


These two men had gone to the temple to pray. The Pharisee stood and prayed, "God, I thank you that I am not bad like other men, such as sinners or this publican.


"The owner paid us all the same wages, and we worked longer. That is not fair,' some of the workers grumbled. Their complaints reached the ears of their employer.


"Some of these men have only worked for one hour, and they have made the same as we have. We worked hard all day, one of the workers complained to the employer.

Then Jesus told a story. "There was a man who had two sons," Jesus said. "He went to his first son and asked him to go work for a day in his vineyard.


"I will not,' the first son said. Later, the first son felt sorry for his words, and worked for a day in his father's vineyard.




"What will the owner do to those husbandmen?" Jesus asked.


"He will destroy these wicked men, and will get new workers," the people answered.


things, too. Come and share in our happiness!
