"Place your finger here," Jesus offered. "Look at My hands. Notice the nail prints? Reach out your hand and feel My side. Stop doubting and believe!"


"My Lord, and my God!" Thomas exclaimed.





William could hardly believe this wonderful blessing. Not only did he have a place to live, food to eat, but he also had a mission where he could work for the Lord.



'I tell you what," said William. "since I work the night shift, you can have my bed during the night when I


don't need it.'




angels but have not obeyed it."




Philip continued to travel about, preaching the gospel.




After this, the church experienced a peaceful time. It grew in numbers. The believers were encouraged by the Holy Spirit and lived in the fear of the Lord.

How excited Tabitha's friends were! The news spread quickly throughout Joppa. Many people believed in Jesus.





Coming from a country village, Louis was use to one buggy or wagon at a time passing along the cobblestone street. Now he heard several buggies and wagons at a time. The tall buildings around the school prevented sunshine from coming through the windows and the hall-ways were damp and smelled musky.

It seemed to Louis that there were staircases in all the wrong places and he was constantly getting turned around. Gabriel and the other boys were good to take Louis by the arm and help him learn which way to go and where the stairs were located.

At home, Louis was use to bathing in the clean nearby stream in the summer and in the warm tub in the kitchen in the winter. At the Institute there was only one bathroom for all of the one hundred boys. They were allowed to take only one bath a month! Then one day Captain Charles Barbier came to visit. He spoke about a night writing that the soldiers used. Each sound was given a different pattern of raised dots. The dots were pushed —or punched—into heavy sheets of paper with a long pointed tool called a stylus. When the paper was turned over, raised dots could be felt on the other side.

DOTS! That would make letters smaller! Louis and the other blind boys were excited about this new method! Louis set to work. The stylus was similar to the tools his father used in the harness shop. By the Lord's help, he would find a new way for the blind to read.

This great news spread to the church at Jerusalem. They sent Barnabas to preach in Antioch, also. When he arrived, he saw that the people in the church were being led by God and had been touched by God's grace. How glad he was! "Stay faithful to the Lord," Barnabas encouraged them. "Serve him with your whole heart." People who listened to Barnabas saw that he was a good man and filled with the Holy Spirit. Many people who heard him were saved.

After Barnabas left Antioch, he went to Tarsus to look for Saul. Barnabas told Saul about everything that was happening in Antioch. They both returned to preach the gospel. For a whole year the two men met with the church and taught many people.

Before this time, Jesus' followers were called believers, saints, the Church, or assembly, the men of this way or sect, and other names. Jesus' followers became known as "Christians" in Antioch. The word Christian came from a Greek word, Christos. Even now, people call Christ's followers "Christians."

Some prophets from Jerusalem visited Antioch. One of them was named Agabus. During a meeting, Agabus stood up. The Holy Spirit had prompted him to warn the people. "A severe famine will spread over the entire Roman world," Agabus prophesied.

And a famine did strike the land. It has been written about in history books. The famine occurred during the reign of Claudius. The disciples decided to help the people affected by the famine. They sent money to the people who lived in Judea. Saul and Barnabas took the disciples gifts of money to the Christians there and encouraged them through the hard times.



At his parent's stone cottage in Coupvray, France, Louis explained to them about his passion to write and read with the dot system. Since his father worked with tools similar to the stylus that Louis used to punch holes on the paper, it seemed sensible to him also.

"Keep working with your tools," said Simon Braille. "Some day the Lord will open up the way for you to make it happen."

These words were like gentle rain on a dry thirsty land. He did not shrink from the daily chores to help the household, but when he had any spare time, neighbors would see him on the door stoop with the stylus, heavy paper and holder.

"There is Louis making his pinpricks," the neighbors would say in passing. Most of the time people thought a blind person was not very smart so they were not interested in visiting with him, and he did not bother to explain it to very many.

Months passed into years. Louis worked on the system of making dots for sounds, but there were so many sounds! It was confusing for him to keep each sound and dots straight, let alone teach it to others.

At the Institute, he would work through the night on his paper which worried his friends. "I must master this so we can write and read." he told Gabriel.

"I feel your passion," said Gabriel.
"Men have worked on this need for hundreds of years. Smart men, they were, but they all failed. Maybe God can help a little humble boy like you to discover a better writing method. I will pray for you."

"Thank you," replied Louis. He knew it would take more wisdom than he had personally, but he must be a willing tool in God's hands, just like the stylus was in his hands. Often he thought about the awl that had injured his eye when he was a three-year old boy. The stylus was very similar in shape to the awl. Now Louis

wanted to be obedient to his Heavenly Father.

It was his Heavenly Father that gave him the right thought one day about his dots. He was weary in making so many dots for each sound, when the thought came to him to make dots for letters instead. There were only 26 letters in the alphabet. He could write letters by a dot system!

Louis made dots like this: ::, three down and two across and he numbered them. He gave each letter a dot pattern. Now the reader just had to memorize the dot pattern for each letter. Louis tried it out on his friend, Gabriel.

After Gabriel felt with his fingers the dot pattern for each letter, he was able to read what Louis punched out on the heavy paper. The boys were excited! This was so much easier than the old ways!

Soon they were letting the other blind boys feel the dot patterns. They were able to read better also. After a while, they were writing notes to each other through this special system.

Louis Braille was only fifteen years old, but the Lord had given him wisdom to create a system that would some day change the lives of thousands of people. But first Louis still had some hard things to endure.

Before long Dr. Pignier, the dean and director of The Royal Institute for the Blind Youth, heard about Louis's dot pattern. He called Louis to his office.

"Tell me," said Dr. Pignier, "What is this alphabet of dots I have been hearing so much about?"

Louis was eager to explain. "Please, sir, if you will read something aloud, I'll show you."

So Dr. Pignier picked up a book and began to read, slowly.

"You can read faster, sir," said Louis. His hands and fingers began to fly across the paper as the stylus obeyed every move he gave it. After Dr. Pignier had read a page, he stopped.

"Well, can you tell me what I have just read?" he asked.

Louis turned his paper over. He brushed his fingers lightly over the lines of neatly raised dots. Then quickly, and easily—without a mistake—he read back every word.

"That is amazing!" exclaimed Dr. Pignier. "Simply amazing! How old are you, boy?"

"Fifteen," replied Louis.

"To think that smart men for hundreds of years have been searching for ways to write for the fingers to read, and now one of my boys has learned to do so!"

Louis was pleased to hear the praise, but he knew it was the Lord that had given him the enlightenment. Now he was sure Dr. Pignier would help him with his next big goal.

"Sir, we need to start making books with this dot system," he said. "When can we start?"

There was a long pause which made Louis nervous.

Kind teachers would read a page at a time while Louis's fingers punched out the dots without error.

Dr. Pignier saw in Louis the ability to lead with his gentle, cheery voice. He also liked the writing system Louis had invented. So when Louis turned eighteen and was a graduate, Dr. Pignier asked him to remain at the Institute and work as a teacher there.

Louis was delighted! The Lord was directing his footsteps, he was sure, but he needed so much patience with others. If they could only see the deep yearning of the blind for more learning!





Louis liked teaching at The Royal Institute for the Blind Youth in Paris, France. He did not shout at the children like most teachers did in the 1800's. They thought learning was something that had to be pounded into the a child's head. Instead, Louis spoke kindly and was patient especially with the younger boys. He never forgot how he had felt his first few weeks at the Institute and he wanted to help each newcomer feel at home.

After teaching every day Louis would practice his music for hours. He played the piano and the organ at the Saint Nicholas-des-Champs Chapel. Hundreds of people attended this chapel on Sundays and enjoyed hearing him play.

"Louis is very talented in music," they would say. "Some day he will be a famous musician."

However, it was not his music that would make Louis Braille a household name some day. He was teaching the blind boys at the Institute his dot pattern alphabet but it still had not been received in other schools for the blind. He was hand-making books for their library which was very slow work, but there was no other way to make them. Also, Louis was creating a dot pattern for musical notes and for numbers.

Louis was a very busy man and often worked through the night. He began to cough, chill then have fever and he was sometimes too tired to climb any stairs.

The doctor came and checked out Louis's condition. Finally, the doctor asked, "Do you know what is wrong with you?"

"Yes," whispered Louis, "Tuberculosis." "Some people say fresh air helps and plenty of rest," continued

the doctor. "If you want to live much longer, you need to sleep more, eat better and get more exercise outside in the sunshine."

After the doctor left, Louis laid in bed for a long time. He prayed. He was only 26 years old and he wanted to see his alphabet be accepted outside the Institute before he died. Louis took courage and determined to do what was best for his body.

Slowly, Louis became stronger again. His friends encouraged him and his music cheered him. Then Dr. Pignier started helping him with his dot pattern system. Together they wrote little books called: Method of Writing Words, Music, and Plain-song by Means of Dots for Use by the Blind. Whew! It was a long important title for such a small booklet, but they wanted rich and important people to be impressed by the book. They were asking for sponsors to help them print books and put this reading system into other schools.

Polite thank-you notes were received, but no money. No one thought it important that a reading system be printed for the blind.


This is the last time that the name Saul is in the Bible. From then on, Saul is called Paul.

While Louis was enjoying his visit at home, changes were taking place at the Institute in Paris. His friend, Dr. Pignier retired from serving as director and a new director, Dr. Dufau, took his place. He was a cold, stern man who did not like new ideas. He was not pleased with Louis's alphabet. "That silly punching of dots!" he called it.

When Louis came back to the Institute, he knew something was wrong. His friends were too silent. They did not want to discuss with him his favorite subject—his dot pattern alphabet.

"Yes, I do, sir," said Mr. Gaudet.
"It would be to your advantage to encourage it to spread to other blind institutions."

"Yes," said Dr. Dufau thoughtfully.
"I think I will do that."

Once again, the Lord blessed Louis with another victory.



The Dots on Display

The old school building where Louis taught was dirty and cramped. A new building was built for The Royal Institute for the Blind Youth in Paris. Dr. Dufau planned the opening day ceremonies carefully because many important people were to attend. One of the highlights was to explain Louis's dot pattern of writing and reading.

It was 1844. Louis sat with the other respected teachers high up on the platform. He could hear the auditorium fill with people. He straightened his shoulders, looked forward and smiled. He believed that his writing dot pattern would impress the audience.

After several speeches in which Louis could hear the restless crowd along with the speaker, Mr. Joseph Gaudet finally stood before the people and read a paper explaining the dot pattern alphabet. Then Dr. Dufau led a blind girl to the front of the stage. She had learned to read and write in the dot pattern.

Dr. Dufau opened a book and began to read. The little girl stood by his side and wrote down his words in Louis Braille's dot pattern. When Dr. Dufau was finished reading, he touched the girl on the shoulder. She skimmed her fingers over the rows of dots she had just made with a stylus. Word for word she read back the words he had just read.

Louis heard the audience applaud loudly and he heard them stand to their feet. Relief and happiness rushed over him in one wave of thanksgiving to the Lord and His faithfulness. Then someone in the audience yelled: "It's a trick! That little girl learned those words before coming on stage!"

A trick? The clapping slowed and the cheering stopped, but Louis jumped to his feet. He tapped his way to Dr. Dufau and whispered in his ear. Dr. Dufau nodded and then called out, "Wait, my friends, wait! Do not come to such a wrong conclusion. This is not a trick. Please be silent for a few minutes and let me prove to you that this system does work."

Louis heard the audience sit down and become still. Quickly Dr. Dufau called two blind students to the front. One child he sent from the room. The other he kept by his side. "Now will someone please come onto the stage? Anyone who can read will do."

A volunteer came forward. "Pick any book from this pile of books," continued Dr. Dufau. "Turn to any page you please and read anything you wish to."

The man did as he was told. As he began to read, the blind child wrote down the words in dots with the stylus. When the man finished reading, the other child was called onto the stage to read what the other child had written. As his fingers brushed lightly across the page of raised dots, he read clearly word for word what the first child had written which was the same as what the man had read.

The audience stood and cheered for some time. Louis was elated! His years of hard work was now rewarded with acceptance among those who could help spread its use into other Institutions for the blind. How this would free the blind from limited education! Yes, the Lord cares for all people, even those with special needs.
