in his diary: This is my birthday. Thirty-one years of my hasty life have passed away. They have gone to eternity. Their record has all been entered upon the book by the Scribe of heaven....Oh, keep me pure in heart, that the remainder of life may all be given to God!"

June 28th: Put in the day viewing the great city of Chicago. Nearly all the burnt district is built again with enormous buildings. It is wonderful to think that for miles we can walk streets built up on either side with magnificent buildings of brick, stone and marble, from three to nine stories high, iron fronts, etc., all built since the fire...I was much interested with all we saw."

Traveling on to Nebraska City, Bro. Warner crossed the Mississippi River and the Missouri River on steamers. He was happy to travel so quickly by the modern iron horse (train) and newly invented steamers.

Staying with one family and then another Bro. Warner spent his days teaching individuals the Word of God and most of his evenings he preached in country school houses. A lot of people were eager to hear him. Not only did he have a pleasant voice to listen to, but his messages were anointed by the Holy Spirit. Many souls were saved and lives were changed for the better under his preaching.

The Lord was also using this time to heal Bro. Warner's heart from the sorrow over his dear wife's death. As he walked or rode his horse over the prairie he felt the love of God surrounding him, encouraging him to press onward in the high calling God had given him.

Winter came with is blasting winds of ice and snow. Bro. Warner still kept his monthly appointments.


In March, 1874, his diary said: (19) Day meeting at half past ten. P.M. mounted a horse and rode in company with Bro. Figard to Mr. Pense's, two miles. Talked to them on the important subject of their souls' salvation. Returned with some headache...Thank God, my headache abated (left) and I spoke with liberty on the text, "My Spirit shall not always strive with man." (22) Sabbath. Beautiful morn. Met at 10:30 A.M., heard a number of brethren and sisters speak. Went to Indian Creek, where I had the pleasure of immersing the following persons...It was a glorious time! All were happy. We felt we were near heaven...(23) Quite cold this morn; I have to drive about thirty-five miles against the wind. It was a hard day's ride...O God! In mercy hear us and bless our efforts."

The Lord was listening to Bro. Warner and He answered prayer for him in more ways than one.

in holy wedlock. I was out early to breathe the balmy air.... At four the ceremony was performed.... All passed off pleasantly.... Now a new leaf is turned, a new era begun in the history of my life.... May God assist me to make her life happy as far as it is in the power of man to do so.

Bro. Warner knew that his wife was a treasure, a gift from God, because he had prayed for her and prepared for her. Marriage is a very serious decision in life. First, be saved from your sins, live for the Lord and pray for your lifetime husband or wife. The one you marry will change your life either for good or bad. Bro. Warner learned this all too well in his lifetime.

THE ARK OF THE COVENANT






All of the important people of Ekron met together and decided, "We will send the ark of God back to Israel."




Saul said, "I have sinned. I have disobeyed God's commands. Forgive me, please, and come with me so that I may worship the Lord."


Seven of Jesse's sons came before Samuel. "No, none of these are the ones. Are all of your children here?" Samuel asked.
